Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project

File No.: M21-210B2

Description: The Reservoir Upgrades Project has several components to increase the efficiency and reliability of Reservoirs 1 and 2: Chemical storage and feed systems (sodium hypochlorite and aqueous ammonia) to help reduce nitrification issues in the distribution system; Pump replacement and conversion of drivers from gas engines to electrical motors; Upgrades to reservoir electrical service through SCE; Installation of diesel generator systems to power the reservoirs in the event of an emergency; Miscellaneous system rehabilitation and upgrades including electrical gear replacement, pipeline rehabilitation, pipeline modifications, and instrument replacement based on the results of site visits and related analyses; and Slurry Dewatering Pit upgrades located at the Reservoir 1 site.

Status: Following the approval of the recommendations of the Water, Power, and Supply Chain Reliability Assessment, Mesa Water developed a design Scope of Work for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Upgrades Project. A proposal was solicited from a CIPR on-call design consultant and the project's Preliminary and Final Design was kicked off in May 2021. The consultant delivered a draft version of Technical Memorandum No.1 – Reservoir 1 Site Master Plan and the draft Permit Plan in July 2021. Following Mesa Water's review of TM1 and the Permit Plan, the consultant began work on the Preliminary Design Report. The Preliminary Design Report was delivered in November 2021 and the Preliminary Design Report Workshop was held in September 2021. In March 2023, the Final Bid documents and cost estimate were received and reviewed by staff. After receiving approval for the project's reduced scope, the project team began modifying the Bid Documents. The revised Bid Documents were received in August 2023. Request for Bids were released to the prequalified contractors in August 2023. A job walk was conducted in August 2023 and attended by five prequalified contractors. The bid opening was held in October 2023. Four bids were received. A recommendation for contract time extension negotiation and award was approved November 2023. The contract time extension negotiation to accommodate equipment lead times was completed and Notice to Proceed was provided January 2024. A preconstruction meeting and a site walk with the contractor team were held February 2024. The construction team mobilized at Reservoir 2 in June 2024 and Reservoir 1 in October 2024. The contractor installed and started new mixers in Reservoir 2 in August 2024. At Reservoir 2, the contractor poured and coated the concrete foundation for the Reservoir chemical facility and constructed yard piping and electrical. The chemical tanks are delayed, and start up of the chemical management system is

expected in September 2025. At Reservoir 1, the contractor has demolished yard structures, excavated for the new Heavy Equipment Port, Slurry Dewatering Pit, Chemical Facility, and Generator Pads. The Slurry Dewatering Pit went into operation in April 2025. After a rain delay, concrete foundations for the Heavy Equipment Port and Chemical Facility were poured in March 2025. The structural steel for the Heavy Equipment Port was received in April 2025, and the building is currently under construction. The building panels are delayed until August 2025. The AQMD Permits to Construct and Operate the diesel back up generators were received in March 2025. The generator concrete pads were poured in May 2025. The generators were set on the pads in June 2025.

Capital Improvement Program Update

File No.: M24-104

Description: Develop a prioritized 10- year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for water system improvements, including an updated supply and demand analysis, calibration of the hydraulic model, District-wide asset condition assessment, and development of a roadmap for Asset Management Program implementation.

Status: A contract was awarded to Carollo Engineers in May 2024. Technical Memo (TM) 1 Demands and TM 2 Supply were received in October 2024 and were reviewed by Staff ahead of the Workshop on October 21, 2024. Revised TM 1 and TM 2 were received in January 2025. Staff provided pressure logger data and production data for the Hydraulic Model calibration in August 2024. Carollo's team performed asset condition assessment field work in August and September 2024. The Hydraulic Model TM was received in December 2024, and the workshop to review the TM was held on December 17, 2024. Staff provided addition data to the Carollo team to improve the hydraulic model calibration. A workshop to define the Asset Management Software Requirements was held in October 2024. Asset Management Software demonstrations were held in November and December 2024. TM 5 Regulatory Requirements was received in October 2024 was reviewed by staff. A workshop to define the asset Consequence of Failure was held in January 2025. TM 3 Transmission Systems Evaluation was received in January 2025 and was reviewed by staff. TM 9 Condition Assessment was received in January 2025 and reviewed by staff. Draft TM 10 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) was received in March 2025 was reviewed by staff. The draft TM 7 Asset Management Roadmap was received in April 2025 and was reviewed by staff. A workshop to review TM7 Asset Management

Local groundwater Supply Improvement Project (Local SIP)

File No.: M24-105

Description: The Local SIP will develop a feasibility study that meets the requirements of the Bureau of Reclamation's Feasibility Study Directives and Standards (WTR 11-01) for a brackish groundwater desalination facility. The project is being conducted in partnership and cost sharing with OCWD, City of Huntington Beach, and City of Newport Beach.

Status: A contract was awarded to Black & Veatch Corporation in May 2024. The project team has completed the evaluation of aquifer zones and selected the Talbert Gap on which to focus the alternative analysis for the feasibility study. The project team has also completed modeling the potential wellfield locations, developing treatment plant footprints, the Class V level life-cycle cost for the project, and developing the preferred alternative. The draft Feasibility Report is scheduled to be submitted for review in July 2025.

Description: Conduct a feasibility study to determine if Mesa Water can reliably serve groundwater to the City of Huntington Beach.

Status: A Cooperative Agreement was executed with the City of Huntington Beach in October 2024. Staff received three proposals from qualified consultants in June 2025 and is bringing a recommended consultant team to the Board in July 2025.

Plan Check Management System

Description: Develop a Request for Proposal for a new Plan Check system.

Status: Staff is contacting various consulting companies and vendors to discuss and analyze available electronic Plan Check systems to develop a scope of work for the preliminary project phase.

Pipeline Integrity Program

File No.: M25-103

Description: Implement Resolution No. 1525 Replacement of Assets.

Status: Since its inception in 2015, the Pipeline Integrity Program has been implemented by staff to use pipeline condition, rather than pipeline age, to prioritize pipeline replacements. The current and previous fiscal year's progress is described in this report. In Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24), the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant reviewed mainline break data from FY22 and FY23 and recommended condition assessment for pipeline groups with break thresholds that exceed the standards of Resolution No. 1525. These recommendations were presented to the Board in September 2023. Based on the recommendations, Staff negotiated a proposal for ePulse condition assessment of 2.2 miles of AC pipe. The field work was completed in May 2024 and the report was received in July 2024. The results of the condition assessment were reviewed by the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. The consultant's report was received in October 2024 was reviewed by staff. No AC pipelines were recommended in the report. Additionally, MWDOC staff performed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May and June 2024. The final leak detection report was received in June 2024 and no mainline leaks were reported. Staff evaluated the feasibility of a condition assessment technology for small diameter metal pipelines, and has requested a proposal from a vendor. The contract for small diameter pipeline condition assessment was approved at the March 12, 2025 Board meeting. The condition assessment was attempted on June 16-17, 2025 but was not successful. Staff sent ten AC pipe samples collected in conjunction with routine work for wall thickness measurement in February 2025. The wall thickness measurements were received in April 2025 and were reviewed by Staff and the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. No immediate pipeline replacements were suggested by the data. The Consultants report was received in June 2025 and was reviewed by staff. MWDOC completed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May 2025. No mainline leaks were found. Permanent pressure transient monitoring at the pump stations and other strategic locations was installed in June 2025.

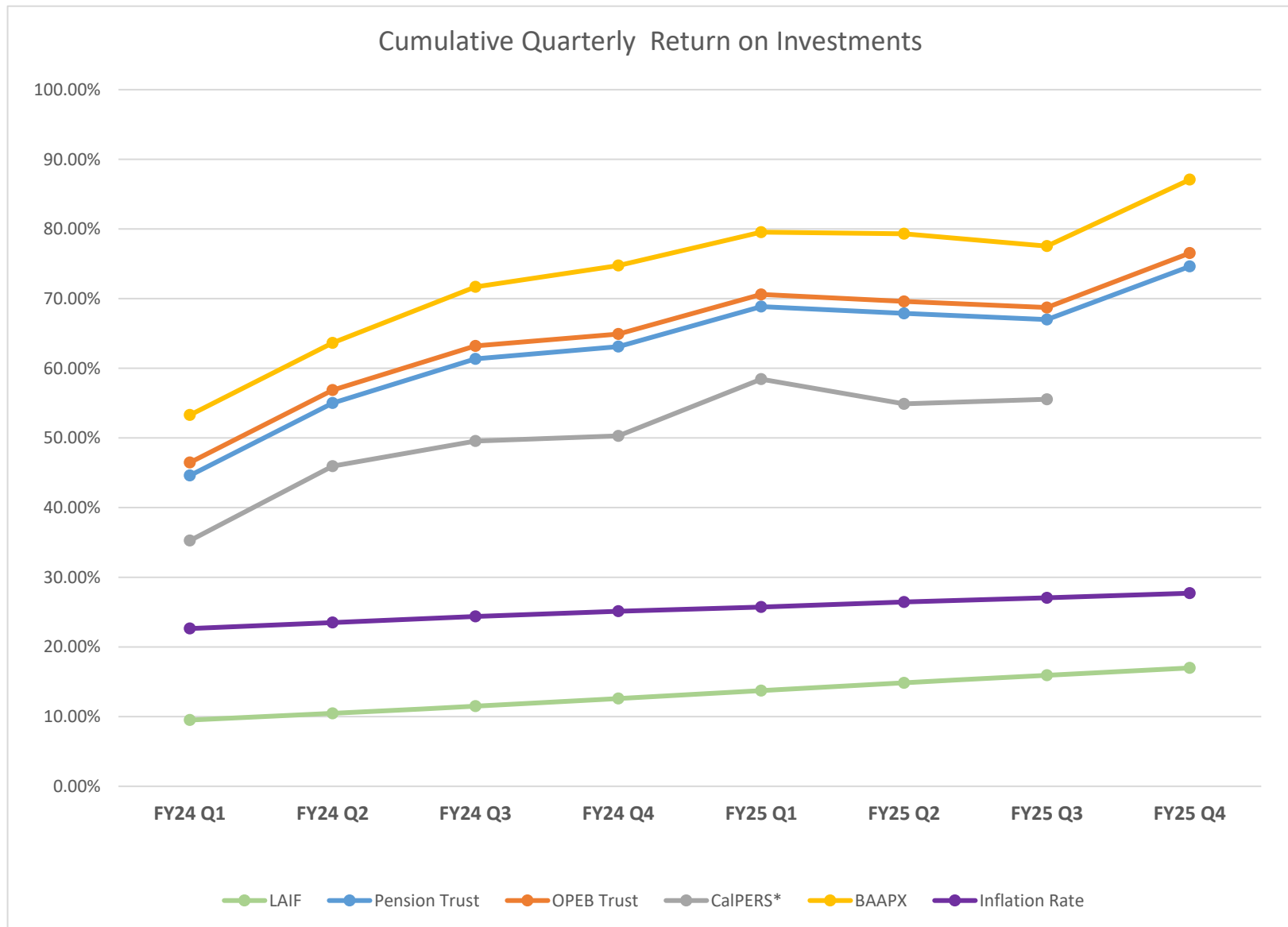

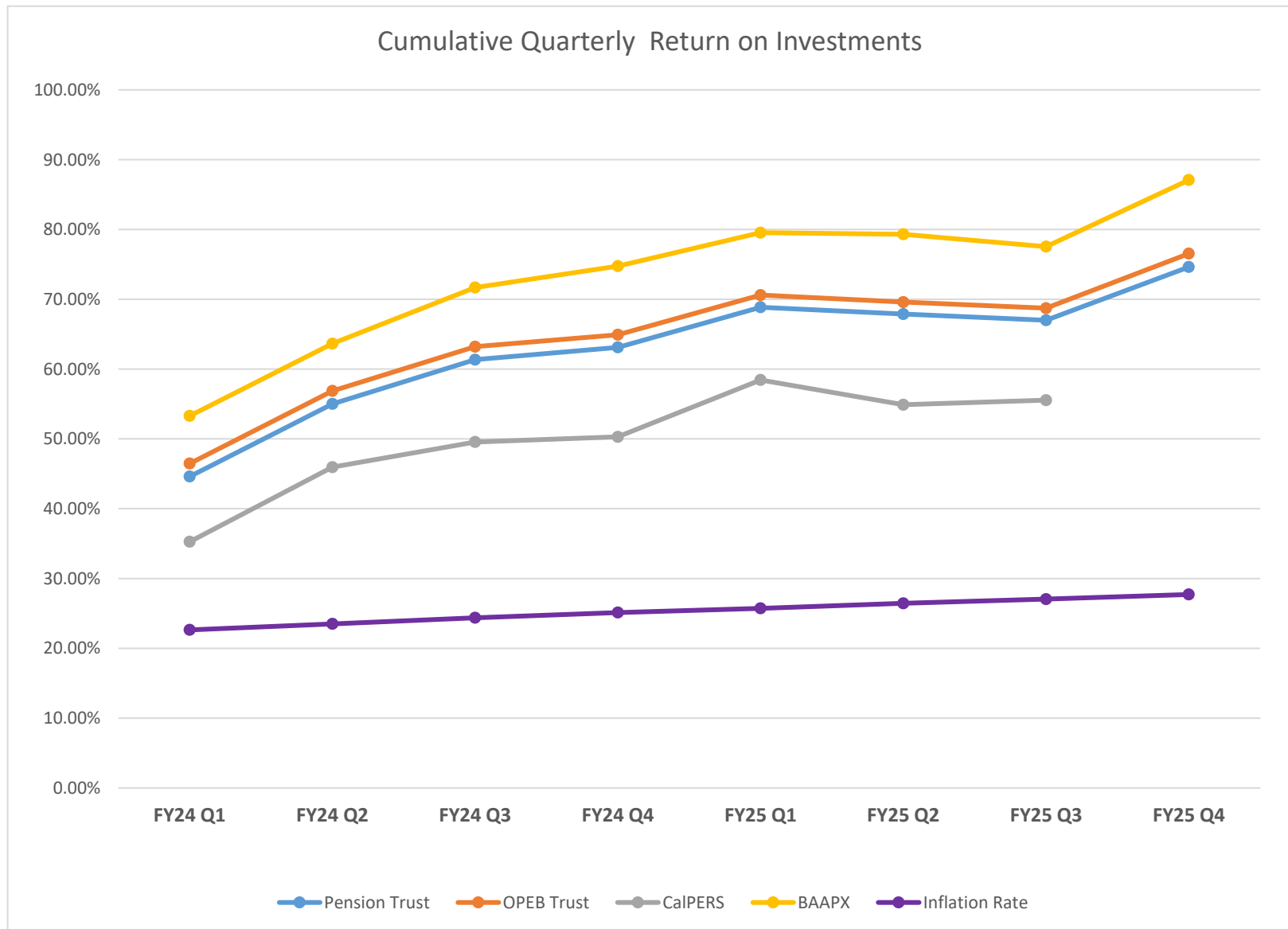

The Board of Directors reviewed this item at its July 9, 2025 meeting and accepted the Report on Mesa Water District's Water Quality relative to the 2025 Public Health Goals.

STRATEGIC PLAN

Goal #1: Provide an abundant, local, reliable and safe water supply.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION/DISCUSSION

At its June 28, 2022 Committee meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) reviewed and accepted the Report on Mesa Water District's Water Quality relative to the 2022 Public Health Goals.

At its July 13, 2022 meeting, the Board held a Public Hearing regarding the District's 2022 Public Health Goals and received the filed report.

At its July 9, 2025 meeting, the Board reviewed and accepted the Report on Mesa Water District's Water Quality relative to the 2025 Public Health Goals.

Since first mandated in 1998, Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) has received and filed a Public Health Goals report every three years.

BACKGROUND

Mesa Water provides safe, potable drinking water to the 110,000 customers within its service area. As a public water purveyor, Mesa Water must comply with all drinking water regulations set forth by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and the California State Water Resources Control Board Division of Drinking Water (DDW).



Mesa Water:

- Meets all state and federal drinking water standards
- Performs over 30,000 water quality analyses per year
- Has never had an exceedance of drinking water standards for any chemical constituent
- Publishes water quality data annually in the Consumer Confidence Report

DISCUSSION

Mesa Water's 2025 Public Health Goals Report shows that the District complies with all health-based drinking water standards and Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs). No additional measures are recommended to achieve compliance.

Drinking water compliance is based upon state and federal MCLs developed and adopted by the USEPA or DDW.

Senate Bill (SB) 1307 (Calderon-Sher; effective 01/01/97) added new provisions to the California Health and Safety Code which mandate that a Public Health Goals (PHG) report be prepared by July 1, 1998, and every three years thereafter. The attached 2025 PHG Report is intended to provide information to the public in addition to the annual Consumer Confidence Report that is made available online to customers each year.

California Health and Safety Code Section 116365 requires the State to develop a PHG for every contaminant with a primary drinking water standard or for any contaminant California is proposing to regulate with a primary drinking water standard. A PHG is the level which poses no significant health risk if consumed for a lifetime. A PHG is developed using a risk assessment based strictly on human health considerations.

The 2025 PHG Report compares Mesa Water's drinking water quality with PHGs adopted by California Environmental Protection Agency's Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) and with the maximum contaminant level goals (MCLGs) adopted by the USEPA. The report also provides a cost estimate to treat each constituent to below the PHG. PHGs and MCLGs are not enforceable standards and no action to meet them is mandated. Mesa Water is in full compliance with all drinking water regulations.

The law requires that a Public Hearing be held for the purpose of accepting and responding to public comment on the report. Prior to the date of the public hearing, Mesa Water is required to place an advertisement once a week for two weeks, each published with at least five days intervening between publication dates, in a local newspaper announcing the public hearing.

Staff placed legal advertisements announcing the July 23, 2025 public hearing in the *Daily Pilot* on Thursday, July 10, 2025 and Thursday, July 17, 2025. The same notice was posted on the District's website and kiosk; and at Costa Mesa City Hall. The Public Hearing is scheduled for the July 23, 2025 Board meeting.



FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2026, \$13,000 is budgeted for preparing the Public Health Goals Report and advertising the Public Hearing.

1 Introduction

California Health and Safety Code §116470(b) requires California public water systems with more than 10,000 service connections to prepare a publicly available report every three years addressing the following:

- (a) detection of any contaminant in drinking water at a level exceeding its respective public health goal (PHG),
- (b) discussion of public health risks associated with the detected PHG contaminants,
- (c) description of best available technology for reducing the concentration of the detected contaminants, and
- (d) aggregate cost estimates for using the technologies identified in part (c) to bring drinking water levels below the PHG.

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) is a public water system with approximately 24,475 service connections serving 110,000 people. This document serves as the 2025 PHG Report for Mesa Water and has been prepared to address the requirements from the California Health and Safety Code (§116470), based on water quality analyses for samples collected during calendar years 2022 through 2024.

2 Background Information

2.1 PHGs, MCLs, and MCLGs

PHGs are developed by the California Environmental Protection Agency's Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) for every contaminant with a primary drinking water standard or any contaminant the State is proposing to regulate with a primary drinking water standard, as required under California Health and Safety Code §116365. Each PHG is defined as the level where the drinking water contaminant does not pose any significant risk to human health. This level is based on risk assessments prepared by OEHHA that consider the most current principles, practices, and methods used by experienced public health professionals. PHGs are recommended, non-enforceable targets and public water systems are not required to achieve these levels in the drinking water supplied to customers. Where OEHHA has not adopted a PHG for a constituent, the established maximum contaminant level goal (MCLG) adopted by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) is reported instead.

The State Water Resources Control Board Division of Drinking Water (DDW) considers PHGs when revising or developing a maximum contaminant level (MCL) for drinking water contaminants. The MCL is an enforceable regulatory limit defined as the highest level of a

contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as closely as is technically and economically feasible to the PHGs. DDW is required to take treatment technologies and the cost of compliance into account when establishing an MCL. Each MCL is reviewed at least once every five years.

2.2 Water Quality Data

Mesa Water uses local groundwater supplies as the primary source of drinking water. Seven wells pump water from the local clear-water basin. An additional two wells pump from a deeper, amber-colored water basin, and this water is treated with nanofiltration technology at the Mesa Water Reliability Facility (MWRF) before it enters the distribution system. Import water from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (Metropolitan) provided by the Municipal Water District of Orange County is used as an emergency backup water supply for Mesa Water.

This report is based on water quality analyses performed during calendar years 2022, 2023, and 2024 for Mesa Water's source waters and drinking water system. The water quality data is also summarized in Mesa Water's Water Quality Reports (also known as Consumer Confidence Reports) for 2023 through 2025, which were available to customers by July 1st of each year.

2.3 Best Available Technologies (BATs) and Cost Estimates

USEPA and DDW adopt what are known as best available technologies, or BATs, which are the best-known methods of reducing contaminant levels to the MCL. Because PHGs and MCLGs are typically set lower than the MCL, determining the type of treatment that is needed to further reduce a contaminant to the PHG or MCLG is not always possible or feasible. An example is when the PHG or MCLG are below the existing detection limit for the purpose of reporting (DLR), which is the statutory level at which a constituent can be measured for a drinking water. Estimating costs to further reduce a constituent below a detectable level is difficult, if not impossible, because it is not possible to verify this reduction by analytical means. Installing treatment technologies to further reduce low levels of one constituent may, in some cases, have adverse effects on other aspects of water quality. As such, the cost estimates used in this report do not account for these unintended consequences and are highly speculative and theoretical. These cost estimates only account for treating to the MCL. The ability to treat to the PHG / MCLG is unknown.

2.4 Reporting Guidelines

The Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) formed a workgroup to prepare suggested guidelines for water utilities to use in preparing PHG reports. The 2025 ACWA guidelines, which include annualized capital and operational and maintenance (O&M) treatment cost estimates for BATs indexed to 2024 costs, were used in preparation of this report. OEHHA has provided health risk information for PHG reports, which includes health risk categories and numerical health risks based on lifetime exposure for each contaminant with a PHG.

3 Contaminants Exceeding PHGs or MCLGs

This section covers the requirements set forth by Sections 116470(b)(1) through 116470(b)(5) of the California Health and Safety Code. This includes a discussion of the following:

- (1) Identification of each contaminant detected in drinking water that exceeds the PHG,
- (2) Disclosure of the numerical public health risks determined by OEHHA associated with the MCL and PHG of each detected contaminant,
- (3) Identification of the category of risk to public health for each detected contaminant,
- (4) Description of any commercially available BATs to remove or reduce the concentration of the contaminants to a level at or below the PHG,
- (5) Estimate of the aggregate cost and cost per connection of utilizing the BATs.

The following subsections discuss contaminants that were detected at one or more locations within the Mesa Water drinking water system at levels that exceeded the applicable PHGs or MCLGs. This information is summarized in Table A at the end of this report.

3.1 Arsenic

Arsenic is a naturally occurring element present in rocks and sediments. It can enter drinking water through natural deposits or as a result of industrial activities. The PHG for arsenic is 0.004 micrograms per liter ($\mu\text{g/L}$), which is significantly below the current DLR defined by DDW for arsenic at 2 $\mu\text{g/L}$. Arsenic was measured above the PHG at four of Mesa Water's groundwater wells. The concentration of arsenic from all impacted wells ranged from non-detect (ND) to 3.0 $\mu\text{g/L}$. All of these values are well below the MCL of 10 $\mu\text{g/L}$.

The health risk category for arsenic is carcinogenicity, meaning it is a substance capable of causing cancer. The numerical health risk associated with the PHG is 1 excess case of cancer in 1,000,000 people (1×10^{-6}). The risk associated with the MCL is 2.5 excess cases of cancer in 1,000 people (2.5×10^{-3}).

The BATs for removal of arsenic to levels at or below the MCL include activated alumina, coagulation/filtration, granular ferric oxide resin, ion exchange (IX), lime softening, oxidation/filtration, and reverse osmosis (RO). IX was used to estimate the cost to reduce arsenic concentrations to below the PHG (effectively, below the DLR of 2 $\mu\text{g/L}$ based on DDW-approved methods) in the four local groundwater wells with detections above the PHG, however there is no information available to indicate that any of the BAT methods can reduce arsenic concentrations to this level. Numerous factors may influence the actual cost of reducing arsenic to the PHG including efforts to establish that these technologies could treat to the low levels of the PHG. Without accounting for these efforts, the total estimated cost to reduce arsenic levels in all clearwater wells, based on the average well water production during 2022 through 2024, is \$12,010,000 per year, or \$490 per service connection per year.

3.2 Bromate

Bromate is a byproduct of drinking water disinfection processes, formed when water containing naturally occurring bromide ions react with ozone. The PHG for bromate is 0.1 $\mu\text{g/L}$, and the

DLR is 1 µg/L. Bromate was measured above the PHG in treated surface water from Metropolitan. The running annual average bromate concentrations in Metropolitan's water ranged from below the DLR (ND) to 2.4 µg/L. This is well below the 10 µg/L MCL for bromate.

The health risk category for bromate is carcinogenicity. The numerical health risk associated with the PHG is 1 excess case of cancer in 1,000,000 people (1×10^{-6}). The risk associated with the MCL is 1 excess case of cancer in 10,000 people (1×10^{-4}).

Bromate is a disinfection byproduct that can be formed with ozonation of water containing bromide. The imported water supplied from Metropolitan is treated with ozonation, and the most cost-effective means of reducing the bromate levels below the PHG (effectively, below the DLR of 1 µg/L based on DDW-approved methods) is likely through improved control of the ozone treatment process to further limit bromate formation. Once formed, the BATs for removal of bromate in water include coagulation/filtration optimization, granular activated carbon (GAC), and RO. If Mesa Water were to use import water and target bromate from the emergency connections maintained for accessing import water, high-cost RO treatment could be implemented from a single import water location. Consistent with PHG reporting guidelines, the cost estimate for reducing bromate is based on the use from the current period, which reflects testing at the emergency turnouts only. As such, the total estimated cost based on the maximum annual imported volume for the 2022-2024 period, ranges from \$9,700 to \$18,400 per year, or \$0.40 to \$0.75 per service connection per year. Numerous factors may influence the actual cost of reducing bromate levels to the PHG, particularly the need to provide on-demand treatment for multiple emergency import water connections. These recommended BATs are also only proven to reduce bromate levels to the MCL and not the PHG which limits the accuracy of the given cost estimates.

3.3 Gross Alpha Particle Activity (Gross Alpha)

Radionuclides are naturally occurring elements that can be found in natural deposits and have unstable nuclei that spontaneously decay, releasing radiation. Gross alpha is a measure of the overall radioactivity in water attributed to alpha particles. OEHHA has not established a PHG for gross alpha, concluding in its 2003 review that a PHG was not practical. The MCLG is zero, the DLR is 3 picocuries per liter (pCi/L), and the MCL is 15 pCi/L. Of eighteen measurements analyzed from 2022 through 2024, only one well was detected at a concentration of 3.58 pCi/L, which is well below the MCL.

The health risk category for gross alpha is carcinogenicity. The numerical health risk associated with an MCLG of zero is zero. The health risk associated with the MCL is 1 excess case of cancer in 1,000 people (1×10^{-3}).

The BAT to treat gross alpha is RO, but this will be expensive to implement at a single groundwater well location. Since RO will also remove other radionuclides and contaminants, the cost of implementing this treatment in a centralized facility is discussed in Section 3.6.

3.4 Gross Beta Particle Activity (Gross Beta)

Gross beta is a measure of the overall radioactivity in water attributed to a total 168 individual beta particles and photon emitters. OEHHA has not established a PHG for gross beta, concluding in its 2003 review that a PHG was not practical. The MCLG is zero, the DLR is 4 pCi/L, and the MCL is 4 mrem/year (millirem per year). OEHHA has determined a level of 50 pCi/L to be equivalent to the MCL. Gross beta was measured above the PHG in treated surface water from Metropolitan. The gross beta concentration in Metropolitan's water ranged from below the DLR (ND) to 6 pCi/L, with all values well below the MCL.

The health risk category for gross beta is carcinogenicity. The numerical health risk associated with an MCLG of zero is zero. The health risk associated with the MCL is 2 excess cases of cancer in 1,000 people (2×10^{-3}).

The BATs for removal of gross beta in water are IX and RO. Numerous factors may influence the actual costs of reducing gross beta levels to the MCLG of zero (effectively, below the DLR of 4 pCi/L based on DDW-approved methods). The total estimated cost of reducing gross beta levels using IX is \$10,900 per year or \$0.45 per service connection per year, which only accounts for treating to the MCL. As discussed in Section 3.2, this treatment is assumed to be limited to a single location and would thus require limiting the use of emergency import water supplies to a single turnout. The costs to reduce gross beta using RO in a centralized facility, which will also reduce other contaminant concentrations, is discussed in Section 3.6.

3.5 Hexavalent Chromium

Hexavalent chromium (CrVI) is a naturally occurring heavy metal that has been used in industrial applications. While the trivalent form of chromium is nontoxic, the hexavalent form has demonstrated carcinogenicity and toxicity upon the liver. CrVI has a MCL of 10 µg/L, PHG of 0.02 µg/L, and DLR of 0.1 µg/L. CrVI was detected in nine wells with concentration levels ranging from ND (below the DLR) to 0.77 µg/L. These values are significantly lower than the 10 µg/L MCL for CrVI.

The health risk for CrVI is carcinogenicity. The numerical health risk associated with the PHG of 0.02 µg/L is 1 excess case of cancer in 1,000,000 people (1×10^{-6}). The health risk associated with the MCL is 5 excess cases of cancer in 10,000 people (5×10^{-4}).

The BATs for removal of CrVI to 1 µg/L in water are reduction/coagulation/filtration and IX (weak base anion (WBA) resin). The total estimated cost of reducing CrVI levels in all groundwater wells (i.e., clear and amber water wells) using IX is \$12,760,000 to \$53,360,000 per year or \$520 to \$2,200 per service connection per year. Current BATs can only treat to the MCL, which is already met despite being detected above the PHG. Numerous factors may influence the actual costs of reducing CrVI levels to the PHG (effectively, below the DLR of 0.1 µg/L based on DDW-approved methods), including efforts to prove the BAT could treat to below the DLR.

3.6 Uranium

Uranium is a naturally occurring radionuclide in natural deposits that is introduced into drinking water through erosion. The PHG for uranium is 0.43 pCi/L, and the DLR is 1 pCi/L. Uranium was measured above the PHG at two of Mesa Water's groundwater wells. The concentration of uranium at these wells ranged from 1.08 to 1.78 pCi/L. Uranium was also detected in treated surface water purchased from Metropolitan at a range of ND to 2 pCi/L. These values are well below the MCL of 20 pCi/L.

The health risk category for uranium is carcinogenicity. The theoretical health risk associated with the PHG is 1 excess case of cancer in 1,000,000 (1×10^{-6}). The health risk associated with the MCL is 5 excess cases of cancer in 100,000 people (5×10^{-5}).

The BAT for removal of uranium in water is RO. Since uranium is present in both local groundwater and import water, centralized treatment would likely be required. This form of treatment would also reduce the concentrations of contaminants identified in Sections 3.1 to 3.5. The estimated cost to reduce all identified contaminant levels using reverse osmosis, based on the maximum annual total water production of all groundwater wells and potential use of import water, ranges from \$15,500,000 to \$24,300,000 per year, or \$635 to \$995 per service connection per year. This cost estimate does not include construction of pipelines that would be necessary to connect the impacted sources (wells and import water connections) supplying a centralized facility.

4 Recommendations for Further Action

Drinking water delivered by Mesa Water meets or exceeds all state and federal drinking water standards set to protect public health. To further reduce the levels of the constituents identified in this report, all of which are well below the health-based MCL, additional costly treatment processes would be required. The effectiveness of the identified best-available treatment processes to provide any significant reductions at beyond these low levels is uncertain and may not realistically be possible. The health protection benefits of these hypothetical reductions are unclear and may not be quantifiable. Therefore, no further action is proposed.

RECOMMENDATION

STRATEGIC PLAN

Goal #1: Provide an abundant, local, reliable and safe water supply.
Goal #2: Perpetually renew and improve our infrastructure.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION

At its March 23, 2021 Committee meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) approved the proposed recommendations for the Water Supply, Energy, and Supply Chain Reliability Assessment as identified in the Executive Summary and Technical Memorandums 1, 2, and 3, and directed staff to implement them as part of the Capital Improvement Program Renewal (CIPR).

At its October 26, 2021 Committee meeting, the Board received a presentation regarding the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project.

At its June 28, 2023 meeting, the Board approved the reduction of scope for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project to remove the Reservoir 2 Pump Station conversion from natural gas engine driven pumps to electrically driven pumps.

At its November 8, 2023 meeting, the Board awarded a contract to Pacific Hydrotech Corporation (Pacific Hydrotech) for \$14,764,900 and a 10% contingency of \$1,476,490 for a total amount not to exceed \$16,241,390 for the construction of the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project, directed staff to negotiate a contract end date, and authorized execution of the contract.

Since April 2024, the Board has received a quarterly update on the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project.

At its July 10, 2024 meeting, the Board awarded a contract to Lee + Ro, Inc. for \$271,500 and a 10% contingency of \$27,150 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$298,650 to provide Engineering Services During Construction for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project.

At its June 25, 2025 meeting, the Board awarded a contract to Black & Veatch Corporation for an amount not to exceed \$552,359 to provide Construction Management and Inspection Services for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project, and authorized execution of the contract.

BACKGROUND

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) delivers abundant, local, reliable and safe potable water to its ratepayers using nine groundwater wells and two storage reservoirs, each with a pump station. Constant pressure in the distribution system is supplied by the groundwater well pumps, with the reservoirs and associated pump stations serving to balance flow and pressure with demand. The reservoirs also provide a total of 28 million gallons of storage that can be used during peak demands, maintenance events, or firefighting. However, water quality issues have limited the amount of water that can be reliably stored. Additionally, the current reservoir pump stations utilize natural gas engines to drive the main pumps and electric motors for the smaller jockey pumps that manage low flow requirements. These gas engines are near the end of their useful life and require replacement. In 2020, a Water Supply, Energy, and Supply Chain Reliability Assessment was completed which recommended replacing the gas engines with electric motors and diesel generator back-up power. The recommendation was based on the standardization of pump drive and backup technologies with the clear wells.

The purpose of the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project is to improve overall system reliability and streamline operations and maintenance. The following components were included in the scope of work for the project:

- Replacement of natural gas engine driven pumps with electric motor driven pumps at Reservoir 1
- Replacement of propane backup systems with standby diesel generators at Reservoir 1
- Demolition of hydro turbines at Reservoir 1
- Comprehensive rehabilitation of pumping systems piping, valves and instrumentation at Reservoir 1
- Replacement of electrical gear to support new electrical systems at Reservoir 1
- Upgrade of Southern California Edison (SCE) services for both reservoir sites
- Upgrade of selected structures and maintenance facilities
- Replacement of existing slurry dewatering pit at Reservoir 1
- Addition of two new electric motor driven jockey pumps at Reservoir 2
- Incorporation of new chemical facilities at both reservoirs

DISCUSSION

In November 2023, the Board awarded a contract to Pacific Hydrotech for the construction of the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project. Since the last quarterly update, Pacific Hydrotech has continued to work at both Reservoir 1 and Reservoir 2. At Reservoir 1, Pacific Hydrotech has completed the Yard demolition and has made substantial progress on the scope of work in the Yard. The Dewatering Pit is substantially complete and is in operation. The foundation for the Heavy Equipment Port has been poured and is cured. The prefabricated building structural steel arrived in April and was anchored to the foundation. Construction of the building fire-rated panels was relocated to avoid unexpected tariffs. The building panels are scheduled to arrive in August 2025. The Reservoir 1 Management System concrete containment areas and equipment pads have been poured and cured. The storage tanks are delayed and now expected to arrive in September 2025 and be set. Neither of these delayed items are on the construction schedule.

critical path, and the overall schedule for Reservoir 1 did not change. The Permit to Construct and Operate the generators was received, and Pacific Hydrotech set the generators in June 2025.

At Reservoir 2, Pacific Hydrotech has poured and completed the coating of the concrete for the Reservoir Management System. The storage tanks are delayed and expected to arrive later in July 2025. This delayed start up of the Reservoir Management System to September 2025. Pacific Hydrotech completed installation of electrical duct banks and power for the sample pump in Reservoir 2.

Prior to beginning work, Mesa Water's construction outreach consultant canvassed the neighborhoods surrounding both Reservoirs 1 and 2. To date, no calls or complaints have been received regarding the construction.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

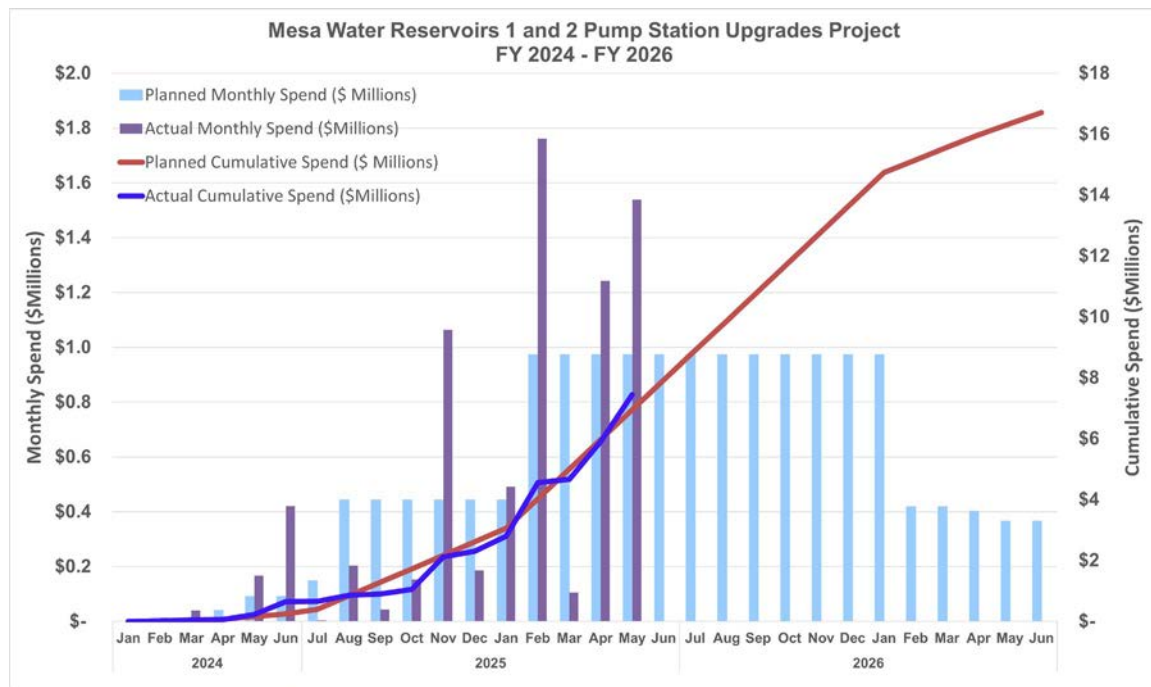


Figure 1. Planned Monthly Expenditures vs. Actual Monthly Expenditures

The Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project is scheduled to be constructed from Fiscal Year 2024 to Fiscal Year 2026. A summary of the project's construction phase planned monthly expenditures versus actual monthly expenditures is shown in Figure 1.

DISCUSSION

Mesa Water District's (Mesa Water®) outreach program aims to connect Mesa Water with its constituents to achieve Goal #4 of the Board of Directors' (Board) Strategic Plan. Outreach activities include educating and informing the District's constituents about Mesa Water, water issues and water in general.

In Fiscal Year 2025, staff focused on enhancing its Public Affairs program to increase awareness with customers about who their water provider is, that Mesa Water delivers a 100% local water supply, and that all water indoors gets captured, recycled and put back into our drinking water system.

The opening of the Mesa Water Education Center has allowed for new outreach opportunities — staff implemented the Mesa Water Education Center field trip and tours program, which has elevated the reach of Mesa Water and its mission. Staff continued to leverage and improve the New Customer Welcome Program and 25-Year Anniversary program, engaged in various community events, hosted Mesa Water Education Center Grand Opening events and earned media placements on timely topics. Staff used owned communication channels (social media, Mesa Water Notify and *News on Tap*), to continue amplifying key messages to the District's customers.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2026, \$1,139,850 is budgeted for Public Affairs Support Services; no funds have been spent to date.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION

At its March 19, 2024 meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) approved funding a study and authorized up to fifty percent of \$150,000 to further investigate providing the City of Huntington Beach with groundwater.

DISCUSSION

In October 2024, Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) and the City of Huntington Beach entered into a Cooperative Agreement to evaluate the opportunity to improve regional water supply reliability and resiliency through an Interagency Water Transfer Study.

In May 2025, Mesa Water issued a public Request for Proposals (RFP) via PlanetBids. In response to the RFP, three proposals were received in June 2025. A staff Selection Panel, comprised of Mesa Water and City of Huntington Beach staff, evaluated proposals based on firm qualifications, experience, scope understanding, responsiveness and overall proposal quality. The results of the evaluation and each cost proposal are as follows:

Rank	Proposer	Total Proposal Cost	Score
1	HDR Engineering, Inc.	\$151,600	93
2	MKN & Associates, Inc.	\$78,821	85
3	Hoch Consulting	\$200,003	81

All three firms demonstrated strong qualifications and a clear understanding of the scope of work. While HDR Engineering, Inc. received the highest technical score, MKN & Associates, Inc. (MKN)



submitted a comprehensive and responsive proposal at a lower cost, providing the best overall value to Mesa Water.

MKN brings relevant recent experience with Mesa Water, including an active Interagency Water Transfer Feasibility Study with Mesa Water and the City of Newport Beach. This existing engagement gives MKN a thorough understanding of Mesa Water's system and operations, which will reduce project effort and ensure consistency across studies. MKN's team also brings a track record of completing over 19 interconnection evaluations.

For these reasons — combined with the strong cost savings — staff recommends the Board award a contract to MKN & Associates, Inc. for \$78,821 and a 10% contingency of \$7,882 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$86,703 to perform the Huntington Beach Interagency Water Transfers Feasibility Study.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2026, \$75,000 is budgeted for the Huntington Beach Interagency Water Transfers Feasibility Study. The City of Huntington Beach has also committed up to \$75,000 for this study. This partnership results in a combined project budget of \$150,000.

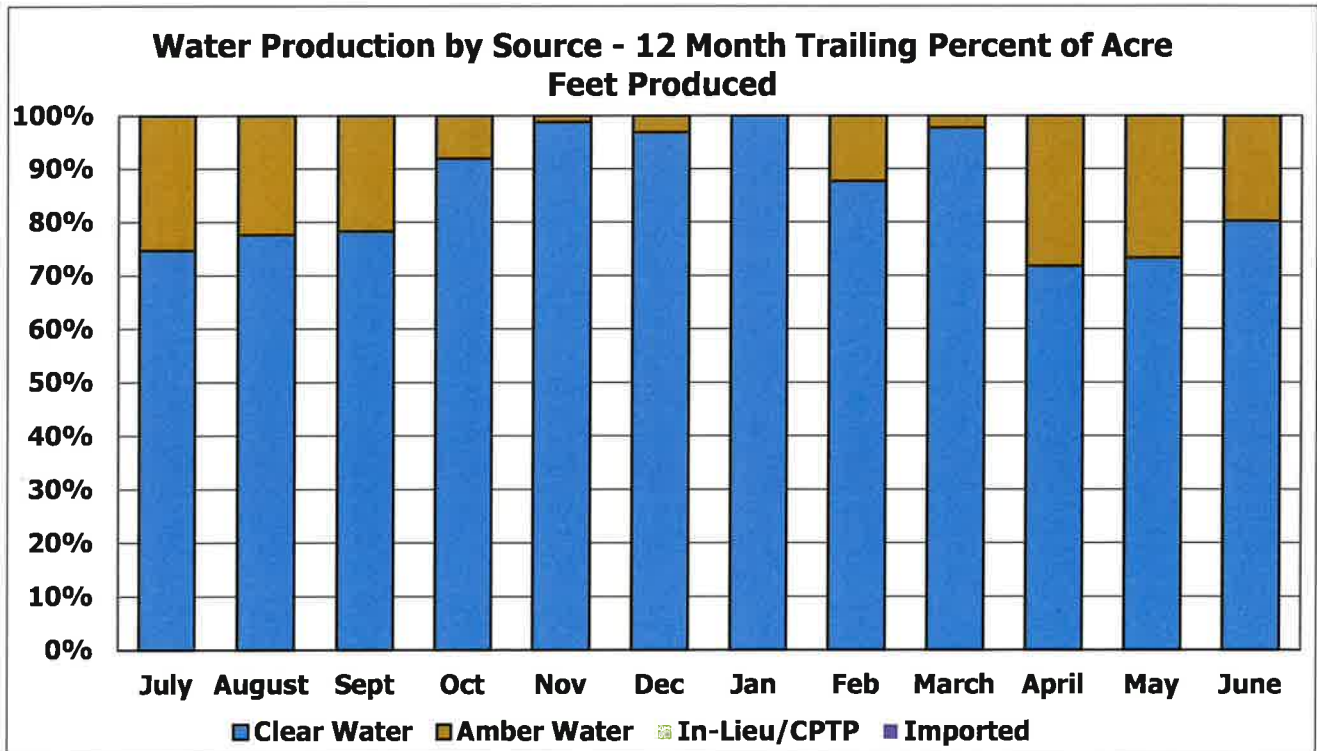

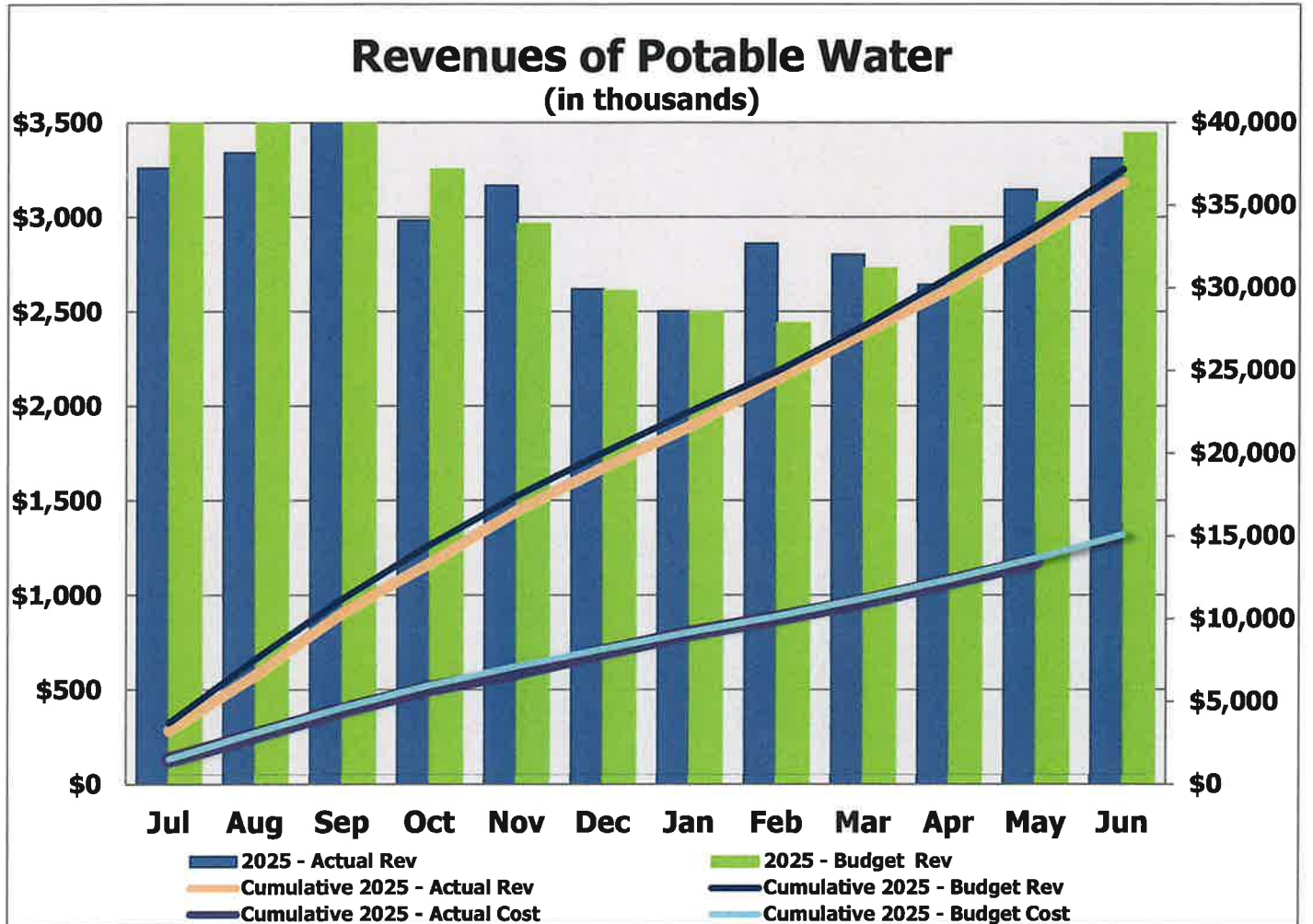

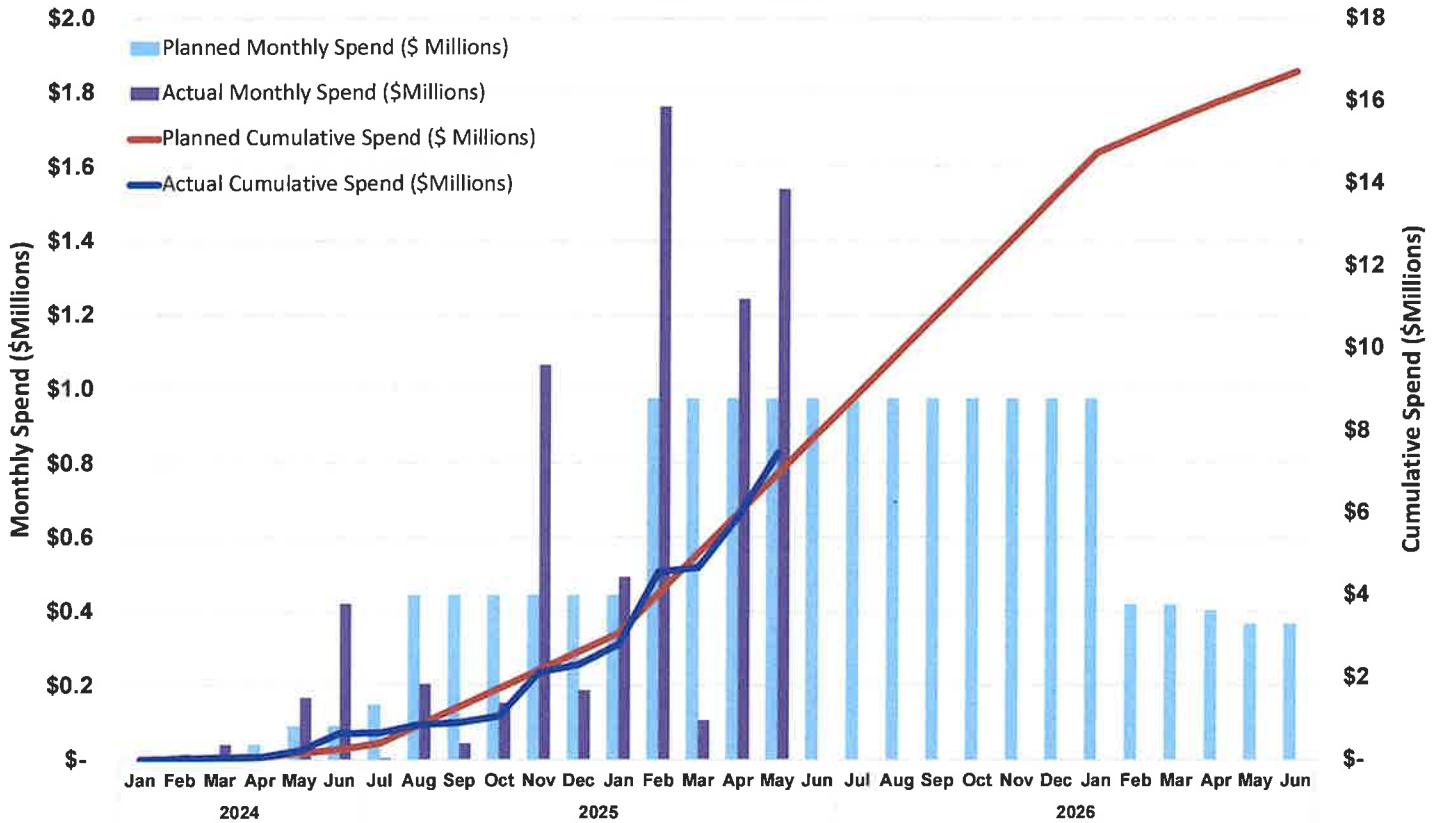

One Big Beautiful Bill Act Passes Into Law

On July 4th, the One Big Beautiful Bill Act ([H.R.1](#)) was enacted into law. After overcoming significant opposition and obstacles within the Republican caucus, the House of Representatives passed the \$3.4 trillion tax-and-spending package on Thursday, July 3rd. The House stayed in session overnight as Speaker Johnson and President Trump negotiated with roughly two dozen Republican lawmakers with various concerns and reservations about the legislation after changes were made in the Senate. In the end, the bill passed 218-214, with Congressman Thomas Massie (R-KY) and Congressman Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA) being the only House Republicans to vote against the bill. Before final passage, Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY) spoke out about the harms of the bill for a record-breaking 8+ hours, using his “magic minute” floor speech to delay a final vote on the legislation. Earlier in the week, the Senate GOP overcame similar obstacles, with Senators passing the bill on Tuesday after the Senate pulled its own all-night voting session. Ultimately, the Senate passed the bill in a 51-50 vote, with Vice President JD Vance breaking the tie. Senator Lisa Murkowski’s (R-AK) support, which came after hours of negotiation with Majority Leader John Thune, was also critical to its passage. Three Republican lawmakers, Senators Rand Paul (R-KY), Thom Tillis (R-NC) and Susan Collins (R-ME), voted against the bill along with every Senate Democrat.

The nearly 900-page reconciliation bill has vast impacts across policy areas and industries, including border security, taxes, healthcare, education, defense, energy, and the debt ceiling. Additionally, the bill includes \$1 billion for the Department of the Interior to construct or expand Bureau of Reclamation water storage and conveyance facilities. More information, particularly related to the tax provisions, was shared with Mesa Water on July 3rd and July 7th.

PFAS National Drinking Water Standard Act of 2025 Introduced

On June 26th, Rep. Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA) and Rep. Debbie Dingell (D-MI) introduced a bipartisan piece of legislation entitled the “PFAS National Drinking Water Standard Act of 2025” ([H.R.4168](#)). If passed, the bill will codify the Environmental Protection Agency’s (EPA) national primary drinking water regulation for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) which establishes enforceable maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for six PFAS chemicals in public drinking water systems. Fitzpatrick states “by giving this rule the full force of federal law, the bill ensures these standards remain durable, enforceable, and insulated from future regulatory uncertainty or reversal.”

EPA Requests Another 45 Days to Release PFAS Polluter Decision

On July 3rd, Justice Department attorneys representing the EPA filed a motion asking for 45 more days to decide on an approach to holding PFAS polluters responsible for cleanup, being the fourth extension requested. Although the agency's previous announcement labeled water utilities as "passive receivers" of the chemicals, the agency's plans to ensure PFAS removal costs are the responsibility of the polluters, not utilities or ratepayers, are anticipated to be announced in the Fall. Following the EPA's announcement in April to extend the time limit given to water utilities to meet PFOA and PFOS requirements, a final rule regarding what extent other PFAS will be regulated will also be released in the Fall.

PERMIT Act Passes House T&I Committee

On June 25th, the House Transportation and Infrastructure (T&I) Committee passed the Promoting Efficient Review for Modern Infrastructure Today (PERMIT) Act ([H.R.3898](#)) out of the committee. The bill was passed with a vote of 34-30, receiving no support from the Democratic side, and may soon be considered by the full House. Comprised of more than 15 separate pieces of legislation previously introduced by T&I Committee members, the bill aims to "provide targeted, common-sense reforms that will strengthen the permitting process for permit seekers and holders, while providing clearer instruction and standards for permitting agencies." Specifically, the bill would extend NPDES permit conditions from 5 years to 10 years, clarify the State and federal relationship on the issuance of State water quality certifications for federal projects, limit the ability of the EPA to withdraw Army Corps of Engineers permits under section 404 of the Clean Water Act, and clarify that certain waterbodies, including wastewater treatment systems, are not considered waters of the United States (WOTUS).

WIPPES Act Passes out of the House of Representatives

On June 23rd, the Wastewater Infrastructure Pollution Prevention and Environmental Safety (WIPPES) Act ([H.R.2269](#)) passed the House. If enacted, the bill will require manufacturers of various wipes and related products to include a "Do Not Flush" label on packaging. The bipartisan legislation has the support from industry and nonprofit groups, and supporters of the bill attest that it will protect taxpayer dollars and infrastructure. On May 21st, the Senate companion version of the bill, ([S.1092](#)), passed the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation. VSA will keep Mesa Water District apprised with information as the bill moves forward.

Reclamation Explores New Water Sources in Lower Colorado River Basin

The Bureau of Reclamation and stakeholders in the Colorado River Basin are exploring partnerships to develop new water sources, such as the Mojave Groundwater Bank, to enhance drought resiliency in the Lower Colorado River Basin. Acting Assistant Secretary for Water and Science Scott Cameron stated, "projects like the Mojave Groundwater Bank are in early development and, if realized, have the potential to significantly expand our options." The purpose of the exploration is to support long-term water sustainability for over 40 million people, agricultural lands, and Tribal Nations amid ongoing drought and as current Colorado River agreements near expiration in 2026.

Army Corps of Engineers Proposes to Renew and Revise Nationwide Permits

On June 16th, the Army Corps of Engineers [announced](#) a proposal to renew and revise 56 of 57 nationwide permits regulated by Section 404 of the CWA and/or section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899. The Corps has chosen not to reissue one nationwide permit authorizing activities associated with finfish mariculture and will propose to issue one new nationwide permit pertaining to authorizing activities to facilitate fish passage. The purpose is to update, streamline, and ensure that these permits continue to authorize only activities with minimal environmental impact; the current permits are set to expire on March 14th, 2026, and the Corps is seeking public input before finalizing the new set.

California High Speed Rail Authority Responds to Grant Terminations

On June 4th, the Trump Administration expressed the desire to pull back \$4 billion in federal funding for California's high speed rail system project. Concerns surrounding the viability of the project arose after the discovery that tracks have not yet been laid following the proposal of the rail in 2008. The project, designed to provide connections to cities from Los Angeles and San Francisco, has received about a quarter of its funding thus far from the federal government with the rest coming from State bonds and other sources. The federal government has estimated that, so far, \$6.9 billion has been invested into the project from federal funds. With an original goal of opening in 2020, the project is now estimated to cost more than \$100 billion.

In February, the Department of Transportation directed the Federal Railroad Administration to investigate and provide a report of the California High-Speed Rail Authority's (CHSRA) use of the funding. [The report](#), released on June 4th, has ignited further concerns regarding the viability of the project. Finding that certain elements required for the project have not yet been procured, there is little optimism surrounding the project's ability to meet partial functionality by 2033, which is an agreement within the awarding of the already-received federal grants.

On June 11th, the California High Speed Rail Authority (CHSRA) sent a [letter](#) to the Acting Administrator of the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA), Drew Feeley. The letter contested the Administration's termination of \$4 billion in federal grants, stating it "is unwarranted and unjustified" and claiming the FRA's report, which was used to justify the cancellation, "distorts data that the Authority has furnished to FRA, cites to reports that do not support its conclusions, and employs opaque and disingenuous methodologies." The CHSRA disputes the report's claims that minimal progress has been made to advance construction, stating much of the initial infrastructure has been constructed and citing a total of fifty-three structures and sixty-nine miles of guideway that have been completed.

The report mentioned above, proposed termination of the grants based on the following conclusions: "the early operating segment (EOS) between Merced and Bakersfield is unlikely to be completed by 2033, the CHSRA lacks a plan to fund the Project, and the Authority has missed a project milestone to execute a contract for procurement of trainsets." Although, CHSRA states the FRA issued a monitoring report in October 2024 which concluded there were no "significant

findings that would impact project compliance or completion with the terms and conditions of the cooperative agreements.”

Once the Administration’s cancellation of the grants is finalized, California Attorney General Rob Bonta is expected to file a lawsuit. VSA will keep Mesa Water District apprised as more information becomes available.

Trump Administration Nominates Katherine Scarlett for Chair of the White House CEQ

On June 16th, Trump nominated Katherine Scarlett to serve as chair of the White House’s environmental office. Scarlett, who is currently serving as chief of staff at the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ), has been acting as the council’s leader during the Administration’s early push to hasten how the government conducts environmental reviews for energy projects under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

Scarlett’s nomination will be considered by the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee, where Scarlett previously served as a staffer to the panel’s top Republican, Sen. Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV). If confirmed by the Senate, Scarlett will be leading the office that earlier this year moved to modify existing rules governing how agencies conduct reviews under NEPA. Industry representatives and many public agencies welcome the overhauls as a way to speed the construction of infrastructure projects, while environmentalists say the changes are an assault on the nation’s bedrock environmental law. Prior to her work in Capito’s office, Scarlett worked at CEQ in the first Trump Administration, when she served as special assistant to the chair and deputy associate director for infrastructure. She also worked as chief of staff to the Federal Permitting Improvement Steering Council.

Administration Nominates Ted Cooke for Reclamation Commissioner

On June 16th, Trump nominated Ted Cooke to be the next Commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation. Cooke spent more than two decades at the Central Arizona Project (CAP), the State’s largest water delivery agency, which distributes Colorado River water to Maricopa, Pinal, and Pima counties. Before joining CAP as its assistant general manager for finance, Cooke spent nearly 20 years leading the Central Arizona Project Conservation District Insurance Co., a subsidiary charged with all of the agency’s insurance needs, including property, health care and risk management. Cooke currently serves as a board member of the Water Infrastructure Finance Authority of Arizona. The independent public agency administers various federal and State-funded programs, focused on the construction, rehabilitation, acquisition, and improvement of water infrastructure throughout Arizona.

Cooke’s nomination comes as the seven Colorado River Basin States are locked in negotiations about a new long-term operating plan for the drought-stricken waterway. More than two decades of drought in the region have already led to repeated cuts in water allocations. Negotiations over the Colorado River’s future have stalled as the States argue over how to share the pain of any future cuts, both among the entire seven-State region and within the Upper and Lower basins.

SUPPORT

Water Conservation Rebate Tax Parity Act ([H.R.1871](#), [S.857](#)) Rep. Jared Huffman (D-CA), Sen. John Curtis (R-UT)

Status: House - 03/05/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Senate - 03/05/2025 Referred to the Committee on Finance.

Summary: This legislation will amend federal tax law to ensure homeowners do not have to pay income tax when they receive rebates from water utilities for water conservation and water runoff management improvements.

Special District Fairness & Accessibility Act ([H.R.2766](#)) Rep. Pat Fallon (R-TX)

Status: House - 04/09/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform.

Summary: The bill would require special districts to be recognized as local government and be eligible for federal funding.

WATCH

Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny (REINS) Act ([H.R. 142](#)) Rep. Kat Cammack (R-FL)

Status: House - 01/03/2025 Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary, and in addition to the Committees on Rules, and the Budget

Summary: This bill will aim to increase accountability and transparency in the federal regulatory process by requiring that any new "major rule" proposed by federal agencies receive approval from both the House and Senate before taking effect.

To eliminate federal funding for the failed California High-Speed Rail project ([H.R. 213](#)) Rep. Kevin Kiley (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/07/2025 Referred to the House Subcommittee on Railroads, Pipelines, and Hazardous Materials.

Summary: This bill will prohibit the use of Federal financial assistance for the California High-Speed Rail development project in the State of California.

Colorado River Basin System Conservation Extension Act ([H.R. 231](#)) Rep. Harriet Hageman (R-WY)

Status: House - 02/12/2025 Ordered to be Reported (Amended) by Unanimous Consent.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Colorado River System Conservation Pilot Program through fiscal year 2026.

Preserving Choice in Vehicle Purchase Act ([H.R.346](#)) Rep. John Joyce (R-PA)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will block the U.S. Environmental Agency from giving California a waiver to "limit the sale or use of new motor vehicles with internal combustion engines." It would do so by modifying the waiver process under the Clean Air Act related to state emission control standards for new motor vehicles.

Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Environmental Protection Agency relating to "National Primary Drinking Water Regulations for Lead and Copper: Improvements (LCRI) ([H.J. Res. 18](#)) Rep. Gary Palmer (R-AL)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This joint resolution nullifies the rule titled National Primary Drinking Water Regulations for Lead and Copper: Improvements (LCRI), which was submitted by the Environmental Protection Agency on October 30, 2024.

Every Drop Counts Act ([H.R. 338](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources

Summary: This bill will expand the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's Small Storage Program by making it easier for groundwater projects to qualify for funding, increase the amount of water they can store, and stabilize underground aquifers.

Fix Our Forests Act ([H.R.471](#), [S.1462](#)) Rep. Bruce Westerman (R-AR), Sen. John Curtis (R-UT)

Status: House – 01/23/2025 Passed in house 279 - 141

Senate - 03/06/2025 Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry Subcommittee on Conservation, Forestry, Natural Resources, and Biotechnology. Hearings held.

Summary: The bill simplifies and expedites environmental reviews for forest management projects, promotes federal, state, tribal, and local collaboration, and deters frivolous litigation that delays essential projects.

Stop the Delta Tunnel Act ([H.R.1311](#)) Rep. Josh Harder (D-CA)

Status: House - 02/13/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill would prohibit the Army Corps of Engineers from issuing a federal permit necessary for the State of California to build the Delta Conveyance Project, commonly known as the Delta Tunnel.

Headwaters Protection Act of 2025 ([H.R.605](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA)

Status: House - 02/28/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Conservation, Research, and Biotechnology

Summary: The bill reauthorizes the Water Source Protection Program (WSPP) at \$30 million annually from 2024-2028, expands the list of eligible lands and entities, lowers the non-federal match requirement for smaller private sector companies, and reduces bureaucratic hurdles for existing Watershed Restoration Action Plans.

Colorado River Basin System Conservation Extension Act ([S.154](#)) Sen. John Hickenlooper (D-CO)

Status: Senate – 06/16/2025 Passed in Senate.

House – 06/23/2025 Held at the desk.

Summary: This bill will amend the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, to reauthorize the Colorado River System conservation pilot program.

Improving Atmospheric River Forecasts Act ([S.322](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate – 01/29/2025 Referred to Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation

Summary: This bill will require the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to establish a forecast improvement program within the National Weather Service.

Wildfire Emergency Act of 2025 ([S.350](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/30/2025 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of Agriculture to select and implement these projects, focusing on reducing the threat of destructive wildfires and assisting communities in increasing their resilience.

Lower Colorado River Multi-Species Conservation Program Amendment Act of 2025 ([H.R.831](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/31/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will establish an interest-bearing account for the non-Federal contributions to the Lower Colorado River Multi-Species Conservation Program. This will ensure that state contributions to conservation projects in the Lower Colorado River Basin are able to earn interest and grow before being allocated.

Emergency Wildfire Fighting Technology Act ([H.R.836](#)) Rep. David Valadao (R-CA)

Status: House – 02/05/2025 Passed in House

Senate - 02/06/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: The bill will require the U.S. Forest Service and the Department of the Interior to jointly evaluate the use of the Container Aerial Firefighting System to mitigate and suppress wildfires

Disaster Resiliency and Coverage Act of 2025 ([H.R.1105](#)) Rep. Mike Thompson (D-CA)

Status: House - 02/06/2025 Referred to the Committee on Ways and Means, and in addition to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

Summary: This bill will provide homeowners in disaster-prone regions with broad incentives to harden their properties against wildfires and other risks.

Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act ([H.R.1267](#)) Rep. Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D-WA)

Status: House - 02/12/2025 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce, and the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

Summary: This bill exempts specified water management entities from liability under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 (CERCLA) for releases of certain perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly referred to as PFAS.

Aquatic Biodiversity Preservation Act of 2025 ([H.R. 1332](#)) Rep. Dave Min (D-CA)

Status: House - 02/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will establish a program within the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to collect data on at-risk, aquatic species.

Midnight Rules Relief Act ([H.R.77](#), [S.164](#)) Rep. Andy Biggs (R-AZ), Sen. Ron Johnson (R-WI)

Status: House – 02/12/2025 Passed in House by the Yeas and Nays: 212 - 208

Senate - 02/13/2025 Referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs

Summary: This bill will allow lawmakers to roll back multiple federal regulations in one Congressional Review Act resolution, as currently CRA resolutions can only address one rule at a time.

Coastal Commission Accountability Act ([H.R. 1874](#)) Rep. Kevin Kiley (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/05/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will amend the Coastal Zone Management Act (CZMA) to expedite important coastal activities, including national security initiatives, critical infrastructure development, and disaster mitigation and recovery efforts.

Federally Integrated Species Health (FISH) Act ([H.R.1894](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/06/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will eliminate the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Fisheries' oversight role in regulating salmon and other fish under the Endangered Species Act and designate the Fish and Wildlife Life Service (FWS) as the sole regulatory authority.

To amend the Federal Water Pollution Control Act with respect to permitting terms ([H.R.2093](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/14/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

Summary: This bill will extend National Pollution Discharge Elimination System permits from 5 years to 10 years.

Protect the West Act of 2025 ([S.670](#)/[H.R.1459](#)) Sen. Michael Bennet (D-CO), Rep. Jason Crow (D-CO)

Status: Senate - 02/20/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

House - 03/20/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Conservation, Research, and Biotechnology

Summary: This bill will provide an investment of \$60 billion to establish an Outdoor Restoration Fund for restoration and resilience projects across the West.

Wildfire Emergency Act ([S.350](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/30/2025 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will reduce the risk of wildfires in forests by increasing landscape-scale forest and restoration projects.

Preventing Our Next Natural Disaster Act ([H.R.403](#)) Rep. Eric Swalwell (D-CA)

Status: House - 01/15/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Economic Development, Public Buildings, and Emergency Management

Summary: The bill will modify the Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant program to increase FEMA's Disaster Relief fund and increases funding accessibility for community planning, environmental justice communities, and impoverished communities.

Ending Major Borderland Environmental Ruin from Wildfires (EMBER) Act ([H.R.2026](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 04/04/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Forestry and Horticulture.

Summary: The bill will ensure better assessment, prevention, and help for communities to manage wildfires. It focuses on modernizing wildfire policies, bolstering resilience, and enhancing restoration efforts.

Endangered Species Act (ESA) Amendments Act ([H.R.1897](#)) Rep. Bruce Westerman (R-AR)

Status: House - 03/25/2025 Subcommittee on Water, Wildlife and Fisheries Hearings Held

Summary: This bill will amend the Endangered Species Act of 1973 to improve conservation of resources and wildlife, protect endangered species, and streamline permitting.

Urban Waters Federal Partnership Act ([H.R.2401](#)) Rep. Greg Stanton (D-AZ)

Status: House - 03/27/2025 Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and to the Committees on Natural Resources, and Appropriations.

Summary: This bill will formally authorize the Urban Waters Federal Partnership Program, which supports improvements to waterways and urban renewal.

Water Intelligence, Security, and Cyber (Water ISAC) Threat Protection Act ([H.R. 2344/S. 1118](#)) Rep. Jan Schakowsky (D-IL) and Sen. Ed Markey (D-MA)

Status: House - 03/25/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Senate - 03/25/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will increase drinking water and wastewater system threat preparedness and resilience by directing the EPA to establish a program to offset costs to water systems and increase support.

Providing for congressional disapproval of a rule published by the Fish and Wildlife Service relating to “Endangered and Threatened Wildlife and Plants” ([H.J.Res.78](#)) Rep. Doug LaMalfa (R-CA)

Status: House - 05/01/2025 Passed with a voice vote of 216 - 195

Senate - 05/05/2025 Received in the Senate.

Summary: This bill provides congressional disapproval for a rule from the Fish and Wildlife Service which lists the San Francisco Bay-Delta distinct population segment (DPS) of longfin smelt as an endangered species under the Endangered Species Act

Water Risk and Resilience Reorganization ([H.R.2594](#)) Rep. Eric Crawford (R-AR)

Status: House - 04/02/2025 Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and to the Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will establish a Water Risk and Resilience Organization to support modifications and implementation for water systems to meet risk and resilience requirements.

Forest Service Accountability Act ([H.R.1762](#), [S.1061](#)) Rep. Ryan Zinke (R-MT), Sen. Mike Lee (R-UT)

Status: House - 03/28/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Forestry and Horticulture.

Senate - 03/13/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry

Summary: This bill will make the Chief of the Forest Service a Presidentially appointed position

Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act ([H.R.22](#)) Rep. Chip Roy (R-TX)

Status: House – 04/10/2025 Passed by the Yeas and Nays: 220 – 208

Senate - 04/10/2025 Received in the Senate

Summary: This bill will amend the National Voter Registration Act of 1993 to require people provide proof of citizenship when registering to vote in a federal election. The documents for proof of citizenship include a passport, REAL ID, birth certificate, or a military ID.

Restoring WIFIA Eligibility Act ([H.R.3035](#), [S.1760](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA), Sen. John Curtis (R-UT)

Status: House - 04/28/2025 Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and the Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Senate - 05/14/2025 Referred to the Committee on the Budget.

Summary: This bill would amend the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act of 2014 (WIFIA) to clarify that federally-owned infrastructure projects managed by non-federal entities are eligible for WIFIA funding.

Help Hoover Dam Act ([S.1570](#)) Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV)

Status: Senate - 05/01/2025 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This legislation will preserve Hoover Dam as an affordable energy source and strengthen the Southwest's electrical grid by giving the Bureau of Reclamation the authority to use "stranded funds" currently in the Colorado River Dam Fund to pay for operation, maintenance, and replacement projects at Hoover Dam.

Investing In Our Communities Act ([H.R.1255](#)) Rep. David Kustoff (R-TN)

Status: House - 02/12/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will restore tax-exempt advance refunding for municipal bonds so state and local governments can more efficiently invest in projects throughout their communities.

Technical Fix for the State Response to Contaminants Program ([S.1324](#)) Sen. Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH)

Status: Senate - 04/08/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will provide flexibility for states to use funding from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law for PFAS in small and disadvantaged communities to assist private well owners.

Wastewater Infrastructure Pollution Prevention and Environmental Safety (WIPPES) Act ([S.1092](#)/[H.R.2269](#)) Sen. Jeff Merkley (D-OR), Rep. Lisa McClain (R-MI)

Status: Senate - 05/21/2025 Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation. Ordered to House – 06/23/2025 Passed the House by voice vote.

Summary: This bill will require products with significant potential to be flushed to be labeled with "Do Not Flush" notices to protect pipe infrastructure.

Modification of the Aquifer Recharge Flexibility Act ([H.R.331](#), [S.1254](#)) Rep. Russ Fulcher

Status: House – 05/13/2025 Passed the House.

Senate - 05/14/2025 Received in the Senate and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will allow holders of existing right-of-way grants to use them for aquifer recharge without needing additional authorization from the Secretary of the Interior.

To provide technical and financial assistance for groundwater recharge, aquifer storage, and water source substitution projects ([H.R.337](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will modify the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act to allow unobligated funds for groundwater recharge projects, aquifer storage and recovery projects, and water source substitution for aquifer protection projects.

Agriculture Export Promotion Act of 2025 ([H.R.1086](#)) Rep. Dan Newhouse (R-WA)

Status: House - 02/06/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Agriculture.

Summary: This bill will extend and increase funding for the Market Access Program (MAP) and Foreign Market Development (FMD) Program through Fiscal Year 2029.

Fair Access to Agriculture Disaster Programs Act ([H.R.2156](#)/[S.984](#)) Rep. Jimmy Panetta (D-CA), Sen. Alex Padilla

Status: House - 04/04/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on General Farm Commodities, Risk Management, and Credit.

Senate - 03/12/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: This bill will expand eligibility for USDA disaster assistance programs by waiving gross income limitations.

Advancing Water Reuse Act ([H.R.2940](#)) Rep. Darin LaHood (R-IL)

Status: House - 04/17/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will catalyze the use of recycled water by manufacturers, data centers, and other industrial entities.

Disaster Related Extension of Deadlines Act ([H.R.1491](#)/[S.1438](#)) Rep. Gregory Murphy (R-NC), Sen. Raphael Warnock (D-GA)

Status: House – 04/01/2025 Passed the House.

Senate – 04/10/2025 Referred to the Committee on Finance.

Summary: This bill will ensure that natural disaster victims have sufficient time to claim tax refunds and credits, even when their filing deadlines are extended due to a disaster.

Proven Forest Management Act of 2025 ([H.R.179](#)) Rep. Tom McClintock (R-CA)

Status: House - 04/04/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Forestry and Horticulture.

Summary: This bill will expand forest management practices that have proven successful in reducing wildfire risks and promoting forest health, improving forest resiliency.

Filing Relief for Natural Disasters Act ([H.R.517](#)/[S.132](#)) Rep. David Kustoff (R-TN), Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV)

Status: House – 03/31/2025 Passed the House.

Senate – 07/10/2025 Passed the Senate

Summary: This bill will grant the IRS the authority to postpone federal tax filing deadlines for taxpayers affected by state-declared disasters and states of emergency.

FEMA Independence Act ([H.R. 2308](#)) Rep. Jared Moskowitz (D-FL)

Status: House - 03/24/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Emergency Management and Technology.

Summary: This bill will remove FEMA from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and restore it as an independent, Cabinet-level agency.

Water Affordability, Transparency, Equity, and Reliability (WATER) Act of 2023 ([S.1730](#)) Sen. Bernard Sanders (I-VT)

Status: Senate - 05/13/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: The legislation would assist communities in securing access to clean and reliable drinking water. The bill also contains provisions to combat PFAS and provide grants for low-income communities struggling with unaffordable water bills.

Veterans Exposed to Toxic PFAS Act ([H.R.3639](#)) Rep. Michael Lawler

Status: House - 05/29/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs.

Summary: This bill provides eligibility for Department of Veterans Affairs hospital care and medical services to veterans and their family members (including those in utero) who have specified conditions and resided at a military installation where individuals were exposed to perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly known as PFAS. PFAS are manufactured and may have adverse human health effects.

PFAS National Drinking Water Standard Act of 2025 ([H.R.4168](#)) Rep. Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA)

Status: House - 06/26/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will codify the EPA's final PFAS National Primary Drinking Water Regulation, establishing enforceable maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for six of the most hazardous PFAS chemicals, including PFOA and PFOS, in public drinking water systems.

SUPPORT (if/when introduced in the 119th Congress)

Low-Income Household Assistance Water Program (LIHWAP) Establishment Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The bill would direct the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to make permanent the Low-Income Household Assistance Water Program (LIHWAP). The bill would allow HHS to award grants to eligible entities to provide funds to public water systems to assist low-income households in paying for drinking water or wastewater services.

Water Efficiency, Conservation, and Sustainability Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would create programs at the EPA for states, municipalities, and utilities for water improvement program, a water loss control program, and a program to adopt and implement water-efficient plumbing codes.

Support to Rehydrate the Environment, Agriculture, and Municipalities Act (STREAM) Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would expedite non-federal storage projects with less than \$250 million in federal funding, water recycling, and desalination projects by allowing the Department of the Interior to approve the projects. This provision is needed following the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act's expiration in December 2021. Absent this provision, Congress must individually authorize all water recycling, desalination, and storage projects,

with the exception of projects that receive construction funding under the bipartisan infrastructure legislation.

Reclamation Climate Change and Water Program Reauthorization Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The bill would reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation's Climate Change and Water Program which will expire at the end of 2023.

Desalination Research Advancement Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation's Desalination and Water Purification Research (DWPR) Program, which funds projects to improve water supply development from seawater, brackish groundwater, and wastewater.

WATCH (if/when introduced in the 119th Congress)

The Healthy Drinking Water Affordability Act (Healthy H2O Act)

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The bill would provide grants through the U.S. Department of Agriculture for water quality testing and to purchase and install point-of-entry water filtration systems to remove contaminants from drinking water.

Clean Water Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would clarify "protected water resources" under the Clean Water Act and would reinstate protections on 50% of wetlands and 70% of rivers that lost protection under the *Sackett v. EPA Hearing*.

PFAS Accountability Act of 2024

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill establishes requirements and incentives to limit the use of perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly referred to as PFAS, and remediate PFAS in the environment. The bill directs the EPA to designate the PFAS perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) as a hazardous substance under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980, thereby requiring remediation of releases of those PFAS into the environment.

Water Access Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would appropriate \$500 million to LIHWAP under sec. 2912 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, for fiscal year 2024.

Canal Conveyance Capacity Restoration Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would authorize a one-third federal cost share for restoring canal capacity. Additionally, the bill would authorize over \$833 million for restoration efforts at the Friant-Kern Canal, Delta Mendota Canal, California Aqueduct, and San Joaquin River.

Flood Prevention and Snowpack Management Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation would create a task force to monitor California snowpack and flood mitigation. The task force would be established by the Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers, and led by representatives in Congress and Federal agencies.

Working to Advance Tangible and Effective Reforms (WATER) for California Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would require the Central Valley Project and State Water Project promote more water deliveries to farmers under a 2019 Trump-era biological opinion. This legislation would also reauthorize the surface water storage project program and operations of the Central Valley and State Water Projects created in the WIIN Act.

Water Supply Permitting Coordination Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation would establish a framework for federal agencies that hold permitting authority to coordinate reservoir construction work and make public the construction schedules, data, and technical materials to prevent delays and create more water supply.

Protect Our Water Rights Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: To mandate contract water deliveries of the Central Valley Project and Klamath River Basin Reclamation Project by the Bureau of Reclamation in normal precipitation years and guarantee additional water in dry years.

Water Quality and Environmental Innovation Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: To authorize the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency to award grants and contracts for projects that use emerging technologies to address threats to water quality.

California Water Infrastructure Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would assist in expediting U.S. Bureau of Reclamation water projects by accepting alternative environmental reviews conducted under state laws, such as the California Environmental Quality Act, in place of federal reviews under the National Environmental Policy Act.

Open Access Evapotranspiration Data Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would create a program within the Department of the Interior to share public data on estimates of evapotranspiration from satellites and weather stations with water managers

Providing for congressional disapproval relating to "Revised Definition of 'Waters of the United States'"

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A joint resolution providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Department of the Army, Corps of Engineers, Department of Defense, and the Environmental Protection Agency relating to "Revised Definition of 'Waters of the United States'"

Clean Water Allotment Modernization Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A bill to revamp the 36-year-old formula used by the federal government to allocate the clean water state revolving fund allocation among states. It would require the Environmental Protection Agency to regularly update how funding allocations are based.

Wildfire Response and Drought Resiliency Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A legislative package that includes over 40 bills that would authorize billions of dollars in federal funding for the Departments of Interior and Agriculture for implementation of forest management, water, and climate programs. It would also expand federal disaster relief assistance and research efforts on effects of wildfire on public health, and programs to improve water efficiency and conservation in tribal and low-income communities.

Controlling America's Perilous Spending (CAPS) Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would amend the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 to extend the discretionary spending limits through fiscal year 2032.

Priority for Water Supply and Conservation Act of 2024

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would include water supply and water conservation as a primary mission of the Corps of Engineers in planning, designing, constructing, modifying, operating, and maintaining water resources development projects.

Clean Water SRF Parity Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A bill to expand the state revolving fund established under the Clean Water Act, including by allowing low-interest loans to be given to privately owned treatment works to address wastewater. Currently, loans are given to wastewater systems that are publicly owned.

PFAS Action Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: To require the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency to designate per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980.

Drought Resilience Infrastructure Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation will provide new resources and authorities through the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to support communities experiencing long-term drought conditions.

Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act Amendments

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A bill to update and improve a loan program that funds critical water and wastewater infrastructure projects in Washington State

Drought Relief Obtained Using Government Help Today (DROUGHT) Act of 2024

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation will increase the federal share of Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act loans from 80 percent to 90 percent for qualified disadvantaged communities experiencing severe drought.

Large-Scale Water Recycling Reauthorization and Investment Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation aims to reauthorize a water recycling grant program for large-scale projects in California and other western states. The bill builds on the success of water recycling projects funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, providing additional funding opportunities to boost existing projects and initiate new ones.

Subject: July 2025 Monthly Report

Governor Gavin Newsom and lawmakers passed the California State Budget on June 27, 2025. The Governor signed Senate Bill 101 (SB 101) which allocates approximately \$324.7 billion in total spending—including \$231.9 billion from the General Fund—and addresses a roughly \$12 billion deficit through a mix of borrowing, reductions, and fund shifts.

Specific to water, California Advocates, ACWA, and several other water agencies lobbied to restore over \$320 million for the Healthy Rivers and Landscapes program. This included advocacy to the Speaker's Office, Pro Tem, and the Governor's Office. Ultimately the coalition was successful, and the funding was fully restored. While funding for the HRL was restored, notably, the bills did not address the Governor's Delta Conveyance Streamlining Proposal. Delta Conveyance could still be addressed in follow-up budget bills in the coming weeks or through the regular legislative process by the end of the summer.

With the bulk of the budget negotiations largely done, the legislature has now returned focus to policy committees where legislation must be moved out of committees by July 18.

Key Bills

AB 1413 (Papan) Sustainable Groundwater Management Act: Groundwater Adjudication

AB 1413 by Assemblymember Papan, seeks to streamline the process for Groundwater Adjudications. The bill would require a validation action brought against a Groundwater Sustainability Plan to be brought within 180 days of adoption, and any other action challenging an action of a Groundwater Sustainability Agency (GSA) to be brought within 90 days of that action. The bill would also limit a court's authority to establish a safe yield or sustainable yield for the basin that exceeds the sustainable yield of established in the GSP.

Several organizations including ACWA, Cal Chamber, and Western Growers have adopted oppose-unless-amended positions on the bill and are actively lobbying legislators.

Status: The bill will be heard the Senate Judiciary Committee on July 15.

SB 72 (Caballero-D) The California Water Plan: long-term supply targets.

SB 72 is being co-sponsored by the California Municipal Utilities Association, California State Association of Counties, and the California Council for Environmental and Economic Balance. This bill is a reintroduction of SB 366 (Caballero) from 2024. The bill would require DWR to establish an interim

planning target of 9,000,000 acre-feet of additional water, water conservation, or water storage capacity to be achieved by 2040. The bill would require the target to consider the identified and future water needs for a sustainable urban sector, agricultural sector, and environment, and ensure safe drinking water for all Californians, among other things.

This bill was heard in the Assembly Committee on Water, Parks, and Wildlife on July 2. The bill has little opposition, and it was passed out of the committee with a vote of 12 ayes, 0 noes, and 1 abstention.

Status: The bill now moves to the Assembly Appropriations Committee where the costs of the bill will be considered.

SB 454 (McNerney - D) State Water Resources Control Board: PFAS Mitigation Program.

Sponsored by ACWA and Cal Cities, this bill would create the PFAS Mitigation Fund in the General Fund and would authorize the fund to be expended by the State Water Resources Control Board to issue grants and/or loans for the purpose of addressing PFAS contamination. While the bill has met no opposition the State Water Board identified a cost of \$6.5 million ongoing to administer the fund. As a result, the bill was amended to not take effect until funding was identified and appropriated. The bill was heard on June 17 in the Assembly Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials Committee where it passed unanimously 7-0.

Status: The bill now moves to the Assembly Appropriations Committee where the costs of the bill will be considered.

SB 601 (Allen-D) Water Waste Discharge

The primary intent of SB 601 is to undo the May 2023 US Supreme Court ruling in Sackett v EPA which narrowed which waters fell under the Waters of the United States definition. SB 601 would also enshrine a new framework into state law for the previously federally protected waters and empowering the State Water Board to expand the scope of their regulation to “nexus waters” which are broadly defined in the bill. As a result, SB 601 could greatly expand the number of water bodies subject to water quality regulations and thus additional permitting. The full impact of SB 601 is unclear as it would depend on the State Water Board’s interpretation of the term “nexus waters.”

While the author did remove language regarding the private right of action, new language was inserted that would allow city attorneys to file lawsuits against entities that violate the provisions of SB 601. The bill was heard in the Assembly Judiciary Committee on July 1 where it passed with a vote of 8 ayes, 2 noes, and 2 abstentions.

Status: The bill will next be heard in the Assembly Committee on Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials on July 15.

SB 616 (Rubio) Community Hardening Commission: wildfire mitigation program

SB 616 would establish the Community Hardening Commission (Commission) within the Department of Insurance and an advisory council for the Commission. The Commission would be required to develop new wildfire home and community hardening standards to reduce fire risk and improve access to fire insurance, including guidelines and best practices for infrastructure improvements for water and

electrical supply to support fire suppression efforts and disaster recovery. The bill, which has an insurance focus, would allow the Commission to develop standards for water systems. ACWA, CSDA, and water agencies have adopted an oppose-unless-amended position on the bill and have requested to strike water agencies from the bill.

Status: The bill will next be heard in the Assembly Committee on Insurance on July 16.

Regulatory and Administrative Actions

Governor's Appointments

The Senate Rules Committee convened on July 9, 2025, to discuss the appointment of Chair Joaquin Esquivel and Board Member Nichole Morgan to the State Water Resources Control Board. Both members discussed their commitment to ensuring safe drinking water and to affordability. The Committee voted to send their confirmation forward to the full Senate. Their confirmations will now be heard by the full Senate later this week.

Advanced Clean Fleets

The California Air Resources Board (CARB) held a kick-off workshop on June 16 regarding the fiscal year (FY) 2025-26 Clean Transportation Incentives Funding Plan (Plan). The workshop provided information about eligible incentive projects and identify which projects may have policy changes.

PFAS Notification Levels and Response Levels

Through informal conversations, California Advocates has learned that the State Water Board intends to lower the PFAS notification level to 4 ppt and establish a new response level for PFHXS to 10 ppt. The State Water Board may adopt notification and response levels with very little public input. This change in response levels could have a significant impact on additional wells in California.

AB 794 (Gabriel D) California Safe Drinking Water Act: emergency regulations.

(Amended: 4/10/2025 [html](#) [pdf](#))

Status: 6/12/2025-Ordered to inactive file at the request of Assembly Member Gabriel.

Location: 6/12/2025-A. INACTIVE FILE

Summary: Existing law, the California Safe Drinking Water Act (state act), requires the State Water Resources Control Board to administer provisions relating to the regulation of drinking water to protect public health. The state board's duties include, but are not limited to, enforcing the federal Safe Drinking Water Act (federal act) and adopting and enforcing regulations. Existing law authorizes the state board to adopt as an emergency regulation, a regulation that is not more stringent than, and is not materially different in substance and effect than, the requirements of a regulation promulgated under the federal act, with a specified exception. This bill would provide that the authority of the state board to adopt an emergency regulation pursuant to these provisions includes the authority to adopt requirements of a specified federal regulation that was in effect on January 19, 2025, regardless of whether the requirements were repealed or amended to be less stringent. The bill would prohibit an emergency regulation adopted pursuant to these provisions from implementing less stringent drinking water standards, as provided, and would authorize the regulation to include monitoring requirements that are more stringent than the requirements of the federal regulation. The bill would prohibit maximum contaminant levels and compliance dates for maximum contaminant levels adopted as part of an emergency regulation from being more stringent than the maximum contaminant levels and compliance dates of a regulation promulgated pursuant to the federal act. The bill would require, on or before December 31, 2026, the state board to adopt an emergency regulation and to initiate a primary drinking water standard for perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, as provided. The bill would make other changes to proceedings initiated upon the adoption of an emergency regulation to establish a public health goal and primary drinking water standards, as specified.

AB 810 (Irwin D) Local government: internet websites and email addresses.

Summary: Existing law requires that a local agency that maintains an internet website for use by the public to ensure that the internet website uses a ".gov" top-level domain or a ".ca.gov" second-level domain no later than January 1, 2029. Existing law requires that a local agency that maintains public email addresses to ensure that each email address provided to its employees uses a ".gov" domain name or a ".ca.gov" domain name no later than January 1, 2029. Existing law defines "local agency" for these purposes as a city, county, or city and county. This bill would recast these provisions by instead requiring a city, county, or city and county to comply with the above-described domain requirements and by deleting the term "local agency" from the above-described provisions. The bill would also require a special district, joint powers authority, or other political subdivision to comply with similar domain requirements no later than January 1, 2031. The bill would allow a community college district or community college to use a ".edu" domain to satisfy these requirements, and would specify that these requirements do not apply to a K-12 public school district. By adding to the duties of local officials, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

SB 601

Summary: Under existing law, the State Water Resources Control Board and the 9 California regional water quality control boards regulate water quality and prescribe waste discharge requirements in accordance with the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act (act) and the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit program. Under the act, the State Water Resources Control Board is authorized to adopt water quality control plans for waters for which quality standards are required by the federal Clean Water Act, as specified, and that in the event of a conflict, those plans supersede regional water quality control plans for the same waters. This bill would authorize the state board to adopt water quality control plans for nexus waters, which the bill would define as all waters of the state that are not also navigable, except as specified. The bill would require any water quality standard that was submitted to, and approved by, or is awaiting approval by, the United States Environmental Protection Agency or the state board that applied to nexus waters as of May 24, 2023, to remain in effect, as provided. The bill would require the state board and regional boards to include nexus waters in all federal Clean Water Act processes, including, but not limited to, the California Integrated Report and the establishment of total maximum daily loads, as specified. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law, the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act, requires all groundwater basins designated as high- or medium-priority basins by the Department of Water Resources to be managed under a groundwater sustainability plan or coordinated groundwater sustainability plans, except as specified. Existing law requires the department to periodically review the groundwater sustainability plans developed by groundwater sustainability agencies pursuant to the act to evaluate whether a plan conforms with specified laws and is likely to achieve the sustainability goal for the basin covered by the plan. Existing law authorizes a groundwater sustainability agency that adopts a groundwater sustainability plan to file a court action to determine the validity of the plan no sooner than 180 days following the adoption of the plan, as provided. Existing law provides that actions by a groundwater sustainability agency are subject to judicial review, except as provided. This bill would instead authorize groundwater sustainability agencies to file those actions within 180 days following the adoption of the plan. The bill would require a legal challenge to an action or determination by the groundwater sustainability agency to be filed within 90 days of the action or determination. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law requires the State Water Resources Control Board to develop a plan for the funding and implementation of the Low-Income Water Rate Assistance Program. Existing law requires the plan to include, among other things, a description of the method for collecting moneys

to support and implement the program and a description of the method for determining the amount of moneys that may need to be collected from water ratepayers to fund the program. This bill would establish the Water Rate Assistance Program. As part of the program, the bill would establish the Water Rate Assistance Fund in the State Treasury, available upon appropriation by the Legislature, to provide water affordability assistance, for both residential water and wastewater services, to low-income residential ratepayers, as specified. The bill would require the state board to take various actions in administering the fund, including, among other things, tracking and managing revenue in the fund separately from all other revenue. The bill would require the state board, in consultation with relevant agencies and after a public hearing, to adopt guidelines for implementation of the program and to adopt an annual report to be posted on the state board's internet website identifying how the fund has performed, as specified. The bill would require the guidelines to include minimum requirements for eligible systems, including the ability to confirm eligibility for enrollment through a request for self-certification of eligibility under penalty of perjury. By expanding the crime of perjury, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill would require the state board to take various actions in administering the program, including, but not limited to, providing guidance, oversight, and funding for low-income rate assistance for residential ratepayers of eligible systems. The bill would authorize the Attorney General, at the request of the state board, to bring an action in state court to restrain the use of any method, act, or practice in violation of these provisions, except as provided. The bill would make the implementation of all of these provisions contingent upon an appropriation by the Legislature. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

This bill would require the joint powers authority to revise the wildfire mitigation program in accordance with prescribed community hardening standards and guidelines developed pursuant to the bill's provisions, as specified below. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law, the Ralph M. Brown Act, requires, with specified exceptions, that all meetings of a legislative body, as defined, of a local agency be open and public and that all persons be permitted to attend and participate. The act authorizes the legislative body of a local agency to use teleconferencing, as specified, and requires a legislative body of a local agency that elects to use teleconferencing to comply with specified requirements, including that the local agency post agendas at all teleconference locations, identify each teleconference location in the notice and agenda of the meeting or proceeding, and have each teleconference location be accessible to the public. Existing law, until January 1, 2026, authorizes the legislative body of a local agency to use alternative teleconferencing if, during the teleconference meeting, at least a quorum of the members of the legislative body participates in person from a singular physical location clearly

identified on the agenda that is open to the public and situated within the boundaries of the territory over which the local agency exercises jurisdiction, and the legislative body complies with prescribed requirements. Existing law requires a member to satisfy specified requirements to participate in a meeting remotely pursuant to these alternative teleconferencing provisions, including that specified circumstances apply. Existing law establishes limits on the number of meetings a member may participate in solely by teleconference from a remote location pursuant to these alternative teleconferencing provisions, including prohibiting such participation for more than 2 meetings per year if the legislative body regularly meets once per month or less. This bill would extend the alternative teleconferencing procedures until January 1, 2030. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law provides that mitigation banks and conservation banks provide for the conservation of important habitats and habitat linkages, take advantage of economies of scale that are often not available to individualized mitigation projects, and simplify the state regulatory compliance process while achieving conservation goals. Existing law provides that no conservation bank, mitigation bank, or conservation and mitigation bank is operative, vested, or final, nor bank credits issued, until the Department of Fish and Wildlife has approved in writing and a conservation easement has been recorded on the site. Existing law authorizes banks to issue and sell bank credits to private and public entities. Existing law defines "conservation bank" and "mitigation bank" for these purposes. This bill would expand the definition of "conservation bank" and "mitigation bank" to include marine artificial reefs. The bill would authorize a person to, after completion of a full environmental review in compliance with applicable California and federal laws and regulations, create a marine artificial reef for purposes of establishing a mitigation or conservation bank. The bill would clarify that both nonprofit and for-profit organizations are authorized to establish and operate a conservation bank, mitigation bank, or conservation and mitigation bank. The bill would provide that if a marine artificial reef is located on state sovereign land then a lease is required from the State Lands Commission, as provided. The bill would provide that the lease from the commission would satisfy the requirements for a bank enabling instrument and for the department to grant a conservation easement.

Existing law requires the department to include a discussion of various strategies in the plan update, including, but not limited to, strategies relating to the development of new water storage facilities, water

conservation, water recycling, desalination, conjunctive use, and water transfers, that may be pursued in order to meet the future needs of the state. Existing law requires the department to establish an advisory committee to assist the department in updating the plan. This bill would revise and recast certain provisions regarding The California Water Plan to, among other things, require the department to expand the membership of the advisory committee to include, among others, tribes, labor, and environmental justice interests. The bill would require the department, as part of the 2033 update to the plan, to update the interim planning target for 2050, as provided. The bill would require the target to consider the identified and future water needs for all beneficial uses, including, but not limited to, urban uses, agricultural uses, tribal uses, and the environment, and ensure safe drinking water for all Californians, among other things. The bill would require the plan to include specified components, including a discussion of the estimated costs, benefits, and impacts of any project type or action that is recommended by the department within the plan that could help achieve the water supply targets. The bill would require the department to report to the Legislature the amendments, supplements, and additions included in the updates of the plan, together with a summary of the department's conclusions and recommendations, in the session in which the updated plan is issued. The bill would also require the department to conduct public workshops to give interested parties an opportunity to comment on the plan.

Summary: Existing law authorizes a utility to bring a civil action for damages against any person who commits, authorizes, solicits, aids, abets, or attempts certain acts, including, diverting or causing to be diverted, utility services by any means whatsoever. Existing law creates a rebuttable presumption that there is violation of these provisions if, on premises controlled by the customer or by the person using or receiving the direct benefit of utility service, certain actions occur, including that there is an instrument, apparatus, or device primarily designed to be used to obtain utility service without paying the full lawful charge for the utility. This bill would add to the list of acts for which a utility may bring a civil cause of action under these circumstances to include tampering with a fire hydrant, fire hydrant meter, or fire detector check, or connecting to, diverting water from, or causing water to be diverted from, a fire hydrant without authorization from the utility that owns the fire hydrant, except as provided. The bill would also expand the rebuttable presumption for a violation of these provisions to include, among other things, if a person tampers with or uses a fire hydrant, fire hydrant meter, or fire detector check without authorization to obtain water and without paying the full lawful charge of the water. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

This bill, which would become operative upon an appropriation by the Legislature, would enact a PFAS mitigation program. As part of that program, the bill would create the PFAS Mitigation Fund in the State Treasury and would authorize certain moneys in the fund to be expended by the state board, upon appropriation by the Legislature, for specified purposes. The bill would authorize the state board to seek out and deposit nonstate, federal, and private funds, require those funds to be deposited into the PFAS Mitigation Fund, and continuously appropriate the nonstate, federal, and private funds in the fund to the state board for specified purposes. The bill would authorize the state board to establish accounts within the PFAS Mitigation Fund. The bill would authorize the state board to expend moneys from the fund in the form of a grant, loan, or contract, or to provide assistance services to water suppliers and sewer system providers, as those terms are defined, for multiple purposes, including, among other things, to

cover or reduce the costs for water suppliers associated with treating drinking water to meet the applicable state and federal maximum perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) contaminant levels. The bill would require a water supplier or sewer system provider to include a clear and definite purpose for how the funds will be used to provide public benefits to their community related to safe drinking water, recycled water, or treated wastewater in order to be eligible to receive funds. The bill would require the state board to adopt guidelines to implement these provisions, as provided.

This bill would prohibit a public water system that meets the total chromium maximum containment level (MCL) enforceable standard for drinking water in California from being held liable in any civil action brought by an individual or entity that is not a governmental agency related to hexavalent chromium in drinking water while implementing and in compliance with a state board-approved hexavalent chromium MCL compliance plan, or during the period between when it has submitted a hexavalent chromium MCL compliance plan for approval to the state board and action on the proposed compliance plan by the state board is pending, except as specified.

The bill would require the committee to meet monthly and would require recordings of its meetings to be made publicly available on the state board's internet website. The bill would require the committee to consider, and make a recommendation on, an appeal of an exemption request denial no later than 60 days after the appeal is made. The bill would require specified information relating to the committee's consideration of an appeal to be made publicly available on the state board's internet website. The bill would require the state board to consider a recommendation of the committee at a public meeting no later than 60 days after the recommendation is made.

When applying to a city or county for an initial business license, the bill would require a person who owns or operates a data center to self-certify, under penalty of perjury, on the application that the person has provided its water supplier an estimate of the expected water use. When applying to a city or county for a renewal of a business license, equivalent instrument, or permit, the bill would require a person who owns or operates a data center to self-certify, under penalty of perjury, on the application, a report of the annual water use. By expanding the crime of perjury, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. CEQA also requires a lead agency to prepare a mitigated negative declaration for a project that may have a significant effect on the environment if revisions in the project would avoid or mitigate that effect and there is no substantial evidence that the project, as revised, would have a significant effect on the environment. CEQA establishes a procedure by which a person may seek judicial review of the decision of the lead agency made pursuant to CEQA. The Jobs and Economic Improvement Through Environmental Leadership Act of 2021 authorizes the Governor, until January 1, 2032, to certify environmental leadership development projects that meet specified requirements for certain streamlining benefits related to CEQA. The act, among other things, requires a lead agency to prepare the record of proceedings for an environmental leadership development project, as provided, and to provide a specified notice within 10 days of the Governor certifying the project. The act is repealed by its own term on January 1, 2034. This bill would extend the application of the act to water storage projects, water conveyance projects, and groundwater recharge projects that provide public benefits and drought preparedness. Because a lead agency would be required to prepare the record of proceedings for water storage projects, water conveyance projects, and groundwater recharge projects pursuant to the act, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Existing law requires the governing body of a public agency, and boards and commissions designated by law or by the governing body, to give reasonable written notice, except in cases of emergency, as specified, to

each recognized employee organization affected of any ordinance, rule, resolution, or regulation directly relating to matters within the scope of representation proposed to be adopted by the governing body or the designated boards and commissions. This bill would require the governing body of a public agency, and boards and commissions designated by law or by the governing body of a public agency, to give the recognized employee organization no less than 60 days' written notice before issuing a request for proposals, request for quotes, or renewing or extending an existing contract to perform services that are within the scope of work of the job classifications represented by the recognized employee organization, subject to certain exceptions. The bill would require the notice to include specified information, including the anticipated duration of the contract. The bill would also require the public agency, if an emergency or other exigent circumstance prevents the public agency from providing the written notice described above, to provide as much advance notice as is practicable under the circumstances. If the recognized employee organization demands to meet and confer after receiving the written notice, the bill would require the public agency and recognized employee organization to meet and confer in good faith within a reasonable time, as specified. By imposing new duties on local public agencies, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law establishes, within the office of the Governor, the Office of Emergency Services (OES), under the direction of the Director of Emergency Services. Existing law charges the OES with coordinating various emergency activities within the state. The California Emergency Services Act, contingent upon an appropriation by the Legislature, requires the OES to enter into a joint powers agreement pursuant to the Joint Exercise of Powers Act with the Department of Forestry and Fire Protection to develop and administer a comprehensive wildfire mitigation program relating to structure hardening and retrofitting and prescribed fuel modification activities. Existing law authorizes the joint powers authority to establish financial assistance limits and matching funding or other recipient contribution requirements for the program, as provided. This bill, contingent on funding being appropriated pursuant to a specified bond act, would establish the Rural Water Infrastructure for Wildfire Resilience Program within the OES for the distribution of state matching funds to urban wildland interface communities, as defined, in designated high fire hazard severity zones or very high fire hazard severity zones to improve water system infrastructure, as prescribed. The bill would require the OES to work in coordination with the Department of Water Resources, the State Water Resources Control Board, the Office of the State Fire Marshal, and other state entities as the OES determines to be appropriate, to achieve the purposes of the program. The bill would require the OES to develop criteria and a scoring methodology to prioritize the distribution of state matching funds provided under the program to rural communities based upon specified criteria.

Existing law authorizes a mutual water company and a public agency to enter into a joint powers agreement for the purposes of risk pooling, as specified. This bill would authorize a water corporation, as defined, a mutual water company, and one or more public agencies to provide insurance, as specified, by a joint powers agreement. The bill would also authorize a water

corporation, a mutual water company, and one or more public agencies to enter into a joint powers agreement for the purposes of risk pooling, as specified. The bill would prohibit the Public Utilities Commission from allowing a water corporation to join a joint powers agency for insurance coverage if there are no greater benefits to the customers of the water corporation than are provided by the water corporation's current insurance policy. The bill would require the joint powers agency to be 100% reinsured with no joint and several liability, no assessments, and no financial liability attributable to the participating members, as provided. If a water corporation enters into a joint powers agreement for the purposes of risk pooling, the bill would require the water corporation to submit an annual information filing to the Public Utilities Commission and the joint powers agency, as specified. Summary: The California Endangered Species Act prohibits the taking of an endangered, threatened, or candidate species, except as specified. Under the act, the Department of Fish and Wildlife may authorize the take of listed species by certain entities through permits or memorandums of understanding for specified purposes. The act allows take by permit if, among other things, the impact of the authorized take is fully minimized and mitigated. This bill would provide that if an at-risk species, as defined, becomes listed as an endangered, threatened, or candidate species, further authorization or approval shall not be required for a take of that species, if specified conditions are met, including that the potential listing of the at-risk species was anticipated in a permit previously issued by the department for incidental take caused by a renewable electrical generation facility. The bill would authorize the department, in partnership with a permit applicant for an incidental take caused by a renewable electrical generation facility, to develop a research project that evaluates specified factors. The bill would authorize a research project reviewed and approved by the department to contribute to a renewable electrical generation project's mitigation, as provided. The bill would require the department to report to the Legislature specified information, including among other things, a report on each at-risk species authorized for take, as provided.

The act also regulates fees for development projects and fees for specific purposes, including water and sewer connection fees, among others. The act, among other things, requires local agencies to comply with various conditions when imposing fees, extractions, or charges as a condition of approval of a proposed development or development project. The act prohibits a local agency that imposes fees or charges on a residential development for the construction of public improvements or facilities from requiring the payment of those fees or charges until the date of the final inspection or the date the certificate of occupancy is issued, whichever occurs first, except for utility service fees, as provided. This bill would require a local agency to waive fees or charges that are collected by a local agency to fund the construction of public improvements or facilities for residential developments subject to a regulatory agreement with a public entity, as provided, that includes certain income and affordability requirements. The bill would exclude from this requirement those fees or charges, as applicable, for the construction or reconstruction of school facilities or that cover the cost of code enforcement, inspection services, or other fees collected to pay for the cost of enforcement of local ordinances or state law.

The bill would authorize the State Water Resources Control Board or the Attorney General, as provided, to bring an action for injunctive relief for a violation of the above-described prohibition. Existing law authorizes a local agency to finance infrastructure projects through various means, including by authorizing a city or county to establish an enhanced infrastructure financing district to finance public capital facilities or other specified projects of communitywide significance that provide significant benefits to the district or the surrounding community. This bill would require the office, upon appropriation by the Legislature, to establish the Infrastructure Gap-Fund Program to provide grants to local agencies for the development and construction of infrastructure projects, as defined, facing unforeseen costs after starting construction. The bill would authorize the office to provide funding for up to 20% of a project's additional projected cost, as defined, after the project has

started construction, subject to specified conditions, including, among other things, that the local agency has allocated existing local tax revenue for at least 45% of the initially budgeted total cost of the infrastructure project. When applying to the program, the bill would require the local agency to demonstrate challenges with completing the project on time and on budget and how the infrastructure project helps meet state and local goals, as specified. The bill would require the office to develop guidelines to implement the program that establish the criteria by which grant applications will be evaluated and funded. The bill would make these provisions operative on January 1, 2030.

Summary: The Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024, approved by the voters as Proposition 4 at the November 5, 2024, statewide general election, authorized the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$10,000,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for safe drinking water, drought, flood, and water resilience, wildfire and forest resilience, coastal resilience, extreme heat mitigation, biodiversity and nature-based climate solutions, climate-smart, sustainable, and resilient farms, ranches, and working lands, park creation and outdoor access, and clean air programs. The act makes \$135,000,000 available, upon appropriation by the Legislature, to the Office of Emergency Services for a wildfire mitigation grant program to provide, among other things, loans, direct assistance, and matching funds for projects that prevent wildfires, increase resilience, maintain existing wildfire risk reduction projects, reduce the risk of wildfires to communities, or increase home or community hardening. The act provides that eligible projects include, but are not limited to, grants to local agencies, state agencies, joint powers authorities, tribes, resource conservation districts, fire safe councils, and nonprofit organizations for structure hardening of critical community infrastructure, wildfire smoke mitigation, evacuation centers, including community clean air centers, structure hardening projects that reduce the risk of wildfire for entire neighborhoods and communities, water delivery system improvements for fire suppression purposes for communities in very high or high fire hazard areas, wildfire buffers, and incentives to remove structures that significantly increase hazard risk. This bill would include in the list of eligible projects grants to the above-mentioned entities for improvements to public evacuation routes in very high and high fire hazard severity zones, mobile rigid dip tanks, as defined, to support firefighting efforts, prepositioned mobile rigid water storage, as defined, and improvements to the response and effectiveness of fire engines and helicopters. The bill would also include grants, in coordination with the Public Utilities Commission, to local agencies, state agencies, special districts, joint powers authorities, tribes, and nonprofit organizations for backup electrical generators for water reservoirs.

Summary: Existing law requires the Department of Water Resources to gather and correlate information and data pertinent to an annual forecast of seasonal water crop. Existing law also requires the department to update every 5 years the plan for the orderly and coordinated control, protection, conservation, development, and use of the water resources of the state, which is known as "The California Water Plan." This bill would require the department, on or before January 1, 2027, to adopt a new water supply forecasting model and procedures that better address the effects of climate change and implement a formal policy and procedures for documenting the department's operational plans and the department's rationale for its operating procedures, including the department's rationale for water releases from reservoirs. The bill would also require the department to establish, and publish on the department's internet website, the specific criteria that it will employ to determine when its updated water supply forecasting model has demonstrated sufficient predictive capability to be ready for use in each of the watersheds. The bill would require the department, on or before January 1, 2028, and annually thereafter, to prepare and submit to

the Legislature a report on its progress toward implementing the new forecasting model and to post the report on the department's internet website. The bill would also require the department, on or before January 1, 2028, and annually thereafter, to prepare and submit to the Legislature a report that explains the rationale for the department's operating procedures specific to the previous water year. The bill would require the department, commencing in 2027 and annually thereafter, to present specified information, including the department's operational decisions and its rationale for the state's water supply during the preceding water year, at 5 at least 2 open and public meetings in specified locations. The bill would require the department to include the information presented at the meetings in a report, post the report on its internet website, and submit the report to the Legislature.

CEQA also requires a lead agency to prepare a mitigated negative declaration for a project that may have a significant effect on the environment if revisions in the project would avoid or mitigate that effect and there is no substantial evidence that the project, as revised, would have a significant effect on the environment. Under existing law, the recommendation, continuous evaluation, and execution of statewide environmental goals, policies, and plans are included within the scope of the executive functions of the Governor. Existing law establishes the Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation in the Governor's office for the purpose of serving the Governor and the Governor's cabinet as staff for long-range planning and research and constituting the comprehensive state planning agency. This bill would require, on or before July 1, 2027, the Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation to consult with regional, local, state, and federal agencies to develop a technical advisory on thresholds of significance for greenhouse gas and noise pollution effects on the environment to assist local agencies. The bill would require the technical advisory to provide suggested thresholds of significance for all areas of the state, as specified, and would provide that lead agencies may elect to adopt these suggested thresholds of significance. The bill would also require the Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation to post the technical advisory on its internet website.

CEQA also requires a lead agency to prepare a mitigated negative declaration for a project that may have a significant effect on the environment if revisions in the project would avoid or mitigate that effect and there is no substantial evidence that the project, as revised, would have a significant effect on the environment. CEQA requires the Office of Land Use and Climate Innovation, formerly named the Office of Planning and Research, to prepare and develop, and the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency to certify and adopt, guidelines for the implementation of CEQA. The CEQA guidelines require a lead agency, immediately after deciding that an environmental impact report is required for a project, to send a notice of preparation stating that an environmental impact report will be prepared to the office and each responsible and trustee agency, as specified. This bill would require the office to conduct a study to, among other things, evaluate how locked-in guidelines could impact regulatory certainty for future project proponents, lead agencies, and stakeholders and assess how locked-in guidelines could affect the speed and efficiency of the environmental review process pursuant to CEQA. The bill would define "locked-in guidelines" as

CEQA guidelines, that are in effect at the time of the first issuance of the notice of preparation for a project, that apply to the project throughout the course of the environmental review process pursuant to CEQA, regardless of changes in the guidelines that occur after the first issuance of the notice of preparation. The bill would require, on or before January 1, 2027, the office to submit a report to the Governor and the Legislature on the study. The bill would repeal these provisions on January 1, 2028.

This bill, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2025, and before January 1, 2030, would provide an exclusion from gross income for amounts received from a settlement entity, as defined, by a qualified taxpayer, as defined, to replace property that is located in a city or county in this state and that was damaged or destroyed by a disaster or accidental or human-caused event for which a state of emergency or local emergency, as defined, was proclaimed. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: The Political Reform Act of 1974 comprehensively regulates political campaigns, including campaign contributions. The act prohibits the receipt, delivery, or attempted delivery of a contribution in the State Capitol, any state office building, or any office for which the state pays the majority of the rent other than a legislative district office. This bill would expand that prohibition to apply to local government office buildings and offices for which the state or a local government pays rent. The bill would also eliminate the exception for legislative district offices. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

This bill would instead repeal these provisions on January 1, 2030.

This bill would revoke all authority of the state board to adopt, revise, or repeal regulations and would declare that any law granting authority to or requiring the state board to adopt, revise, or repeal regulations, or take an action that requires exercising regulatory authority, instead be read as only authorizing the state board to provide advice and propose measures to the Legislature for statutory enactment. The bill would require the state board to, as necessary, provide advice and propose measures to the Legislature for statutory enactment regarding its duties, as provided. The bill would declare that it does not invalidate or repeal any regulation adopted by the state board before January 1, 2026.

Summary: Under the Elder California Pipeline Safety Act of 1981, the State Fire Marshal exercises safety regulatory jurisdiction over intrastate pipelines used for the transportation of hazardous or highly volatile liquid substances. The act imposes various requirements in relation to the regulation of these intrastate pipelines. A person who willfully and knowingly violates the act or a regulation adopted pursuant to the act is, upon conviction, subject to a fine, imprisonment, or both a fine and imprisonment, as provided. The California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006 establishes the State Air Resources Board as the state agency responsible for monitoring and regulating sources emitting greenhouse gases. The act requires the state board to ensure that statewide greenhouse gas emissions are reduced to at least 40% below the statewide greenhouse gas emissions limit, as defined, no later than December 31, 2030. This bill would revise the definition of "pipeline," for purposes of the act, to include intrastate pipelines used for the transportation of carbon dioxide. The bill would require the State Fire Marshal, by April 1, 2026, to adopt regulations governing the safe transportation of carbon dioxide in pipelines that are equivalent to certain draft regulations issued by the federal Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration on January 10, 2025. The bill would authorize the State Fire Marshal to amend those regulations, as provided. The bill would authorize the State Fire Marshal, for a pipeline transporting carbon dioxide, to order a pipeline shutdown for violations of state or federal laws, or if continued pipeline operations present an immediate danger to the public health, welfare, or the environment. Because a violation of the above provisions would be a crime, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill would require the State Fire Marshal, at least once every 5 years, to assess the additional safety standards and to amend the regulations to increase the safety standards. The bill would require that to be recognized by the state board for meeting any requirement under the California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006, carbon dioxide transported by pipeline be transported only by pipelines meeting or exceeding the standards adopted by the State Fire Marshal. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law requires the Department of Toxic Substances Control, on or before January 1, 2029, to adopt regulations to enforce specified covered perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) restrictions, which include prohibitions on the distribution, sale, or offering for sale of certain products that contain specified levels of PFAS. Existing law requires the department, on and after July 1, 2030, to enforce and ensure compliance with those provisions and regulations, as provided. Existing law requires manufacturers of these products, on or before July 1, 2029, to

register with the department, to pay a registration fee to the department, and to provide a statement of compliance certifying compliance with the applicable prohibitions on the use of PFAS to the department, as specified. Existing law authorizes the department to test products and to rely on third-party testing to determine compliance with prohibitions on the use of PFAS, as specified. Existing law requires the department to issue a notice of violation for a product in violation of the prohibitions on the use of PFAS, as provided. Existing law authorizes the department to assess an administrative penalty for a violation of these prohibitions and authorizes the department to seek an injunction to restrain a person or entity from violating these prohibitions, as specified. This bill would, on and after January 1, 2028, prohibit a person from distributing, selling, or offering for sale a cleaning product, cookware, dental floss, juvenile product, food packaging, or ski wax, as provided, that contains intentionally added PFAS, as defined, except for previously used products and as otherwise preempted by federal law. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law prohibits a person from using any pipe, pipe or plumbing fitting or fixture, solder, or flux that is not lead free in the installation or repair of any public water system or any plumbing in a facility providing water for human consumption, except when necessary for the repair of leaded joints of cast iron pipes. Existing law requires a community water system to compile an inventory of known lead user service lines in use in its distribution system and identify areas that may have lead user service lines in use in its distribution system, as provided. This bill would require the owner of a public housing unit that is owned or managed by a city, county, city and county, or city, county, or city and county housing authority, to provide information to the residents of the public housing unit regarding any applicable existing program that offers free testing of the water for lead. Because a local government would be required to provide a higher level of service by implementing its provisions, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law imposes various limitations on emissions of air contaminants for the control of air pollution from vehicular and nonvehicular sources. Existing law generally designates air pollution control and air quality management districts with the primary responsibility for the control of air pollution from all sources other than vehicular sources. Existing law requires the State Air Resources Board to identify toxic air contaminants that are emitted into the ambient air of the state and to establish airborne toxic control measures to reduce emissions of toxic air contaminants from nonvehicular sources. This bill would require an air district without a specified rule on emergency backup generators, as defined, as of January 1, 2026, that adopts such a rule to include in the rule provisions that allow the operator of a critical facility, as defined, to use a permitted emergency backup generator in exceedance of the applicable runtime and testing and maintenance limits if specified conditions are met. The bill would require a critical facility allowed to exceed applicable limits under a rule adopted pursuant to that provision to attest to and provide evidence of having taken demonstrable steps toward implementing the use of backup power technologies that meet or exceed emission standards set by the state board. By adding to the duties of air districts, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law, the Bergeson-Peace Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank Act, authorizes the California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank, governed by a board of directors, to make loans, issue bonds, and provide other financial assistance for various types of infrastructure and economic development projects. Existing law establishes the California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank Fund, a continuously appropriated fund, to support the bank. This bill would enact the Golden State Infrastructure Corporation Act and would establish the Golden State Infrastructure Corporation, within the State Treasurer's Office, as a not-for-profit corporation for the purpose of administering the act and financing infrastructure projects. The bill would require the corporation to be governed by a board of directors, with a prescribed membership, and would require the business and affairs of the corporation to be managed by an executive director appointed by the Treasurer. This bill would prescribe the powers and duties of the corporation, including entering into financing transactions, borrowing money or issuing bonds, and setting and charging fees for obtaining financing from the corporation. Under the bill, the state would not in any way be liable for any obligation of the corporation, and the corporation would not be required to pay any taxes, except as provided. The bill would require the corporation, not later than January 1 of each year, to submit to the Governor, the Legislature, and the Legislative Analyst's Office a report for the preceding fiscal year containing information on the infrastructure corporation fund and the corporation's activities, including specified information. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.
