August 2026

Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project

File No.: M21-210B2

Description: The Reservoir Upgrades Project has several components to increase the efficiency and reliability of Reservoirs 1 and 2: Chemical storage and feed systems (sodium hypochlorite and aqueous ammonia) to help reduce nitrification issues in the distribution system; Pump replacement and conversion of drivers from gas engines to electrical motors; Upgrades to reservoir electrical service through SCE; Installation of diesel generator systems to power the reservoirs in the event of an emergency; Miscellaneous system rehabilitation and upgrades including electrical gear replacement, pipeline rehabilitation, pipeline modifications, and instrument replacement based on the results of site visits and related analyses; and Slurry Dewatering Pit upgrades located at the Reservoir 1 site.

Status: Following the approval of the recommendations of the Water, Power, and Supply Chain Reliability Assessment, Mesa Water developed a design Scope of Work for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Upgrades Project. A proposal was solicited from a CIPR on-call design consultant and the project's Preliminary and Final Design was kicked off in May 2021. The consultant delivered a draft version of Technical Memorandum No.1 – Reservoir 1 Site Master Plan and the draft Permit Plan in July 2021. Following Mesa Water's review of TM1 and the Permit Plan, the consultant began work on the Preliminary Design Report. The Preliminary Design Report was delivered in November 2021 and the Preliminary Design Report Workshop was held in September 2021. In March 2023, the Final Bid documents and cost estimate were received and reviewed by staff. After receiving approval for the project's reduced scope, the project team began modifying the Bid Documents. The revised Bid Documents were received in August 2023. Request for Bids were released to the prequalified contractors in August 2023. A job walk was conducted in August 2023 and attended by five prequalified contractors. The bid opening was held in October 2023. Four bids were received. A recommendation for contract time extension negotiation and award was approved November 2023. The contract time extension negotiation to accommodate equipment lead times was completed and Notice to Proceed was provided January 2024. A preconstruction meeting and a site walk with the contractor team were held February 2024. The construction team mobilized at Reservoir 2 in June 2024 and Reservoir 1 in October 2024. The contractor installed and started new mixers in Reservoir 2 in August 2024. At Reservoir 2, the contractor poured and coated the concrete foundation for the Reservoir chemical facility and constructed yard piping and electrical. The chemical tanks were delivered in August 2025 and anchored to the chemical pads. Work is stopped due to the impacts of the contractor-installed pipeline

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break at Reservoir 2 on October 18, 2025. The initial forensic site investigation was completed in November 2025. Testing and repair of the damaged equipment is in process. The contractor's insurance representatives inspected the damage on January 21, 2026. The forensic lab work was conducted on July 14-15, 2026. Data from the forensic lab was received by legal counsel in August 2026 and was shared with the forensic engineer and the contractor's insurance representatives. The damaged electrical equipment and instrumentation has been repaired or replaced. Engines 1 and 3 have been repaired, and the right angle gear drives were installed in June 2026. Engine 2 was sent to the repair shop on August 19, 2026 for an overhaul and is expected to be returned early in 2027. Engine 4 required new mechanical seals for the right angle gear drive and pump, which have been ordered. Engine 4 also requires repairs in the engine block, which will be attempted on site in September 2026. The new jockey pumps and motors were delivered in June 2026; however, the pump columns and shafts are longer than the pump cans and cannot be installed as delivered. The contractor is responsible for corrective action and has developed a repair plan for review. The variable frequency drives (VFD) were damaged in the October 18, 2025 incident and need to be replaced by the contractor. Replacement VFDs are expected in September 2026. The water in Reservoir 2 was drained in May and June, and the tank was cleaned and disinfected from June 20-29. The Reservoir 2 drain valve was replaced while the tank was empty. Engines and pumps 1 and 3 were run to disinfect the pump station piping with high strength chlorinated water. Bacteriological samples collected from the tank and pump station piping were negative showing that the disinfection was successful. Commissioning of the chemical facility is in process in August 2026. Once commissioned, Reservoir 2 will undergo its final bacteriological testing that will allow it to be returned to service with two operational engines and pumps. At Reservoir 1, the contractor has demolished yard structures, excavated for the new Heavy Equipment Port, Slurry Dewatering Pit, Chemical Facility, and Generator Pads. The Slurry Dewatering Pit went into operation in April 2025. After a rain delay, concrete foundations for the Heavy Equipment Port and Chemical Facility were poured in March 2025. The structural steel for the Heavy Equipment Port was received in April 2025, and the building is currently under construction. The building panels were delivered in August 2025. The contractor is coordinating with Southern California Edison for working in the vicinity of its power lines. The Air Quality Management District Permits to Construct and Operate the diesel backup generators were received in March 2025. The generator concrete pads were poured in May 2025. The generators were set on the pads in June 2025. The chemical tanks were delivered in August 2025 and anchored to the chemical pads. The electrical subcontractor is running the electrical conduits. The electrical

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subcontractor poured the concrete pad for the generator switchgear in April 2026. The pumps and motors were delivered to the contractor's warehouse in June 2026. The main switchboard was delivered on July 7, 2026. Work in the Reservoir 1 Pump Station is delayed until Reservoir 2 and its Pump Station are back on line.

Local Groundwater Supply Improvement Project (Local SIP)

File No.: M24-105

Description: The Local SIP will develop a feasibility study that meets the requirements of the Bureau of Reclamation's (USBR) Feasibility Study Directives and Standards (WTR 11-01) for a brackish groundwater desalination facility. The project is being conducted in partnership and cost sharing with Orange County Water District, City of Huntington Beach and City of Newport Beach.

Status: A contract was awarded to Black & Veatch Corporation (Black & Veatch) in May 2024. The project team has completed the evaluation of aquifer zones and selected the Talbert Gap on which to focus the alternative analysis for the feasibility study. The project team has also completed modeling the potential wellfield locations, developing treatment plant footprints, the Class V level life-cycle cost for the project, and developing the preferred alternative. The Board approved a contract amendment to the Black & Veatch contract for Clean Energy Capital to perform a funding analysis. The draft Feasibility Study was received and a review workshop was held in August 2025. Preliminary comments were received from USBR in September 2025. The final Feasibility Study was submitted to USBR in September 2025. Staff received comments on the final Feasibility Study from USBR in January 2026. Mesa Water submitted the final revised Feasibility Study to USBR and received confirmation of acceptance from USBR in April 2026. In February 2026, staff met with USBR to discuss the Feasibility Study and next steps for the project and funding opportunities. Staff presented an update on the Local SIP at the April 8, 2026 Board meeting and the Spring Board workshop. Staff and the real estate consultants are actively looking for properties for the wells and the treatment plant. Staff is also working with our partner agencies for funding the next steps in the Feasibility Study and applying for grants. The Board approved an amendment to the Black & Veatch contract at the May 27, 2026 Board meeting for the next steps in the Feasibility Study. Staff is working with Black & Veatch to incorporate Orange County Water District's recent work on basin subsidence into the next steps. A meeting with the project team and OCWD's Chief Hydrogeologist was held on July 16, 2026, and the subsidence scope is being updated based on the results of the meeting. Staff is working with West Yost to prepare and submit a

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competitive application to the USBR WaterSMART: Desalination Construction Projects Grant Program, due August 26, 2026.

Interagency Water Transfers (Newport Beach)

File No.: M25-108

Description: Conduct a feasibility study to determine if Mesa Water can reliably serve groundwater to the City of Newport Beach.

Status: A contract was awarded to MKN & Associates (MKN). The draft feasibility study was received in July 2025 and a workshop to review was held in August 2025. MKN presented the results at the September 10, 2025 Board meeting. Staff coordinated with MKN and the City of Newport Beach to design the connection. MKN submitted the 60% drawings in February 2026, which staff has provided comments on. The City of Costa Mesa issued an encroachment permit, and potholing activities were completed in February 2026. Final design was completed in March 2026 and staff has applied for the construction encroachment permit with the City. Staff is also coordinating with Southern California Edison for power for the intertie. The contracts for Engineering Support During Construction and Construction Management have been executed as of May 2026. The contract for Construction was approved by the Board in June 2026. A preconstruction partnering meeting including the City of Costa Mesa, City of Newport Beach, Ardurra, and TE Roberts was held in June 2026. Ardurra has finalized the drawings based on that meeting's discussion. The Board approved a change order to the construction contract on August 12, 2026 to add the SCADA panels for Mesa Water® and City of Newport Beach. An internal kickoff meeting with the Construction Manager is scheduled for August 2026, which will be followed by a construction kickoff meeting with all stakeholders.

Interagency Water Transfers (Huntington Beach)

File No.: M25-101

Description: Conduct a feasibility study to determine if Mesa Water can reliably serve groundwater to the City of Huntington Beach.

Status: A Cooperative Agreement was executed with the City of Huntington Beach in October 2024. Staff received three proposals from qualified consultants in June 2025. The Board awarded a contract to MKN & Associates (MKN) in July 2025. Notice to Proceed was provided in August 2025. A kickoff meeting was held in September 2025, and supply and demand data was collected in October 2025 and as of November 2025,

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MKN delivered a draft Feasibility Study in December 2025, which has been reviewed by staff from Mesa Water and the City of Huntington Beach. Comments have been provided to the consultant, and MKN is incorporating revisions, including refinement of regulatory considerations and infrastructure assumptions. The project has been introduced to the Department of Drinking Water, and coordination with DDW is ongoing. In February 2026, staff received and provided comments on the Draft Final Feasibility Study and continued discussions with DDW. The Final Feasibility Study was received in March 2026 and presented to the Board at the March 11, 2026 Board meeting. MKN (now Ardurra) presented to the City of Huntington Beach's Public Works Commission in May 2026 and received a positive response. The Commissioners were invited to visit the MWRF and MWECC. Ardurra submitted a proposal for next steps in May 2026. Coordination with the City of Huntington Beach and Orange County Water District is necessary to move forward with next steps. In July 2026, Mesa Water submitted a grant application to USBR's WaterSMART Drought Response Program.

Pipeline Integrity Program

File No.: M25-103

Description: Implement Resolution No. 1525 Replacement of Assets.

Status: Since its inception in 2015, the Pipeline Integrity Program has been implemented by staff to use pipeline condition, rather than pipeline age, to prioritize pipeline replacements. The current and previous fiscal year's progress is described in this report. In Fiscal Year (FY) 2024, the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant reviewed mainline break data from FY 2022 and FY 2023 and recommended condition assessment for pipeline groups with break thresholds that exceed the standards of Resolution No. 1525. These recommendations were presented to the Board in September 2023. Based on the recommendations, staff negotiated a proposal for ePulse condition assessment of 2.2 miles of AC pipe. The field work was completed in May 2024 and the report was received in July 2024. The results of the condition assessment were reviewed by the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. The consultant's report was received in October 2024 and reviewed by staff. No AC pipelines were recommended in the report. Additionally, Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC) staff performed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May and June 2024. The final leak detection report was received in June 2024 and no mainline leaks were reported. Staff evaluated the feasibility of a condition assessment technology for small diameter metal pipelines, and has requested a proposal from a vendor. The contract for small diameter pipeline condition assessment was approved at the March 12, 2025 Board

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meeting. The condition assessment was attempted on June 16-17, 2025 but was not successful. Staff sent ten AC pipe samples collected in conjunction with routine work for wall thickness measurement in February 2025. The wall thickness measurements were received in April 2025 and were reviewed by staff and the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. No immediate pipeline replacements were suggested by the data. The Consultant's report was received in June 2025 and was reviewed by staff. MWDOC completed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May 2025. No mainline leaks were found. Permanent pressure transient monitoring at the pump stations and other strategic locations was installed in June 2025. Staff is evaluating several AI models to predict mainline breaks and prioritize pipeline replacement. A contract was awarded to HDR to continue as the Pipeline Integrity Program consultant for FY 2026. A kickoff meeting for FY 2026 work was held in September 2025. An update to the Board was presented in October 2025. An updated Replacement of Assets resolution was brought to the January 28, 2026 Board meeting and the Board's comments were incorporated. The revised Replacement of Assets resolution was brought to the February 11, 2026 Board meeting. Sixteen AC pipe samples collected as part of break repairs and valve and hydrant replacements were sent to the lab for wall thickness testing on February 24, 2026. Wall thickness results were received on June 22, 2026 and reviewed by the Pipeline Integrity Program consultant. A report with remaining useful life estimates and recommendations for condition assessments and replacements was received from the consultant on June 30, 2026, and is being reviewed by staff. Staff is evaluating the potential replacement of the 6" CMLC pipeline in West Wilson from Placentia to Canyon ahead of the City of Costa Mesa repaving West Wilson.

SCADA Needs Assessment

File No.: M26-100

Description: Assess Mesa Water's current Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition system, compile a comprehensive asset list, and define a path forward for modernization and future system improvements.

Status: Staff developed a draft Scope of Work and incorporated feedback from expert consultants. The Request for Proposal was posted in October 2025 and six proposals were received in November 2025. An information item was provided at the December 2025 Board meeting. A contract was awarded to West Yost at the January 14, 2026 Board meeting. The contract was executed in February 2026 and the kickoff occurred in March 2026. Site visits were completed in March 2026. West Yost is

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reviewing SCADA related documentation and staff interviews were completed in May and June 2026. The Baseline Conditions section of the Needs Assessment was received in July 2026 and is under review. SCADA 101 training sessions were conducted on August 1 and 2, 2026. SCADA 102 training sessions are scheduled for the end of August 2026.

Mesa Water Education Center Flagpole

File No.: M25-104

Description: Evaluate the most appropriate location and height of the flagpole at the Mesa Water Reliability Facility and then execute the construction of the selected flagpole.

Status: Staff received a draft report regarding the installation of a flagpole at the Mesa Water Education Center in December 2024. Staff reviewed the draft report and presented recommendations at the April 23, 2025 Board meeting. A design proposal was received in November 2025. In order to minimize the time to get the flagpole contracted and installed, a revised proposal for a single contract (design and construction) was requested. Design details are being finalized as of August 2026.

Mesa Water Reliability Facility Electric Vehicle Charging Station

File No.: M25-105

Description: Conduct a feasibility study and preliminary cost estimate of constructing electric vehicle (EV) charging stations at the Mesa Water Reliability Facility (MWRF).

Status: Mesa Energy Systems submitted a proposal for a feasibility study in January 2026. A kickoff meeting and site visit was held in March 2026. The draft feasibility study was submitted in April 2026. Comments were provided and a revised feasibility study was received in April 2026. A review workshop was held in May 2026. Tesla has determined that the proposed MWRF parking site does not meet the minimum required amenities for a Tesla charging location. Staff is coordinating with Mesa Energy Systems to present to the Board at a future Board Meeting.

Well Nos. 12 and 14 Power Quality Mitigation

File No.: M26-200

Description: Evaluate and implement solutions to mitigate power quality disturbances affecting Well Nos. 12 and 14. The project includes installation of power quality monitoring equipment and evaluation of technologies such as

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flywheel uninterruptible power supply (UPS) systems and battery energy storage systems (BESS) to maintain well operations during voltage dips, outages, and Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) events.

Status: In late 2025, staff began evaluating mitigation strategies for increasing power quality disturbances affecting Well Nos. 12 and 14. In December 2025, applications were submitted to the Self-Generation Incentive Program (SGIP) through Southern California Edison and Southern California Gas Company for battery energy storage systems at both well sites. Battery feasibility analysis to evaluate system sizing, resilience benefits, and long-term financial performance was complete and found that the battery payback period was longer than the useful life of the battery. The results of this analysis will be incorporated into a broader backup power technology evaluation. In March 2026, staff received a proposal from Lee + Ro to evaluate backup power technologies for Well Nos. 12 and 14, including flywheel UPS systems, battery energy storage systems, and hybrid solutions. Power quality monitoring has been installed at both well sites, and the collected data will be used to inform the feasibility analysis and technology evaluation. Contracting with Lee + Ro is complete as of May 2026. The kickoff meeting and site visits were held on May 28, 2026. The site visit also included a review of the setup of the Automatic Transfer Switches (ATS) and the Variable Frequency Drives (VFDs). The time delays in the ATS setup were shortened to allow for the back up power generator to start faster. The VFD settings were adjusted to allow operation to continue during a drop in incoming voltage. Study results were presented in a review meeting in June 2026 and were incorporated into the analysis performed by Lee + Ro. The report was received in August 2026 and is under review.

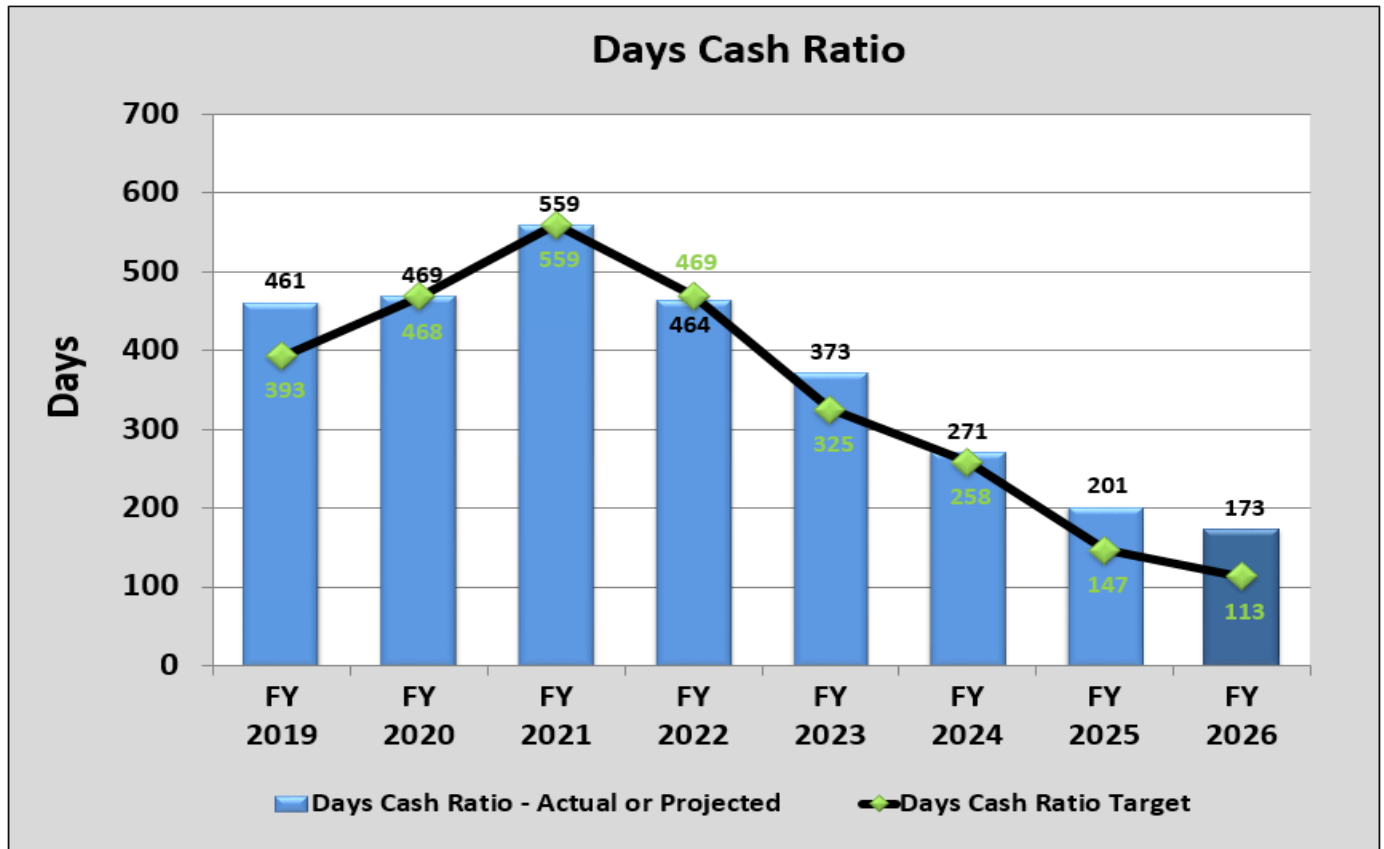
At its June 11, 2025 meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) approved the Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 Budget.

DISCUSSION

Through the fourth quarter of FY 2026, Cash on Hand totaled \$18,362,201. Cash on Hand of \$18,362,201 is above the forecasted year-end cash balance of \$12,700,712.



Additionally, 173 Days Cash is above the forecasted Days Cash estimate of 113 days at year end by 60 days.



The Current Debt Coverage ratio is 346%, which exceeds both requirements for the 2017 & 2020 Revenue Certificates of Participation (COPs) and the Designated Funds Policy. The Debt Coverage ratio goal of the Board is 150% and was established in the Designated Funds Policy.

Water production is below budget through the fourth quarter by approximately -2.1%.

The mix of water production between clear and amber water has varied which is depicted in the table below:

Clear and amber water costs have a combined favorable variance of \$162,570 due to the production of water being lower than budgeted.



Total operating revenues year-to-date have an unfavorable balance of \$1,539,759 or approximately -2.6%. This is a result of monthly water consumption being lower than expected. Additionally, operating expenses through the fourth quarter have a favorable balance of \$2,422,371 or approximately 5.9%. This is predominantly a result of lower than budgeted General and Administrative expenses and Transmission and Distribution expenses. As a result, operating income through June 30, 2026 has a favorable balance of \$882,612 or approximately 4.6%.

In addition, non-operating revenue, net of expenses, through the fourth quarter of FY 2026 has a favorable balance of \$3,172,624. This is mostly due to investment earnings.

Overall, the Change in Net Position has a favorable balance of \$2,840,806 or approximately 23.5% through June 30, 2026.

DISCUSSION

On June 3, 2026, the Orange County Grand Jury (Grand Jury) released a report addressing per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in Orange County. The report, entitled *PFAS and Public Awareness: A Closer Look at Orange County Drinking Water*, was prepared by the Grand Jury evaluating the status of PFAS treatment planning and how Orange County agencies have responded to recent PFAS regulatory requirements. The Grand Jury based its study on a comprehensive review of multiple sources, including:

- Interviewed several Orange County governmental leaders and senior staff directly involved in managing drinking water quality
- Reviewed and analyzed key documents related to the investigation, including:
 - o Published Water Quality reports from all Orange County water retailers
 - o Records from all Orange County water agencies
- Examined news articles and publications relevant to the topic
- Conducted extensive internet research
- Performed field investigations in which Grand Jury members visited several water management agencies to directly observe and assess drinking water processes

The Grand Jury arrived at eight findings, as follows:

F1: Commercial and industrial chemical manufacturers are a major source of PFAS contamination. Settlement litigation funds are available for community water systems to make claims.

- F2: PFAS is widespread, and contamination has been detected in Orange County groundwater sources. Community water systems are required to report PFAS monitoring results in their annual Consumer Confidence Reports.
- F3: PFAS exposure is associated with potential adverse human health effects.
- F4: OCWD has taken a proactive leadership role in addressing PFAS in the Orange County Groundwater Basin, though PFAS treatment implementation varies across local cities and water districts.
- F5: Groundwater supplies must either be treated to remove PFAS or must be replaced with imported water supplies that are significantly more expensive than groundwater. Over \$500 million is being spent on construction, operations, and maintenance of PFAS treatment facilities in Orange County.
- F6: Orange County drinking water meets or exceeds state and federal standards and is safe for consumption without additional home filtration.
- F7: Research on newer PFAS compounds and long-term exposure effects is ongoing.
- F8: There are limited online PFAS education and outreach programs among Orange County water retailers. Most retailers rely on OCWD for PFAS education and outreach. PFAS advisories were included in approximately 55% of the Orange County water retailers' annual water quality reports in 2025.

Based on the findings, the Grand Jury's six recommendations are as follows:

- R1: By September 30, 2026, Orange County Water District (OCWD), in coordination with state and federal agencies, should pursue cost recovery efforts against PFAS manufacturers to offset treatment, monitoring, and long-term remediation costs incurred by local water agencies and ratepayers. [F1, F5]
- R2: By July 1, 2029, OCWD and its member agencies should monitor PFAS in groundwater and surface water sources and promptly implement PFAS treatment when response levels are exceeded. [F2, F4]
- R3: By September 30, 2026, OCWD, in collaboration with the Orange County Health Care Agency, should update public education and guidance continually as scientific understanding and regulatory standards evolve. [F3]
- R4: By July 1, 2029, all Orange County water retailers should consistently include a PFAS advisory, treatment facilities status, and compliance information in consumer confidence reports and on agency websites, using clear and understandable language for the public. [F2, F8]



R5: By September 30, 2026, OCWD and all Orange County water retailers should enhance coordinated public education efforts to reassure their customers about drinking water safety. [F6, F8]

R6: By September 30, 2026, OCWD should continuously monitor national and international PFAS research development and incorporate new findings into future groundwater management, treatment planning, and regulatory compliance strategies. [F7]

California Penal Code Section 933 requires the governing body of any public agency which the Grand Jury has reviewed, and about which it has issued a final report, to comment to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court on the findings and recommendations no later than 90 days after the Grand Jury publishes its report.

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) is required to respond by September 7, 2026 to Findings 2, 4, 6, and 8 and Recommendations 2, 4, and 5. Mesa Water is asked to either agree with the findings and recommendations or to disagree and include an explanation.

Attachment A is the District's draft response to Findings 2, 4, 6, and 8 and Recommendations 2, 4, and 5 as requested of Mesa Water by the Grand Jury.

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) received the Orange County Grand Jury Report, *PFAS and Public Awareness: A Closer Look at Orange County Drinking Water*, regarding per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in Orange County's drinking water supplies. Mesa Water District has provided responses to the report Findings (F2, F4, F6 and F8) along with Recommendations (R2, R4 and R5).

Mesa Water is a local independent special district, founded on January 1, 1960 and governed by a publicly elected five-member Board of Directors. Mesa Water provides 100% local groundwater to businesses and approximately 110,000 residents within an 18-square-mile service area that includes most of the City of Costa Mesa, parts of Newport Beach, and unincorporated Orange County, including John Wayne Airport.

While Mesa Water has had no reportable detections of PFAS in its water sources, the District recognizes the importance of proactively addressing PFAS and protecting the quality of Orange County's groundwater supplies. Mesa Water believes Orange County Water District (OCWD) has demonstrated strong leadership in addressing PFAS through its regional monitoring, research, treatment, and mitigation efforts. Mesa Water supports OCWD's continued leadership and works collaboratively with OCWD and the State Water Resources Control Board's Division of Drinking Water (DDW) to monitor PFAS and ensure that the District's water supplies continue to meet all applicable drinking water standards.

Mesa Water also believes that addressing PFAS requires continued collaboration among groundwater producers, water management agencies, regulators, and other regional partners. Mesa Water appreciates OCWD's role in coordinating regional efforts and providing expertise and resources to help Orange County water agencies understand, manage, and mitigate PFAS.

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Mesa Water's responses to findings F2, F4, F6 and F8 and recommendations R2, R4 and R5 as required by the Orange County Grand Jury Report, are below.

Grand Jury Findings

- F2: PFAS is widespread, and contamination has been detected in Orange County groundwater sources. Community water systems are required to report PFAS monitoring results in their annual Consumer Confidence Reports.

Mesa Water concurs that community water systems are required to report PFAS monitoring results in their annual Consumer Confidence Reports if the constituent concentration is above the set Reportable Detection Level set forth by the California Division of Drinking Water and federal government agencies.

- F4: OCWD has taken a proactive leadership role in addressing PFAS in the Orange County Groundwater Basin, though PFAS treatment implementation varies across local cities and water districts.

Mesa Water concurs that OCWD has taken a proactive leadership role in addressing PFAS within the region.

- F6: Orange County drinking water meets or exceeds state and federal standards and is safe for consumption without additional home filtration.

Mesa Water's drinking water is safe for consumption without additional home filtration. Mesa Water takes pride in conducting over 30,000 water quality tests annually to ensure compliance of all state and federal drinking water standards. Mesa Water remains committed to providing high-quality drinking water for its 110,000 service area residents.

- F8: There are limited online PFAS education and outreach programs among Orange County water retailers. Most retailers rely on OCWD for PFAS education and outreach. PFAS advisories were included in approximately 55% of the Orange County water retailers' annual water quality reports in 2025.

As a member agency of OCWD, Mesa Water concurs that OCWD leads PFAS education and outreach development. Mesa Water is dedicated to engaging with OCWD on topics related to PFAS to provide additional educational opportunities to both Mesa Water staff and Mesa Water customers.

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Grand Jury Recommendations

- R2: By July 1, 2029, OCWD and its member agencies should monitor PFAS in groundwater and surface water sources and promptly implement PFAS treatment when response levels are exceeded. [F2, F4]

Mesa Water coordinates with OCWD to collect water samples for PFAS monitoring as required by the State and U.S. EPA. Mesa Water also works closely with the California Division of Drinking Water to address any of its water sources should PFAS detections exceed applicable drinking water standards.

- R4: By July 1, 2029, all Orange County water retailers should consistently include a PFAS advisory, treatment facilities status, and compliance information in consumer confidence reports and on agency websites, using clear and understandable language for the public. [F2, F8]

Mesa Water concurs with this recommendation and recognizes that clear and consistent communication is essential to maintaining public confidence in drinking water.

- R5: By September 30, 2026, OCWD and all Orange County water retailers should enhance coordinated public education efforts to reassure their customers about drinking water safety. [F6, F8]

Mesa Water concurs with this recommendation. In coordination with OCWD, Mesa Water will continue enhancing outreach efforts to reassure customers that their water is safe to drink, straight from the tap.

Mesa Water appreciates the Orange County Grand Jury's interest in protecting Orange County's drinking water supplies and addressing the ongoing challenges presented by PFAS. Mesa Water is committed to continuing its proactive approach to water quality and to working collaboratively with OCWD, DDW, and other regional partners to protect local groundwater supplies and ensure the delivery of safe, reliable drinking water to the communities we serve.

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Mesa Water hopes the information and responses provided are informative and meet the needs of the Orange County Grand Jury report. 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SUMMARY

Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) form a broad class of thousands of synthetic chemicals characterized by strong carbon–fluorine bonds and are among the most durable compounds in organic chemistry. This bond strength makes PFAS highly resistant to breaking down, allowing them to persist in the environment for decades or longer. Because of this persistence, PFAS are often called “forever chemicals.”

Various industries have used PFAS in consumer and commercial applications since the 1940s because their chemical properties provide water, oil, and stain resistance, as well as heat stability. These properties support applications across numerous sectors, including aerospace, automotive, textiles, firefighting foams, food packaging, electronics, and medical devices. As a result of their widespread use and persistence, PFAS now appear globally in water, air, soil, wildlife, and human blood.

Scientific studies continue to show associations between PFAS exposure and harmful health effects in humans and animals, although the degree of risk varies by compound. In response, federal and state agencies, including the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA), began accelerating regulatory actions in the 2010s to reduce PFAS exposure, enhance monitoring, and develop treatment and disposal methods.

This report identifies and describes PFAS levels detected by Orange County drinking water agencies. It evaluates how these agencies have responded to recent PFAS regulatory requirements. It also examines the progress of PFAS treatment facility planning and installation, along with implementation of public education programs related to PFAS in drinking water. This report’s findings and recommendations aim to strengthen PFAS reporting in annual Water Quality Reports (Consumer Confidence Reports) and expand public outreach by Orange County drinking water agencies.

BACKGROUND

PFAS are a large group of man-made “forever chemicals” produced since the 1940s, known for extreme persistence, environmental mobility, and bioaccumulation due to strong carbon-fluorine bonds.¹ Used in water/stain-resistant coatings, firefighting foams, industrial processes, PFAS have contaminated soil, water, and air globally.

Contaminated drinking water has led to high levels of exposure to PFOA, PFOS, and other PFAS² for some populations residing near manufacturing facilities. Workers in facilities that make or use PFAS can be exposed to higher amounts of these chemicals and have higher levels in their blood.³ Infants may be exposed to PFAS through breastfeeding.⁴

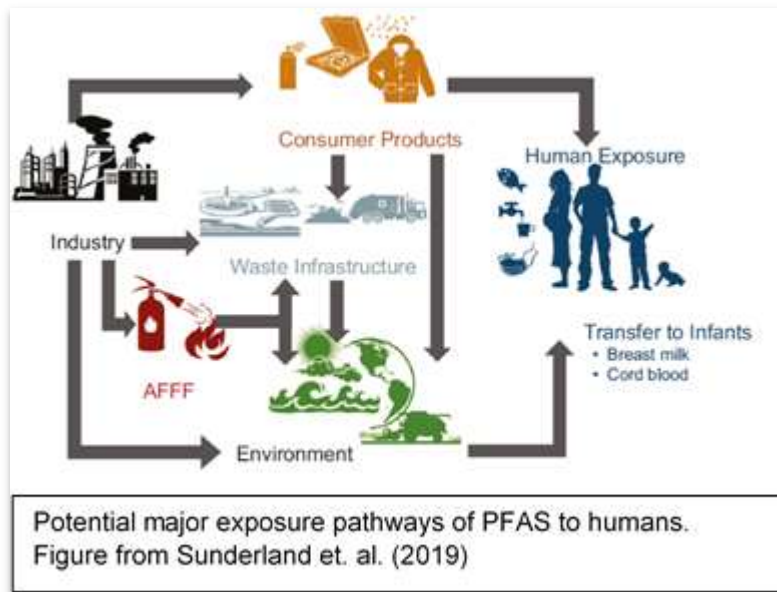


Figure 1 - Potential Major Exposure Pathways of PFAS to Humans⁵

PFAS, especially PFOA and PFOS, have been detected in air, water, and soil in and around manufacturing facilities. However, these releases have been declining since companies began phasing out the production and use of several PFAS in the early 2000s.⁶ Due to their chemical structure, PFAS are very stable in the environment and are resistant to breaking down. Some PFAS are volatile and can be carried long distances through the air, which may lead to contamination of soils and groundwater far from the source of the PFAS emission.⁷

The four major sources of PFAS are: fire training/fire response sites, industrial sites, landfills, and wastewater treatment plants/biosolids. PFAS can get into drinking water when products containing them are used or spilled onto the ground or into lakes and rivers. Once in groundwater, PFAS are easily transported long distances and can

contaminate drinking wells. PFAS in the air can also end up in rivers and lakes used for drinking water.⁸

PFAS have been used extensively in surface coating and protectant formulations due to their unique ability to repel oil, grease, and water. Major applications have included protectants for paper and cardboard packaging products, carpets, leather products, and textiles that enhance water, grease, and soil repellency, and in firefighting foams. PFAS have also been used as processing aids in the manufacture of nonstick coatings on cookware. Common consumer products containing PFAS include Teflon, Gore-Tex and Scotchgard.⁹

Background Summary of PFAS and Its Effects

Source and Exposure: Primary sources include industrial sites, firefighting training, landfills, and wastewater treatment plants. They enter drinking water, food, and indoor dust, resulting in widespread human exposure.

Health and Environmental Impact: PFAS are associated with adverse effects, including cancer (i.e. testicular, kidney), developmental delays, liver damage, and high cholesterol. They do not break down easily, leading to "background" contamination even in remote areas.¹⁰

Regulation and Action: While major US manufacturing of certain PFAS ended around 2015, they remain in products and in the environment. The EPA has established Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs) for drinking water.¹¹

"Forever Chemicals" Definition: Their chemical structure, featuring one of the strongest bonds in organic chemistry, makes them resistant to heat, water, and oil, thus earning them the nickname "forever chemicals."¹²

In Orange County, PFAS have been detected in the **Orange County Groundwater Basin**, which provides 77% to 85% of the drinking water for north and central parts of the county. Local agencies have taken a proactive stance, shutting down dozens of impacted wells and building some of the nation's largest treatment facilities to ensure tap water meets safety standards.¹³

REASON FOR STUDY

Recent regulatory actions related to PFAS have created significant operational, financial, and communication challenges for drinking water agencies across California. Orange County agencies face an intensifying timeline due to the region's reliance on groundwater supplies, the presence of PFAS in local aquifers, and the need to comply with evolving state and federal standards. As regulatory and monitoring requirements expand, agencies must rapidly adapt their treatment strategies, capital planning, and public outreach efforts.

This study is necessary to provide a clear, up-to-date understanding of how Orange County drinking water agencies are responding to these new requirements. Evaluating the status of PFAS treatment planning and installation helps illustrate the extent of infrastructure readiness, the pace of implementation, and the challenges agencies encounter as they work to bring new systems online. At the same time, assessing the development and delivery of PFAS-related education programs offers insight into how effectively agencies are communicating risks, regulatory changes, and water quality information to the public.

By documenting current conditions and identifying gaps or emerging needs, the study supports informed decision-making among water providers, policymakers, and ratepayers. This work helps ensure that Orange County communities receive safe drinking water and that agencies are equipped to meet regulatory expectations while maintaining public trust.

METHOD OF STUDY

The Orange County Grand Jury investigated the PFAS in Orange County drinking water to provide a clear and accurate assessment. The Grand Jury based its study on a comprehensive review of multiple sources, including interviews, public records, field investigations, and relevant news articles. Multiple independent sources corroborated and validated all facts, findings, and recommendations presented in the report.

- Interviewed several Orange County governmental leaders and senior staff directly involved in managing drinking water quality
- Reviewed and analyzed key documents related to the investigation, including:
 - Published Water Quality reports from all Orange County water retailers
 - Records from all Orange County water agencies
- Examined news articles and publications relevant to the topic.
- Conducted extensive internet research.

- Performed field investigations in which Grand Jury members visited several water management agencies to directly observe and assess drinking water processes.

INVESTIGATION AND ANALYSIS

The 2025-2026 Orange County Grand Jury investigated the presence of PFAS in Orange County drinking water and the response of Orange County community water systems. Community water systems (CWS) are city, county, regulated utilities, regional water systems and even small water companies and districts where people live. Non-community water systems¹⁴ provide drinking water to the public at locations where people do not reside permanently. The investigation included evaluation of Orange County CWS compliance with federal and state PFAS monitoring and reporting requirements and the extent of the voluntary response to PFAS contamination. The Grand Jury also evaluated annual Consumer Confidence Reports, also called Annual Water Quality Reports, which are issued annually by CWS and distributed to their customers.

Orange County Drinking Water Systems

The Grand Jury investigation was limited to community water systems (CWS) operated by cities or special districts that are regulated under the Safe Drinking Water Act.¹⁵ CWS are defined as public water systems that serve at least 15 service connections used by yearlong residents, or regularly serve at least 25 yearlong residents of the area served by the system.¹⁶ In Orange County, there are 31 such CWS that are operated by cities or special districts and that sell drinking water directly to customers on a retail basis. In this report, these Orange County CWS may be referred to as retail water districts or water retailers.

Drinking Water Sources

North and Central Orange County

Orange County is divided into two distinct areas when it comes to drinking water sources. There are 2.5 million residents of north and central Orange County, who receive about 85% of their drinking water supplies from the Orange County Groundwater Basin, and the remaining 15% of their water supplies are imported from

the State Water Project and Colorado River delivered by Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC).¹⁷

South Orange County

Approximately 600,000 residents of south Orange County rely primarily on imported water supplies delivered by MWDOC, and a few south County communities also have groundwater supplies from the San Juan Basin and surface water supplies from Irvine Lake (also referred to as the Santiago Reservoir).¹⁸

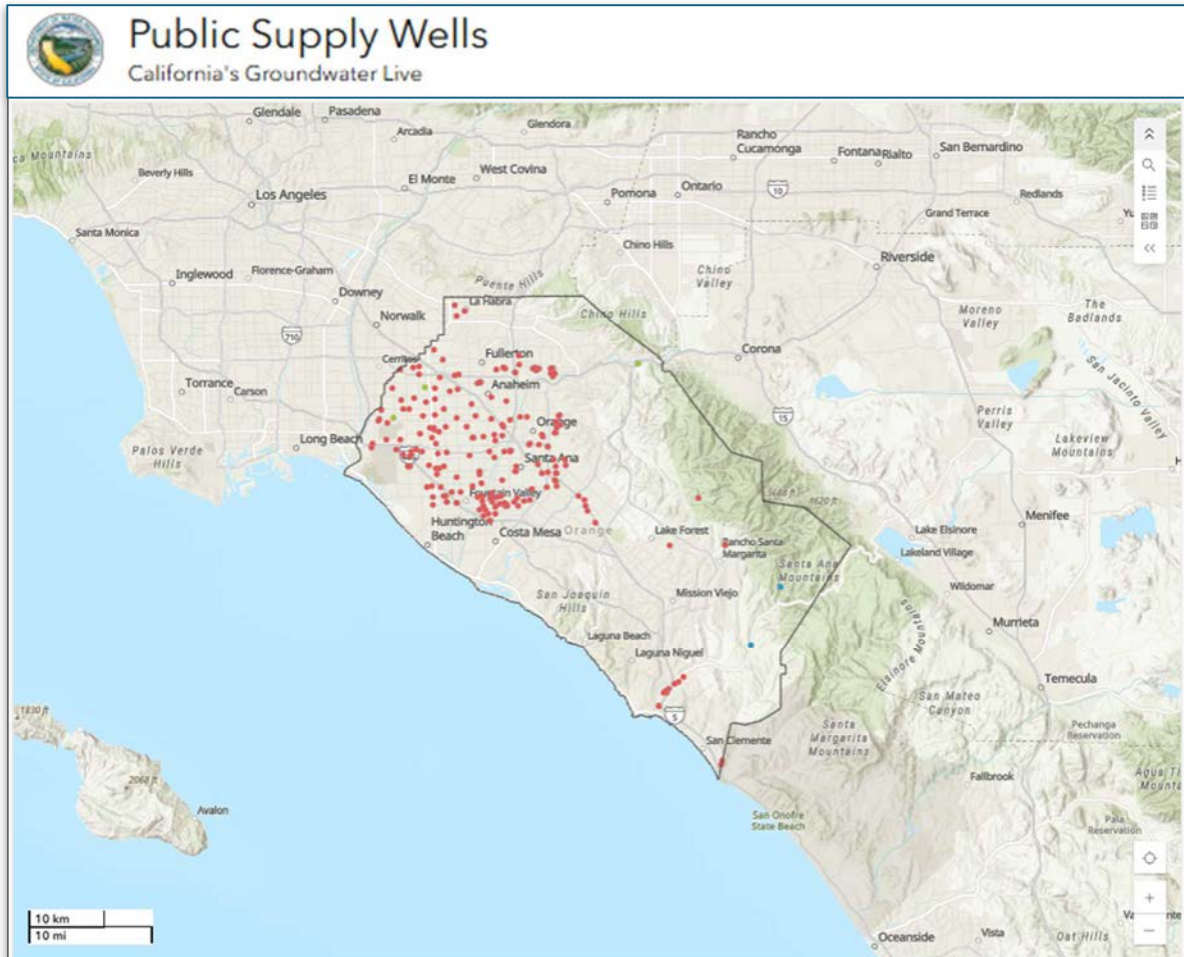
Public Supply Wells

According to the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) as of November 2024,¹⁹ there were a total of 217 public supply wells for drinking water in Orange County. Of the 217 total wells, 211 were CWS wells and six were non-community water system wells. See Figure 2 for a Department of Water Resources map of Orange County groundwater public supply wells. This map illustrates the reliance of north and central Orange County on groundwater sources, and the reliance of south Orange County on imported water supplies.

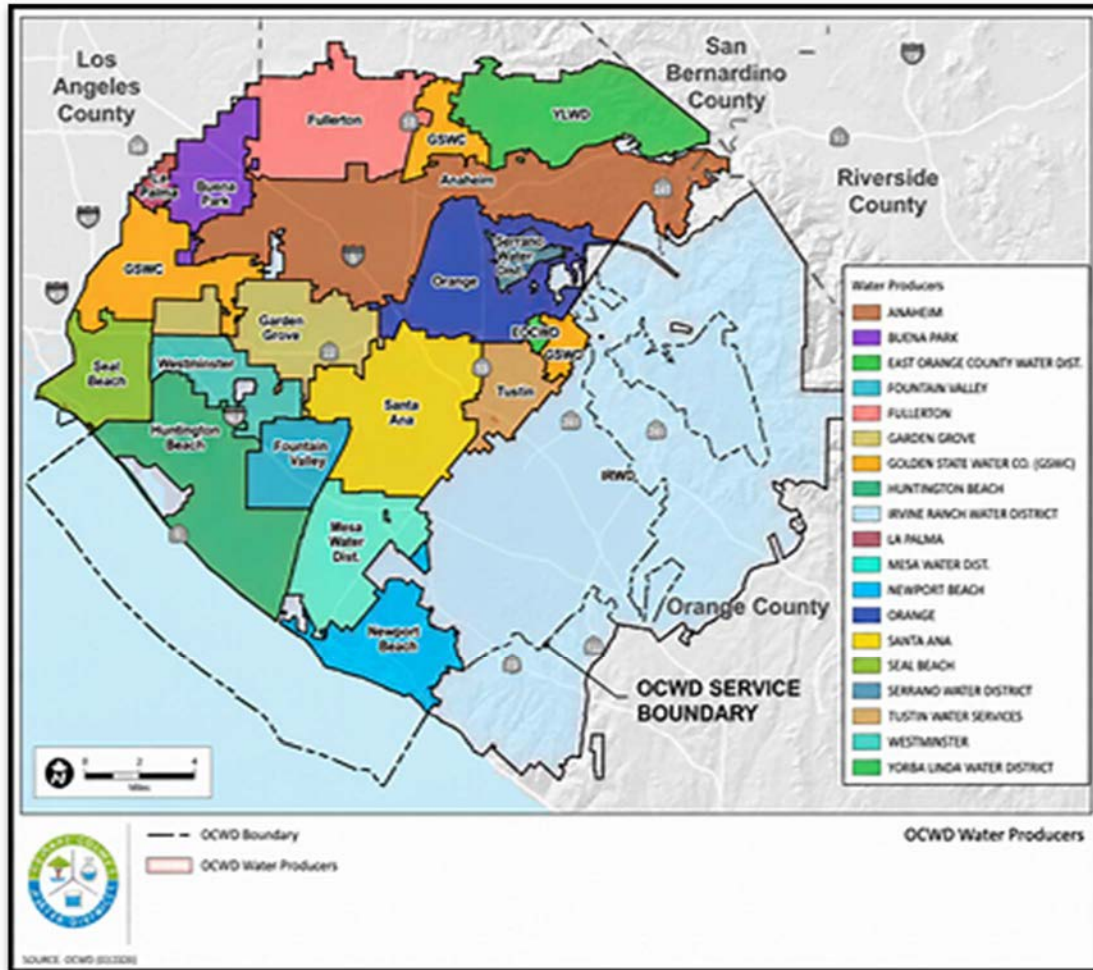
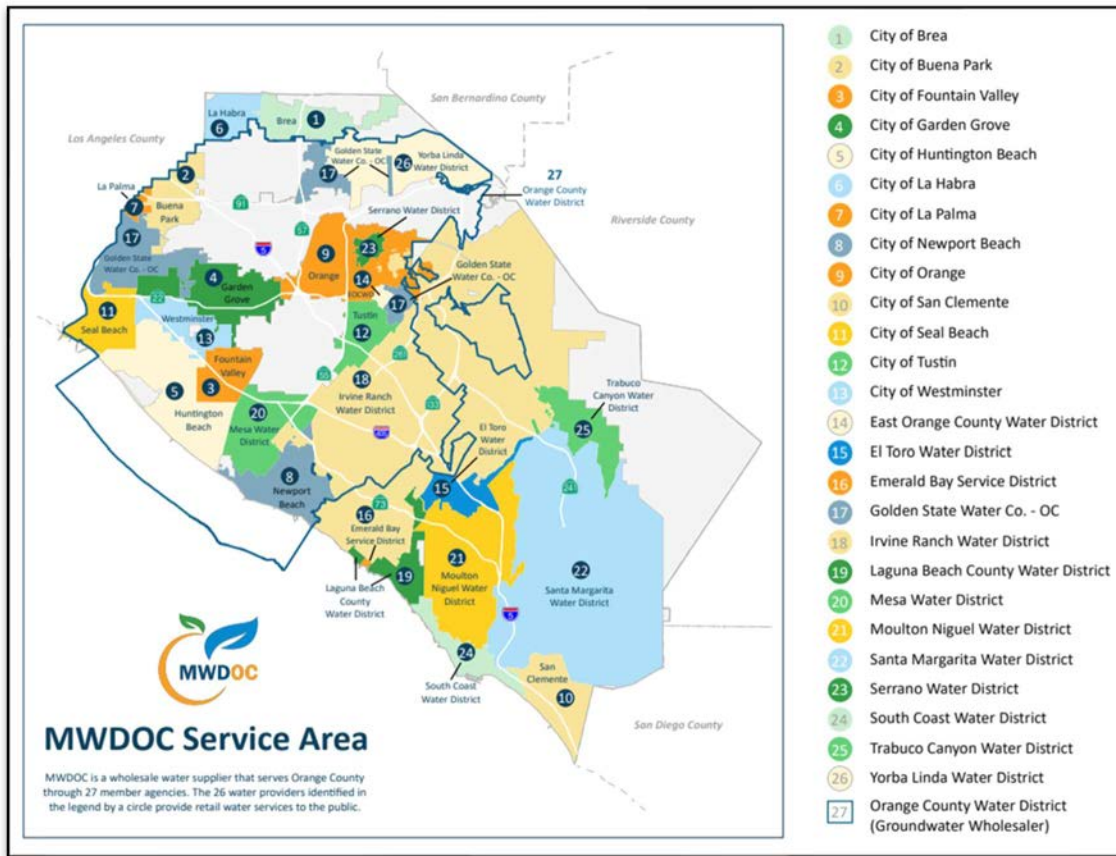


Figure 3 - Orange County Water District (OCWD) Service Area

Municipal Water District of Orange County

MWDOC is the wholesale water provider and resource planning agency that partners with the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) to deliver imported water to its 27 member agencies.²⁰ Some MWDOC member agencies are also members of OCWD.

PFAS and the Health Effects of Exposure

What are PFAS?

PFAS are a large group of many thousands of manufactured chemicals that are resistant to heat, oil, and water. Among the many thousands of different PFAS, some have been more widely used and studied than others.²¹ PFAS have been used extensively in surface coating and protectant formulations due to their unique ability to reduce the surface tension of liquids, and their ability to repel oil, grease, water, and staining. Major applications have included use as processing aids in the manufacture of nonstick coatings on cookware, surface protectants for paper and cardboard such as disposable food packaging, microwave popcorn bags, pizza boxes, and candy wrappers. Other surface protectants include those used on furniture and carpets,

leather products, outdoor gear, and textiles.²² PFAS are also one of the main components of aqueous film forming foams (AFFF) used frequently at airports and military bases for firefighting and emergency response training activities.²³ It is important to note that PFAS-containing firefighting foams and other emergency response materials containing PFAS are no longer in use at Orange County airports and harbors.²⁴

PFOA and PFOS are two types of PFAS of particular concern that are no longer manufactured or imported into the US. Trace amounts of PFOA and PFOS may still be contained in some imported goods and in other PFAS goods and materials that are still produced and used in the US.²⁵ Under the PFOA Stewardship Program with the EPA, eight major PFAS producers have phased out PFOA and other PFAS substances from their emissions and products; however, manufacturers are replacing substances in the PFAS family with others such as GenX and ADONA.²⁶

Understanding the PFAS Cycle: How PFAS Moves Through the Environment

PFAS move through the environment in a repeating cycle through air, water, soil, products, animals, and humans. This is known as the PFAS cycle. This cycle can be described in four stages and is illustrated at Figure 5.²⁷

Manufacturing and use. The PFAS cycle begins during manufacturing or everyday use of PFAS-containing consumer and industrial products. During manufacture and use, PFAS are released into the air, water, and soil. As more PFAS are manufactured and used, the more they accumulate because they are persistent and resistant to degradation.

Environmental spread. After PFAS are released to the environment, they move through wind, snowfall, rain, and runoff to soil and surface water, and infiltration to groundwater. Industrial sites and wastewater treatment plants are key entry points

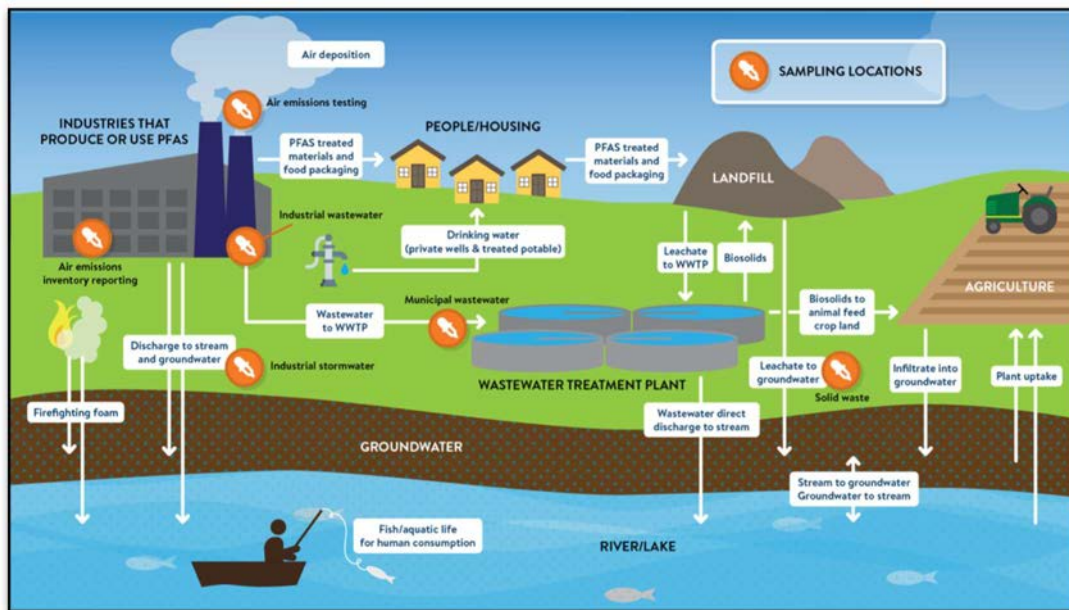

into the environment. PFAS are absorbed from the environment by plants and animals, and then move up the food chain.

Human exposure. Most people are exposed to PFAS through using PFAS-contaminated products, drinking contaminated water, and eating contaminated food such as fish caught from water contaminated by PFAS, and dairy products from livestock exposed to PFAS.²⁸ The US Centers for Disease Control (CDC) National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES) estimated that in NHANES 2017–2018 data 98% of the US population had combined PFAS serum levels greater than 2 nanograms per milliliter.²⁹

Re-entry. Even after disposal of PFAS products, PFAS can re-enter the environment through landfill leachate or runoff to soils, agricultural spreading of biosolids, and municipal wastewater treatment effluent discharges to surface water, resulting in PFAS cycling back into soil, animal feed crops, and water.

What is the Source of PFAS in Orange County Groundwater?

Wastewater treatment plants located along the Santa Ana River that discharge effluent to the Santa Ana River upstream of managed aquifer recharge operations are sources

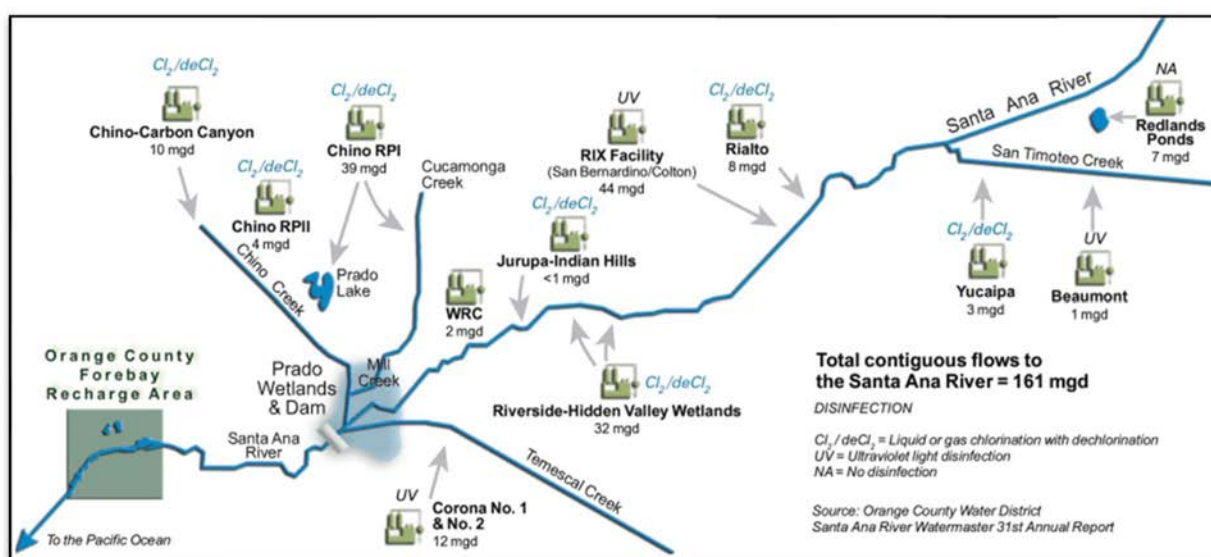


Figure 6 - Wastewater Treatment Discharges to the Santa Ana River

of PFAS contamination for public water systems downstream of these wastewater treatment plants.³⁰ The OCWD Groundwater Replenishment System (GWRS) actively manages and recharges the Orange County groundwater basin with surface water from the Santa Ana River, imported surface water, and purified recycled water from the GWRS. For much of the year, flow in the Santa Ana River consists predominantly of effluent from municipal wastewater treatment plants upstream from the Orange County groundwater basin.³¹ Figure 6 illustrates these upstream wastewater discharges to the Santa Ana River.³² PFAS has recently been measured in the Santa Ana River at concentrations consistent with wells surrounding the recharge facilities, suggesting that historic concentrations of PFAS in the Santa Ana River may be a primary input of PFAS in the Orange County groundwater basin.³³

How Much PFAS is Found in the General Population?

Because of their widespread use and their persistence in the environment, many PFAS are found in the blood of people and animals all over the world.³⁴ CDC scientists have measured PFAS in the blood serum (the clear portion of blood) of 98% of participants

aged 12 years and older since 1999, indicating widespread exposure to PFAS in the US population.³⁵

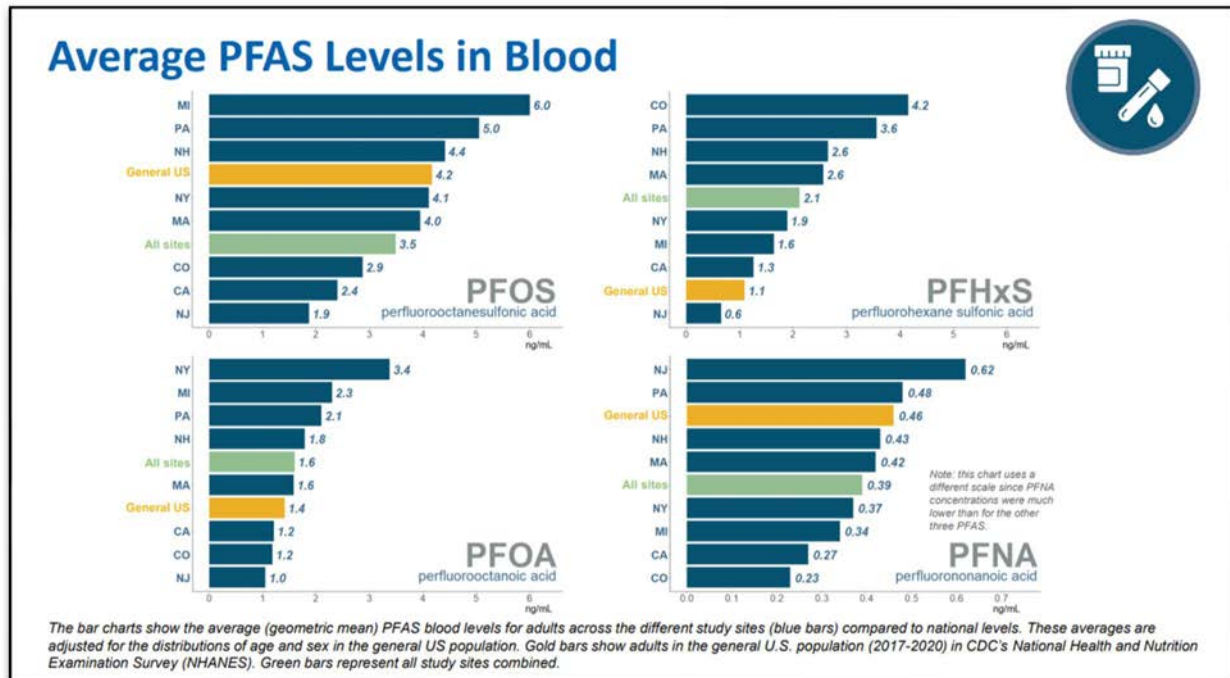
Figure 7 - CDC Multi-site Study Site Orange County, CA

Researchers at the University of California, Irvine (UCI) are participating in the CDC Multi-site Study (MSS).³⁶ The MSS provides information to communities about the health effects of exposure to PFAS. The UCI MSS site is the area in Orange County, shown at Figure 7.

At the July 2025 MSS update, the UCI researchers shared results showing average levels of certain PFAS chemicals in the blood of adults who participated at the Orange County study site. They compared Orange County results with other study locations and with national averages. For adults at the Orange County site, the average blood levels were estimated to be 2.4 for PFOS, 1.2 for PFOA, 1.3 for PFHxS, and 0.27 for PFNA (measured in nanograms per milliliter, ng/L) These levels were lower than the averages seen across all study sites. In addition, all of these levels, except PFHxS, were lower than the average levels found in the general U.S. population. See Figure 8 for the UCI MSS chart of Average PFAS Levels in Blood.³⁷ On the chart, the Orange County study site is labeled "CA." Orange County is the only California location included in the study.

Because of the phasing out of certain PFAS compounds, serum levels of PFOA and PFOS in the general population of the US have decreased dramatically in recent years. According to the CDC, blood levels of both PFOS and PFOA have steadily decreased in US residents since 1999-2000.³⁸

The half-life of PFAS in the human body is defined as the time required for the PFAS concentrations in serum or plasma to fall by half from the starting concentration.³⁹ Thirteen studies conducted mainly in Europe and the US involving both general populations and exposed workers resulted in half-life estimates for PFOA of 2.73 years (range: 1.48 to 5.1 years), 4.70 years for PFOS (range: 1.69 to 5.7 years), and 5.31 years for PFHxS (range: 2.84 to 8.5 years).⁴⁰ Based on that information, with no additional exposure, it could be anticipated that PFAS may be cleared from the body after an average of five years. However, PFAS exposures continue in general

populations primarily through food and water despite production phase outs and regulatory interventions.

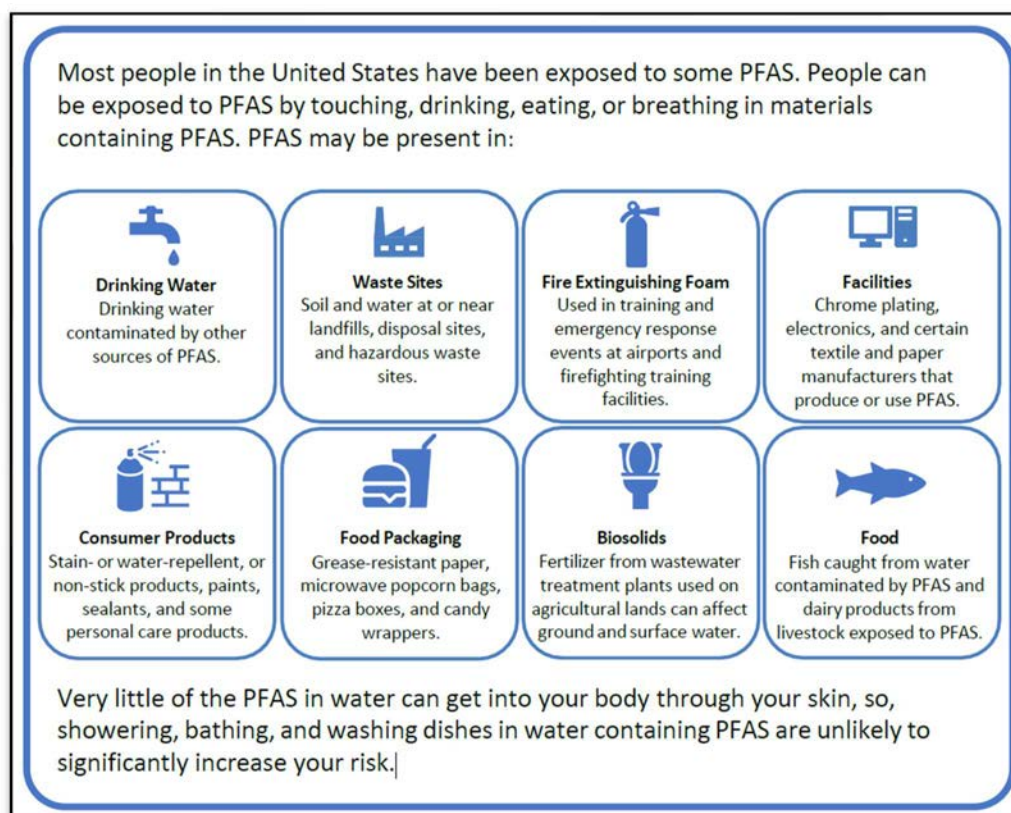
How Are People Exposed to PFAS?

There is general agreement that dietary intake is the largest source of PFAS exposure rather than inhalation or dermal contact.⁴¹ Direct exposures due to use in products can be quickly phased out by production phaseouts but exposures driven by PFAS accumulation in the environment, food chains, and contamination of groundwater and drinking water persist because of the continuing PFAS cycle. Human exposures to PFOS and PFOA, the two PFAS that are of greatest regulatory concern, have been declining due to regulatory interventions while understanding of their adverse effects on human health has been rapidly advancing. At the same time, a proliferation of new PFASs has rapidly replaced PFOS and PFOA with shorter chain length PFASs and new chemicals that are difficult to detect using standard methods.⁴² Emerging evidence from animal experiments suggests some of these alternative PFASs can be equally hazardous.⁴³

PFAS Exposure and Excretion

Exposure happens when a person breathes, eats, drinks, or touches a chemical and it enters their body. Excretion is the process whereby substances, like PFAS, leave the body. All PFAS can leave the body over time through urine, through menstrual blood or blood donation, or through breast milk. All of these factors could affect PFAS levels measured in blood.⁴⁵ While PFAS blood test results can tell you the amount of certain PFAS in your blood, the test results will not provide information to pinpoint a health problem and will not predict future health outcomes. You can talk with your healthcare provider about the benefits and limitations of PFAS blood testing.⁴⁶

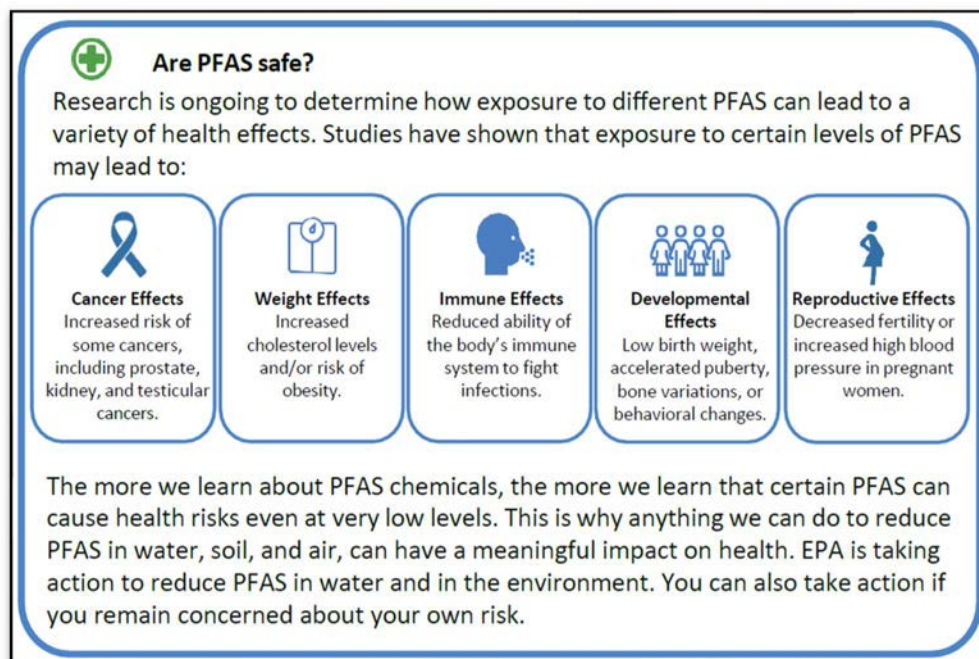
What are the Health Effects of Exposure?

Exposure to unsafe levels of PFOA/PFOS may result in adverse health effects including developmental effects to fetuses during pregnancy, cancer, liver effects, immune effects, thyroid effects, and other effects such as cholesterol changes.⁴⁷

Laboratory studies in animals who were exposed to PFAS found links between the chemicals and increased cholesterol, changes in the body's hormones, alterations of the immunologic system, decreased fertility, increased risk of cancer (especially kidney and testicular), low birth weight, delayed puberty onset, and birth defects. Since humans and animals react differently to PFAS, not all effects observed in animals may occur in humans. Although many epidemiology studies have examined the potential of PFAS to result in adverse health effects, most of the studies are cross-sectional in design and do not establish causality. Based on several factors outlined in the report of PFAS by the CDC including the consistency of findings across studies, the available epidemiology studies suggest associations between PFAS exposure and several health outcomes in humans.⁴⁸

PFAS Regulatory Requirements

Public drinking water systems are required to follow certain regulations to ensure that the water they serve to their customers is safe to drink.⁵⁰

In recent years, specific regulations have been issued to address PFAS contamination that require monitoring and taking actions when PFAS is detected in drinking water sources. The following sections present PFAS regulations in the order they were issued by the EPA and California State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB).

PFAS Monitoring Requirements

Monitoring refers to the collection and evaluation of data for contaminants that are suspected of being present in water. Samples are collected and analyzed according to EPA-approved laboratory methods. Monitoring results are reported to either the EPA or SWRCB. This data serves as a primary source of occurrence and exposure information used to develop regulatory decisions.

OCWD conducts all sampling and analyses and reporting of monitoring results to regulatory agencies on behalf of its member agencies. OCWD owns and operates its

own EPA-certified laboratory where it can use analytical methods approved by the EPA. MWDOC member agencies conduct monitoring activities using either their own staff or contractors to collect samples, which are delivered to EPA-certified laboratories for analyses. Laboratories report the results of their analyses to each MWDOC water retailer, who then reports the results to either the EPA or SWRCB.

EPA Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule

EPA uses the Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule (UCMR) to collect data every five years for no more than 30 priority contaminants that are suspected to be present in drinking water and do not have health-based standards set under the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA).⁵¹ The UCMR applies to all large public water systems (PWSs) serving greater than 10,000 people, all small PWSs serving between 3,300 and 10,000 people, and a representative sample of small PWSs serving fewer than 3,300 people.

EPA establishes the list of contaminants for each five-year UCMR cycle, considering an initial list of contaminants that are not regulated by the National Primary Drinking Water Regulations, are known or anticipated to occur at PWSs, and may warrant regulation under the SDWA.⁵²

The SDWA Public Notification Rule ensures that consumers will receive notice if there is a risk to public health from their drinking water. The Public Notification Rule requires that all PWSs notify their customers of the availability of UCMR results no later than 12-months after results are known. CWS are required to report UCMR results in their Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) when unregulated contaminants are detected. The annual drinking water quality report must include notice of availability of unregulated contaminant monitoring results, the average of the year's results and the range of detections.⁵³

The Grand Jury obtained UCMR monitoring data for all sampling and analyses conducted to fulfill UCMR requirements for its member agencies. The highest PFAS detections for all OCWD sources during the UCMR 3 and UCMR 5 monitoring cycles are shown at Figure 11.

California State Water Resources Control Board PFAS General Monitoring Orders

Beginning in 2020, the SWRCB Division of Drinking Water, based on review of monitoring results from its 2019 PFAS monitoring orders, determined that it was necessary to expand monitoring to groundwater sources located within the vicinity of the PFAS detections. Several PFAS general monitoring orders were issued to PWSs 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2025 that included Orange County groundwater well locations.⁵⁴

Each of the SWRCB PFAS monitoring orders included requirements for sample collection and laboratory analysis by specific dates, to be followed by monitoring conducted every calendar quarter thereafter.⁵⁵ These PFAS monitoring orders established Consumer Confidence Report Detection Levels (CCRD), and Notification and Response Levels for each PFAS chemical to be monitored. A list of the SWRCB PFAS monitoring orders and exhibits identifying groundwater sources required to be monitored are shown at Appendix A, as well as copies of the CCRDL for each monitoring order.

The Grand Jury obtained monitoring data for all sampling and analyses conducted to fulfill SWRCB monitoring order requirements for sources listed in the monitoring orders that are owned by their member agencies. The highest PFAS detections for all these OCWD sources are shown at Figure 12.

2025 SWRCB General Order DW 2025-0002-DDW

The 2025 SWRCB General Order, issued on December 12, 2025, adopted the initial monitoring requirements in the federal PFAS Rule for each California CWS and non-transient, non-community water system. The 2025 SWRCB Order allows previously acquired data to count toward initial monitoring if collected on or after January 1, 2019, and reported concentrations no greater than the respective MCL.⁵⁶

The 2025 SWRCB General Order also included a list of Orange County groundwater sources showing that 151 of the 198 listed sources had completed initial monitoring as required by the federal PFAS Rule.⁵⁷

PFAS Notification and Response Requirements

Notification and response levels are health-based advisory levels established by the SWRCB Division of Drinking Water (DDW) for chemicals in drinking water that do not have established MCLs.

When chemicals are found in drinking water at concentrations greater than their notification levels, PWSs are required by law to make specific notifications. When

chemicals are found in drinking water at concentrations greater than their response levels, DDW recommends removal of a drinking water source from service.⁵⁸

PFAS notification and response levels specified in CCRDLs attached to SWRCB general monitoring orders remain in effect until MCLs are established and become effective. For example, MCLs for specific PFAS will become effective in 2029, and at that time will supersede notification and response levels specified the 2022 CCRDL.

PFAS National Primary Drinking Water Regulation

In April 2024 EPA announced the final National Primary Drinking Water Regulation for six PFAS (the federal PFAS Rule).⁵⁹ The PFAS Rule applies to all CWS. The EPA expects that over many years this rule will prevent PFAS exposure in drinking for approximately 100 million people, prevent thousands of deaths, and reduce tens of thousands of serious PFAS-attributable illnesses.⁶⁰

The PFAS Rule establishes initial monitoring and compliance monitoring requirements, and enforceable maximum contaminant levels (MCL) for six PFAS in drinking water. Initial monitoring for six listed PFAS must be implemented beginning April 2024 and must be completed no later than April 26, 2027. Compliance monitoring requirements beginning April 26, 2027, will be either triennial, annual, or quarterly as determined by the SWRCB based on results of the initial monitoring.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant allowed in drinking water. EPA has established legally enforceable MCLs of 4.0 parts per trillion (ppt) for PFOA and PFOS, and 10.0 ppt for PFHxS, PFNA, and HFPO-DA (GenX chemicals). Figure 13 shows the MCLs and MCLG effective April 26, 2029.

Ensuring compliance with drinking water MCLs for the PFAS of most concern is the reason over \$600 million (see Figure 17) is being spent to construct PFAS treatment facilities in Orange County.

In addition to ongoing compliance monitoring and MCLs, the PFAS Rule also includes additional requirements with future effective dates. Between April 2027 and April 2029, if monitoring shows that drinking water levels exceed MCLs, CWS must implement solutions that reduce these PFAS; results of initial monitoring must be included in the CCR; results of compliance monitoring must be included in the CCR; and public notification is required for monitoring and testing violations. Starting April 2029, CWS that have MCL violations must take action to reduce levels of these PFAS in their drinking water, and public notification is required for MCL violations.

Compliance with Regulatory Requirements

Consumer Confidence Reports

The Grand Jury reviewed the 2025 Consumer Confidence Reports (Water Quality Reports) issued by 31 water retailers serving Orange County. The CCR is to be delivered to all billing customers by July 1 of each year and must include specified information. All 31 water retailers complied with the eight content requirements specified by the EPA, shown in Appendix B.⁶² Seven of the 11 water retailers operating PFAS

treatment facilities in Orange County included a PFAS advisory section in their CCRs, while only 55 percent of the 31 water retailers included any PFAS advisory statement.

The Grand Jury found that the 31 Orange County water retailers reported either “not detected” results or concentrations below notification thresholds for the six PFAS listed in the EPA PFAS Rule on their 2025 CCRs. After PFAS treatment facilities became operational, OCWD member retailers operating these facilities consistently reported “not detected” results for the same six PFAS. The Grand Jury found that PFAS results from individual wells do not necessarily reflect the quality of water delivered to customers, as some tested wells were later placed into inactive status or destroyed. CCRs documented PFAS constituents exceeding notification levels as required and did not report “not detected” results for those constituents. Monitoring results and CCRs are available in the Safe Drinking Water Information System (SDWIS), California’s official database for tracking public water systems, drinking water quality monitoring, regulatory compliance, and enforcement.⁶³

Notification and Response

As of 2020, drinking water retailers with PFAS detections above notification and response levels at wells without PFAS treatment facilities began to rely on imported water, or groundwater blended with imported water to deliver drinking water with PFAS concentrations below notification and response levels. As of 2021, multiple water retailers in Orange County shut down groundwater wells after PFAS concentrations at those wells exceeded established response levels.⁶⁴

PFAS Rule Initial Monitoring

When the 2025 SWRCB General Order adopting the PFAS National Primary Drinking Water Regulation was issued in December 2025, 76% of listed Orange County groundwater sources had already completed initial monitoring required to be completed by April 2027. Most of the remaining Orange County sources received credit for previously acquired data, leaving only 6% with all requirements to be completed by April 2027.

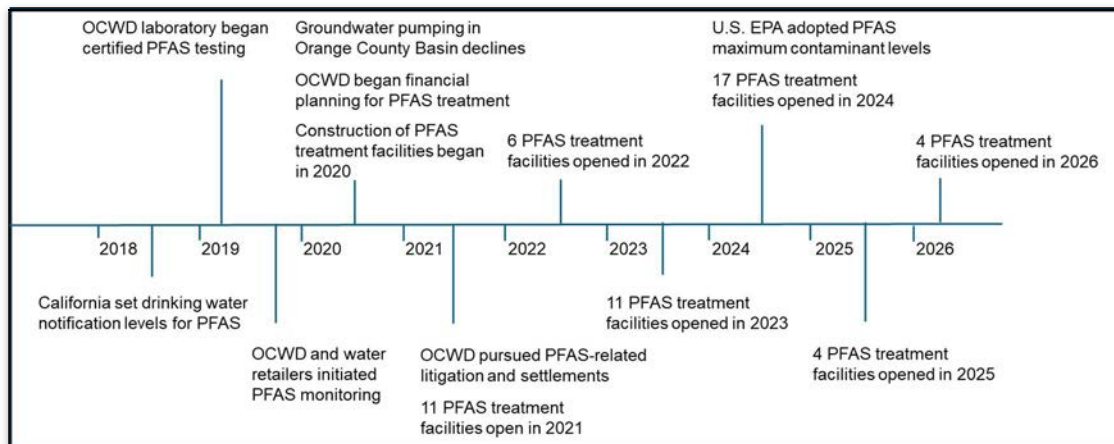

Proactive Response to PFAS Impacts

PFAS Impacts and OCWD Response

OCWD coordinated a regional response to PFAS contamination in partnership with its member agencies. These efforts focus on restoring the groundwater basin, which supplies up to 85 percent of the water used by approximately 2.5 million residents in north and central Orange County. A timeline of OCWD response to PFAS in the Orange County Groundwater Basin is shown in Figure 14. As PFAS-impacted groundwater wells began to be shut down in early 2020, public education became a critical component of community water systems' response. OCWD dedicated resources to public outreach, including the development of informational web pages to inform the public about PFAS impacts and the measures being implemented to address them.⁶⁵

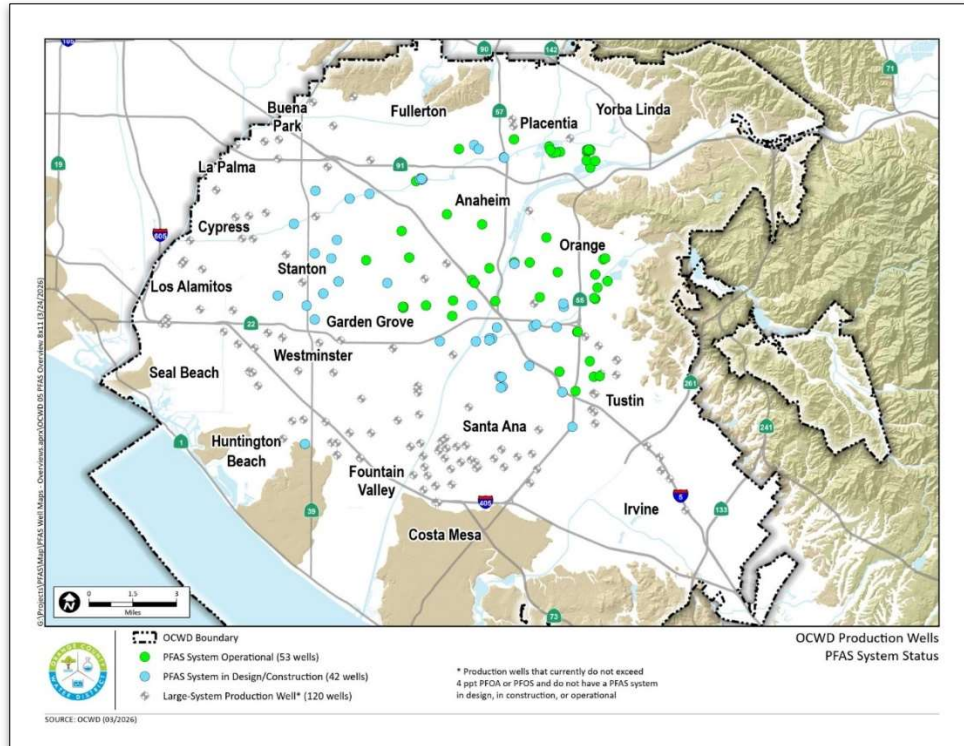
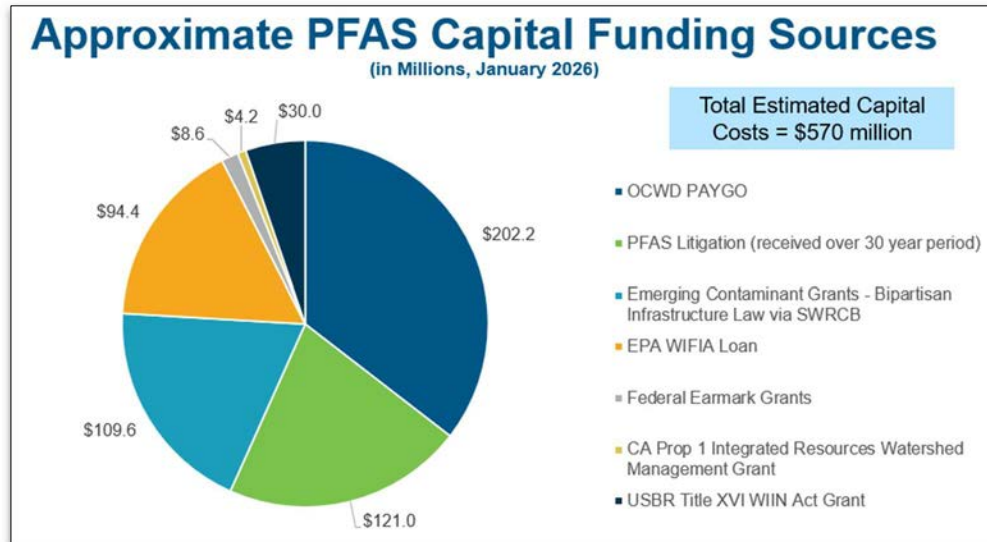


Figure 15 - Map of Current and Future PFAS Treatment Locations

PFAS contamination has impacted more than 100 groundwater wells across 15 water retailers. As of this report, 53 wells have returned to service following construction of treatment facilities. Figure 15 shows a map of current and future PFAS treatment locations in Orange County.

PFAS Treatment Facilities and Capital Costs

Construction of PFAS treatment facilities began in 2020. OCWD executed the PFAS Treatment Facilities and Program Agreement, under which OCWD funds capital costs and shares operating and maintenance (O&M) costs with participating water retailers.

Figure 16 summarizes projected PFAS capital funding sources as of January 2026, including OCWD pay-as-you-go (PAYGO) revenue, state and federal grants, an EPA Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) loan, and litigation settlement proceeds. The Grand Jury commends OCWD for securing diversified funding sources to advance timely treatment facility construction.

Figure 17 summarizes PFAS treatment facilities by water retailer, opening date, treatment technology, capacity, location, connections, number of wells, and capital costs. Facilities began entering service in mid-2021, starting with a treatment plant in Fullerton, with additional facilities becoming operational over time. Most facilities use ion exchange technology. Capital costs vary based on the number of affected wells, conveyance pipeline requirements, and treatment facility configuration.

OCWD is funding the reasonable costs of designing and constructing PFAS treatment facilities for its member water retailers. Each retailer could either have OCWD design and build the treatment facility or receive reimbursement for designing and constructing the treatment system independently. As of this report, 38 wells with PFAS treatment were built by OCWD and fifteen wells with PFAS treatment were designed and built by the water retailers.

Eighteen wells with PFAS treatment construction projects by OCWD have been completed on schedule. Ten wells with PFAS treatment projects, which were built by OCWD, were completed on schedule; however, OCWD experienced cost overruns due to specialized design requirements or owner-requested improvements. An additional 10 wells with PFAS treatment projects that were done by OCWD were completed late and over budget, primarily due to pandemic-related material delays, design complexity, owner-requested improvements, and utility coordination challenges.

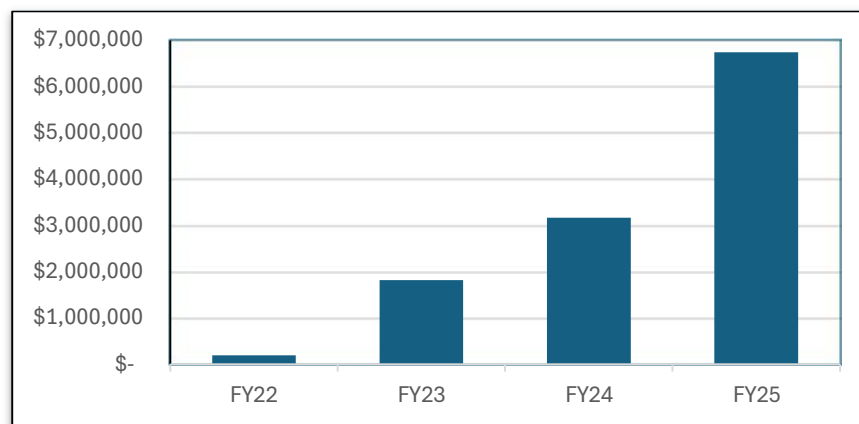

Operations and Maintenance Costs

Under the PFAS Treatment Facilities and Program Agreement, OCWD reimburses 50 percent of eligible operations and maintenance (O&M) costs incurred by participating water agencies. Eligible O&M costs include treatment media replacement, power and chemical costs, routine maintenance, repairs, staffing, compliance monitoring, regulatory compliance activities, additional pumping, waste disposal, sewer costs, and other necessary system maintenance expenses.

Actual PFAS treatment expenses (see Figure 18), which can be found in Annual Comprehensive Financial Reports (ACFRs),⁶⁶ varied primarily due to construction timing and the performance of ion exchange resin media. Specialized resins are a key element in PFAS treatment and help remove PFAS from water using electrostatics. Construction delays meant some treatment facilities were not operational as expected, resulting in lower O&M costs. In FY22 and FY23, initial resin media lasted longer than anticipated and reduced O&M costs. In contrast, FY25 experienced more resin changeouts than anticipated and higher O&M costs. Resin media life varies by treatment system and operating conditions, such as run time, cycling frequency, and production flow rates. OCWD is updating resin performance assumptions and changeout frequency estimates to improve future O&M forecasts.

Program Status and Future Plans

The overall OCWD PFAS Treatment Systems Project currently includes 11 water retailers, with construction planned or underway for four additional retailers, expanding the program to 15. Fifty-three treatment systems are operational. Construction

continues on 20 additional systems, with design work underway for 24 more. Here is a list of PFAS projects in design or under construction as of May 2026:

- Golden State Water Company Wells SLON and SORG are still in planning. Well SSYC is in design and is anticipated to start construction in Fiscal Year 26/27.
- Tustin 17th Street Well is nearing the start of design.
- Huntington Beach Well 3A, Anaheim Wells 39 and 47, Tustin Edinger Well are all in the design phase and are anticipated to start construction in Fiscal Year 26/27.
- Buena Park Linden Well is currently in construction.

Figure 19 indicates the estimated average monthly cost of PFAS treatment to OCWD service area residents is \$1.42 per person. OCWD anticipates continued design and construction activity over several years.

FINDINGS

In accordance with California Penal Code Sections 933 and 933.05, the 2025-2026 Orange County Grand Jury requires (or, as noted, requests) responses from each agency affected by the findings presented in this section. The responses are to be submitted to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court.

Based on its investigation described herein, the 2025-2026 Orange County Grand Jury has arrived at the following six principal findings:

- F1 Commercial and industrial chemical manufacturers are a major source of PFAS contamination. Settlement litigation funds are available for community water systems to make claims.
- F2 PFAS is widespread, and contamination has been detected in Orange County groundwater sources. Community water systems are required to report PFAS monitoring results in their annual Consumer Confidence Reports.
- F3 PFAS exposure is associated with potential adverse human health effects.
- F4 OCWD has taken a proactive leadership role in addressing PFAS in the Orange County Groundwater Basin, though PFAS treatment implementation varies across local cities and water districts.
- F5 Groundwater supplies must either be treated to remove PFAS or must be replaced with imported water supplies that are significantly more expensive than groundwater. Over \$500 million is being spent on construction, operations, and maintenance of PFAS treatment facilities in Orange County.
- F6 Orange County drinking water meets or exceeds state and federal standards and is safe for consumption without additional home filtration.
- F7 Research on newer PFAS compounds and long-term exposure effects is ongoing.
- F8 There are limited online PFAS education and outreach programs among Orange County water retailers. Most retailers rely on OCWD for PFAS education and outreach. PFAS advisories were included in approximately 55% of the Orange County water retailers' annual water quality reports in 2025.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In accordance with California Penal Code Sections 933 and 933.05, the 2025-2026 Orange County Grand Jury requires (or, as noted, requests) responses from each agency affected by the recommendations presented in this section. The responses are to be submitted to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court.

Based on its investigation described herein, the 2025-2026 Orange County Grand Jury makes the following recommendations:

- R1** By September 30, 2026, Orange County Water District (OCWD), in coordination with state and federal agencies, should pursue cost recovery efforts against PFAS manufacturers to offset treatment, monitoring, and long-term remediation costs incurred by local water agencies and ratepayers. [F1, F5]
- R2** By July 1, 2029, OCWD and its member agencies should monitor PFAS in groundwater and surface water sources and promptly implement PFAS treatment when response levels are exceeded. [F2, F4]
- R3** By September 30, 2026, OCWD, in collaboration with the Orange County Health Care Agency, should update public education and guidance continually as scientific understanding and regulatory standards evolve. [F3]
- R4** By July 1, 2029, all Orange County water retailers should consistently include a PFAS advisory, treatment facilities status, and compliance information in consumer confidence reports and on agency websites, using clear and understandable language for the public. [F2, F8]
- R5** By September 30, 2026, OCWD and all Orange County water retailers should enhance coordinated public education efforts to reassure their customers about drinking water safety. [F6, F8]
- R6** By September 30, 2026, OCWD should continuously monitor national and international PFAS research developments and incorporate new findings into future groundwater management, treatment planning, and regulatory compliance strategies. [F7]

COMMENDATIONS

Many Orange County water agencies have demonstrated exceptional leadership in addressing PFAS through large-scale treatment investments, rigorous monitoring, and public communication. Together, these agencies serve more than two million residents and have implemented some of the most advanced PFAS treatment systems in the nation. The following commendations recognize high-impact programs and measurable achievements across the region.

Orange County Water District (OCWD)

OCWD has implemented the largest PFAS treatment program in the United States, designing and constructing treatment systems for over 100 impacted wells across 15 cities and retail water districts, improving water quality for approximately 1.5 million people. OCWD secured a \$94M EPA Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) loan, \$152M in state and federal grant funding, and \$131M in PFAS manufacturers litigation settlement funds to support this effort, which includes the build-out of more than 30 PFAS treatment facilities.

The Grand Jury offers additional commendations to OCWD and its member agencies for their collaborative cost-sharing agreement. Under this arrangement, OCWD fully funds all PFAS facility design and construction capital expenditures. Ongoing operations and maintenance costs are then shared equally, with OCWD covering 50% and each participating water retailer contributing the remaining 50% for the PFAS treatment facilities they operate. This approach reflects progressive public-sector planning, demonstrating how agencies can work together to address complex and costly challenges. It also serves as a strong model for future government/private-sector cost-sharing agreements, illustrating how thoughtful collaboration can enhance efficiency and long-term public benefit.

Anaheim Water Utility

Anaheim has launched one of the largest municipal PFAS treatment programs in the country, a multi-phase, \$150M effort to construct treatment systems at nine groundwater sites. The utility serves 64,000 metered customers, historically relying on groundwater for 80% of its supply. PFAS treatment systems for Wells 39 and 47 are among the first in a series of facilities designed to restore local production while meeting stringent state and federal standards.

Yorba Linda Water District (YLWD)

YLWD operates the J. Wayne Miller, Ph.D. Water Treatment Plant, recognized as the nation's largest PFAS ion-exchange treatment facility. The plant serves approximately 80,000 customers and has delivered PFAS-free water for nearly three consecutive years. This facility allows YLWD to optimize its groundwater resources while proactively meeting evolving PFAS regulatory standards.

RESPONSES

The following excerpts from the California Penal Code provide the requirements for public agencies to respond to the Findings and Recommendations of this Grand Jury report:

§933

(c) No later than 90 days after the grand jury submits a final report on the operations of any public agency subject to its reviewing authority, the governing body of the public agency shall comment to the presiding judge of the superior court on the findings and recommendations pertaining to matters under the control of the governing body, and every elected county officer or agency head for which the grand jury has responsibility pursuant to Section 914.1 shall comment within 60 days to the presiding judge of the superior court, with an information copy sent to the board of supervisors, on the findings and recommendations pertaining to matters under the control of that county officer or agency head and any agency or agencies which that officer or agency head supervises or controls. In any city and county, the mayor shall also comment on the findings and recommendations. All of these comments and reports shall forthwith be submitted to the presiding judge of the superior court who impaneled the grand jury. A copy of all responses to grand jury reports shall be placed on file with the clerk of the public agency and the office of the county clerk, or the mayor when applicable, and shall remain on file in those offices. One copy shall be placed on file with the applicable grand jury final report by, and in the control of the currently impaneled grand jury, where it shall be maintained for a minimum of five years.

§933.05.

(a) For purposes of subdivision (b) of Section 933, as to each grand jury finding, the responding person or entity shall indicate one of the following:

(1) The respondent agrees with the finding.

(2) The respondent disagrees wholly or partially with the finding, in which case the response shall specify the portion of the finding that is disputed and shall include an explanation of the reasons, therefore.

(b) For purposes of subdivision (b) of Section 933, as to each grand jury recommendation, the responding person or entity shall report one of the following actions:

(1) The recommendation has been implemented, with a summary regarding the implemented action.

(2) The recommendation has not yet been implemented, but will be implemented in the future, with a timeframe for implementation.

(3) The recommendation requires further analysis, with an explanation and the scope and parameters of an analysis or study, and a timeframe for the matter to be prepared for discussion by the officer or head of the agency or department being investigated or reviewed, including the governing body of the public agency when applicable. This timeframe shall not exceed six months from the date of publication of the grand jury report.

(4) The recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted or is not reasonable, with an explanation, therefore.

(c) However, if a finding or recommendation of the grand jury addresses budgetary or personnel matters of a county agency or department headed by an elected officer, both the agency or department head and the board of supervisors shall respond if requested by the grand jury, but the response of the board of supervisors shall address only those budgetary or personnel matters over which it has some decision-making authority. The response of the elected agency or department head shall address all aspects of the findings or recommendations affecting his or her agency or department.

(d) A grand jury may request a subject person or entity to come before the grand jury for the purpose of reading and discussing the findings of the grand jury report that relates to that person or entity in order to verify the accuracy of the findings prior to their release.

(e) During an investigation, the grand jury shall meet with the subject of that investigation regarding the investigation, unless the court, either on its own determination or upon request of the foreperson of the grand jury, determines that such a meeting would be detrimental.

(f) A grand jury shall provide to the affected agency a copy of the portion of the grand jury report relating to that person or entity two working days prior to its public release and after the approval of the presiding judge. No officer, agency, department, or governing body of a public agency shall disclose any contents of the report prior to the public release of the final report.

▶ Item 1: Water System Information – Name/phone number of a contact person; information on public participation opportunities. ▶ Item 2: Source(s) of Water. ▶ Item 3: Definitions – Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL); MCL Goal (MCLG); Treatment Technique (TT); Action Level (AL); Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL); MRDL Goal (MRDLG). ▶ Item 4: Detected Contaminants – A table summarizing reported concentrations and relevant MCLs and MCLGs or MRDLs and MRDLGs; known source of detected contaminants; health effects language. ▶ Item 5: Information on Monitoring for <i>Cryptosporidium</i>, Radon, and Other Contaminants (if detected). ▶ Item 6: Compliance with Other Drinking Water Regulations (any violations and Ground Water Rule [GWR] special notices). ▶ Item 7: Variances and Exemptions (if applicable). ▶ Item 8: Required Educational Information – Explanation of contaminants in drinking water and bottled water; information to vulnerable populations about <i>Cryptosporidium</i>; statements on nitrate, arsenic, and lead.
Optional Information
CWSs are not limited to providing only the required information in their CCR. CWSs may want to include: ▶ An explanation (or include a diagram of) the CWSs treatment processes. ▶ Source water protection efforts and/or water conservation tips. ▶ Costs of making the water safe to drink. ▶ A statement from the mayor or general manager. ▶ Information to educate customers about: Taste and odor issues, affiliations with programs such as the Partnership for Safe Water, opportunities for public participation, etc.
Communication Tips
▶ Provide a consistent message. Be as simple, truthful, and straightforward as possible. Avoid acronyms, initials, and jargon. ▶ Provide links to useful information resources. ▶ Limit wordiness – write short sentences and keep your paragraphs short. ▶ Assume that consumers will only read the top half of the notice or what can be read in 10 seconds. ▶ Display important elements in bold and/or large type in the top half of the notice. ▶ Do not make your text size too small. ▶ Give a draft of your CCR to relatives or friends who are not drinking water experts and ask them if it makes sense. Ask customers for their comments when you publish the CCR. ▶ Use graphics, photographs, maps, and drawings to illustrate your message. Do not distract from your main message with graphics and/or pictures that do not complement your message. ▶ Consider printing the CCR on recycled paper and taking other steps to make the CCR "environmentally friendly." If you hope to get your customers involved in protecting or conserving water, set a good example for them to follow. ▶ Use the CCR as an opportunity to tell your customers about all of the things that you are doing well.

DISCUSSION

Mesa Water District's (Mesa Water®) outreach program aims to connect Mesa Water with its customers and constituents to achieve Goal #4 of the Board of Directors' (Board) Strategic Plan. Outreach activities that increase public awareness of Mesa Water include informing the District's constituents about Mesa Water, current water issues, and water-use efficiency.

In Fiscal Year (FY) 2026, staff continued the concerted effort toward enhancing the Public Affairs program to increase awareness with customers about who their water provider is, and that Mesa Water delivers a 100% local, reliable, clean, safe water supply, as measured by the annual customer survey. Staff leveraged the opening of the Mesa Water Education and Career Center (MWECC), continued the New Customer Welcome and 25-Year Anniversary Programs, hosted in-person events such as Community Directors Chats, participated in various community events, and used its owned communication channels (social media, direct mail, earned media, and *News on Tap*) to continue to expand reach and amplify messaging to customers and new audiences.

The Public Affairs team will work to accomplish Strategic Goal #4, Objective A: Enhance Mesa Water's visibility and positive recognition. This goal includes completing a website user analysis to improve the user experience of MesaWater.org, conducting an RFP to select a qualified social media consultant, and reaching all customers through strategic collaborations and partnerships.

Field trips, tours, and event space rentals will continue to be the cornerstone of the MWECC programs, with a goal of hosting 100 field trips and tours in FY 2027. Staff will focus on developing a research-driven plan for a high school and college education program at the MWECC which will lay the groundwork for new career pathways into the water industry. Staff plans to launch quarterly public tours at the MWECC, which supports Strategic Plan Goal #4, Objective B: Increase awareness of Mesa Water and water among key audiences.



With the addition of a Water Use Efficiency Specialist/Analyst, Public Affairs will take on Strategic Goal #4, Objective C: Increase customer knowledge about water-use efficiency and water-wise resources by hosting two water-wise landscape workshops.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2027, \$861,035 is budgeted for Public Affairs Support Services; \$72,385 has been spent to date.

STRATEGIC PLAN

Goal #3: Be financially responsible and transparent.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION

At its October 12, 2004, meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) adopted Resolution No. 1307, Establishing a Policy to Solicit Proposals for Outside Auditing Services Superseding Resolution No. 1226. Under Resolution No. 1307, at the discretion of the Board and upon conclusion of the initial three-year term, the Board may authorize up to two additional one-year renewals with the current firm. In addition, the policy imposed a limit of five consecutive annual audits by the same firm.

In April 2011, Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) issued a financial audit Request for Proposals (RFP) and received proposals from three firms: Diehl Evans & Company, Mayer Hoffman McCann, and Lance, Soll & Lunghard. The Board selected Mayer Hoffman McCann (now Davis Farr) to perform annual financial audits from Fiscal Year (FY) 2011 to FY 2013 with options to renew for FY 2014 and FY 2015, which were exercised. Davis Farr completed five financial audits; the cost of the final year's financial audit was \$25,700.

At its March 21, 2016 meeting, the Finance Committee reviewed Professional Auditing Services proposals from four firms and directed staff to agendize Financial Auditor Selection at the next Board Meeting.

At its April 14, 2016 meeting, the Board awarded a contract to White Nelson Diehl Evans LLP (WNDE) to perform annual financial audit services for fiscal years ending June 30, 2016, June 30, 2017, and June 30, 2018 with two optional one-year extensions.

At its April 18, 2016 workshop, the Board directed staff to agendize Financial Auditor Selection at a future Board meeting to reconsider the approved motion from the April 14, 2016 meeting.

At its May 19, 2016 meeting, the Board deferred Financial Auditor Selection to a future Finance Committee for further discussion.

At its June 20, 2016 meeting, the Finance Committee approved the scope of work within the



existing Professional Auditing Services RFPs, developed a scope of work and budget to conduct a Fraud Audit, and awarded a contract to WNDE to perform annual financial audit services for fiscal years ending June 30, 2016, June 30, 2017, and June 30, 2018 with two optional one-year extensions.

At its June 8, 2017 meeting, the Board adopted Resolution No. 1501 Establishing a Policy for the Selection Process for the Appointment of General Legal Counsel and Independent Auditor, Superseding Resolution No. 1307.

At its April 11, 2019 meeting, the Board approved two additional one-year renewals with WNDE to perform annual financial audit services for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2019 and June 30, 2020.

At its April 8, 2021 meeting, the Board approved a one-year contract extension, due to COVID-19 protocols, to Clifton, Larson, Allen (formerly WNDE) to perform annual financial audit services for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021.

At its January 25, 2022 Committee meeting, the Board received an information item on the Financial Auditor Selection.

At its February 22, 2022 Committee meeting, the Board directed staff to omit the interviews scheduled for March 8, 2022 and awarded a three-year contract with Lance, Soll & Lunghard, LLP (LSL) in the amount of \$136,650 to perform Financial Auditing Services.

At its March 26, 2025 meeting, the Board approved two one-year contract extensions, with LSL to perform annual financial audit services for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2025 and June 30, 2026.

DISCUSSION

Lance, Soll, & Lunghard LLP (LSL) has completed the last five annual financial audits and the preparation of the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2022, June 30, 2023, June 30, 2024, June 30, 2025, and June 30, 2026.

Mesa Water District solicited proposals in March 2026 from four qualified firms to perform financial audit services for fiscal years ending June 30, 2027, June 30, 2028, and June 30, 2029, with the option to extend the contract by two one-year periods.

The following four qualified firms submitted proposals:

- CJ Brown & Company
- Clifton, Larsen, Allen LLP (CLA)
- Davis Farr LLP
- Nigro & Nigro, PC

Staff recommends that the Board approve a contract with CLA to perform annual Financial Audit Services for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2027, through June 30, 2029, with the option to



extend the contract by two one-year periods with subsequent Board approval.

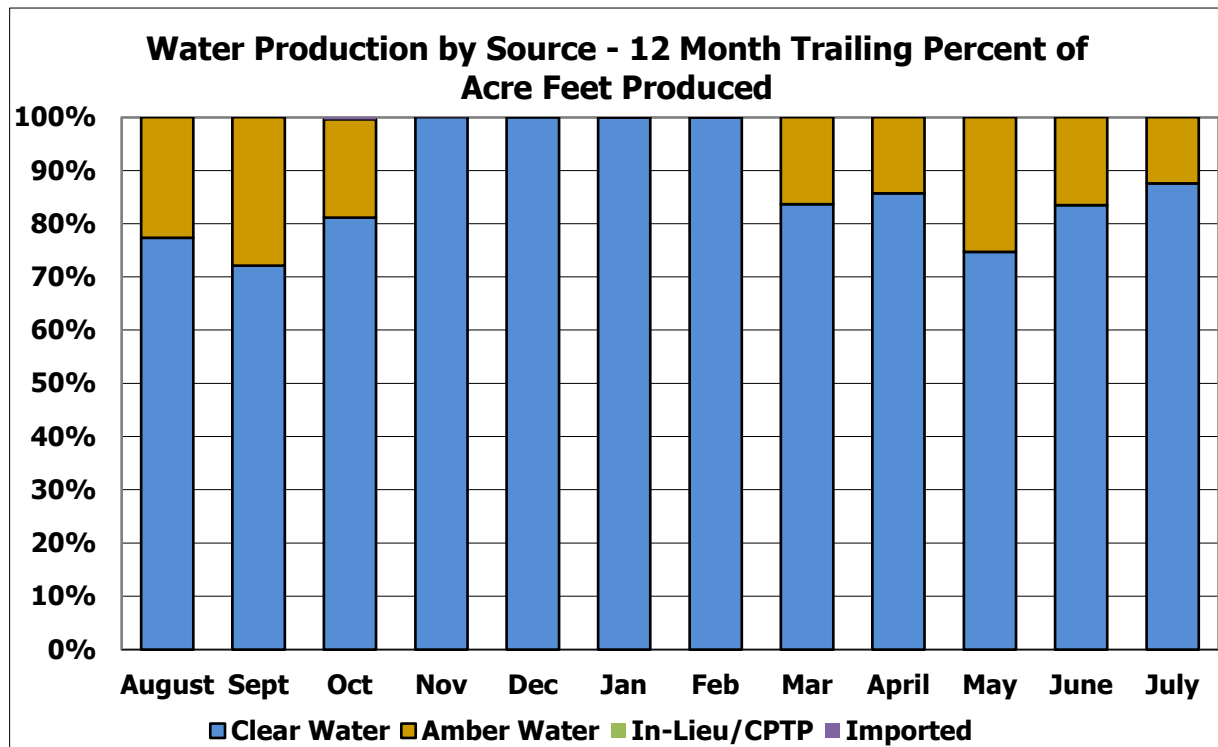

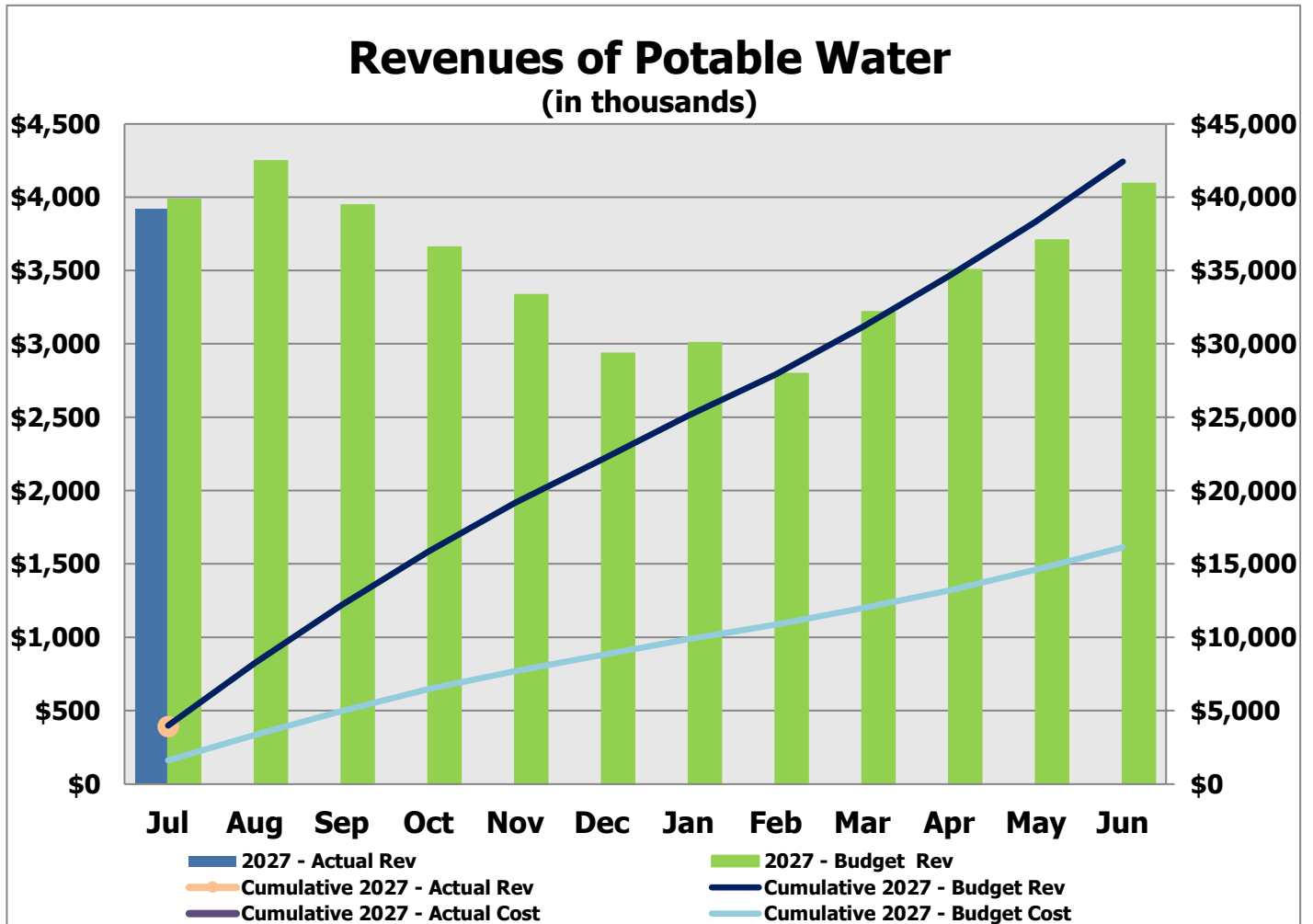

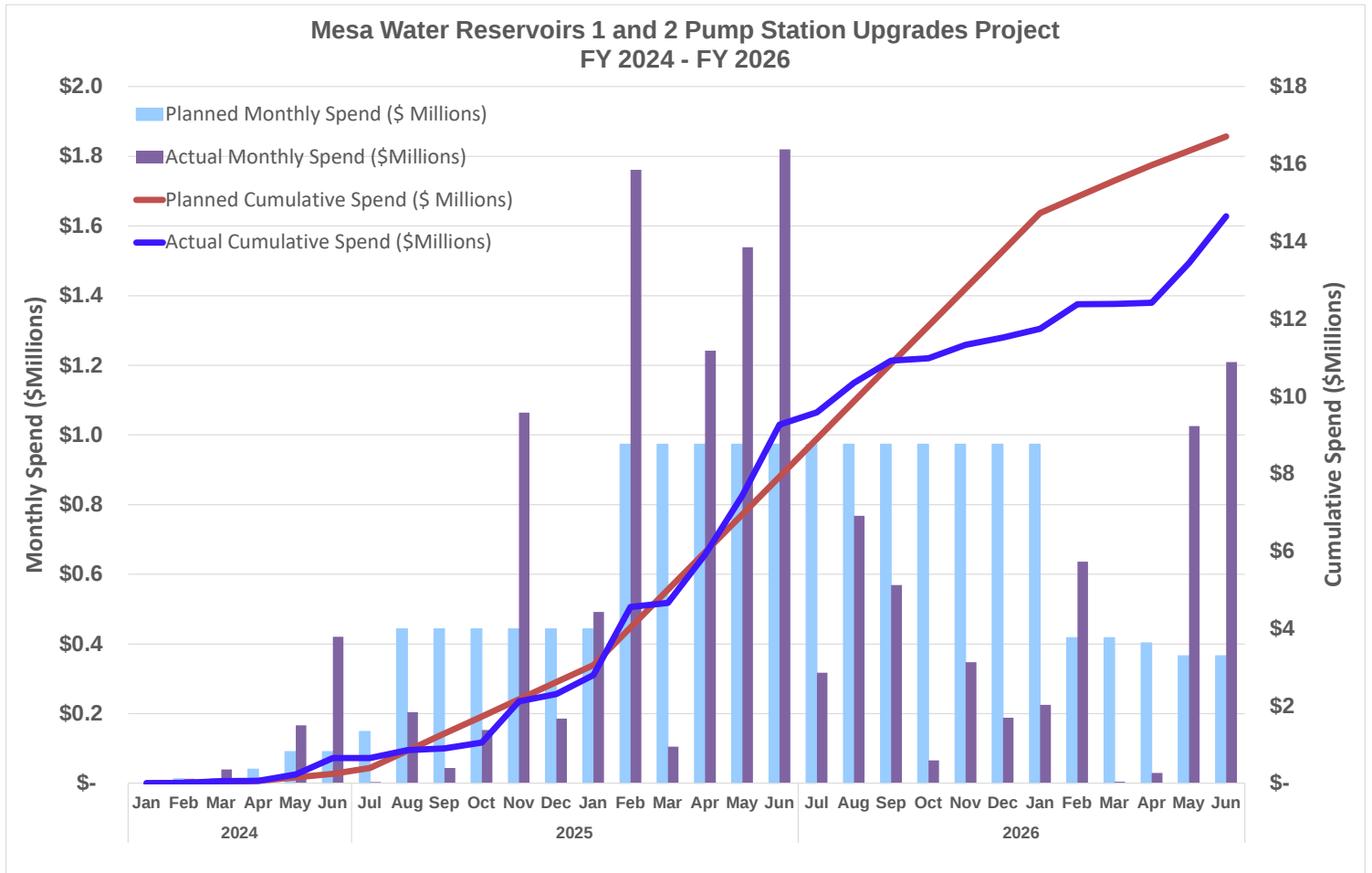

Federal Government Update

After failing to meet their goals of passing appropriations bills before entering summer recess, both the House and Senate have passed alternative continuing resolutions (CR) to extend funding until December to prevent a government shutdown. On July 21st, the House passed their CR to extend current funding levels and maintain funding until December 4th. The Senate passed their CR on August 18th, which will primarily extend FY26 funding and surface transportation authorities until December 11th. After returning from the August recess, the House and Senate will need to resolve differences in their versions before a CR can become law before the end of the federal fiscal year on September 30th.

Water Resources Development Act Advances Through House and Senate Committees

On July 15th, the Senate Environment and Public Works (EPW) Committee unanimously advanced the Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) of 2026. This biennial bipartisan legislation typically authorizes projects and programs of the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). However, the Senate version of WRDA reauthorizes Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) drinking water and wastewater infrastructure programs, including the State Revolving Funds (SRFs).

On July 14th, the House Transportation and Infrastructure (T&I) Committee unanimously advanced their version of the WRDA bill. If passed as currently written the bill will, under USACE, establish a new office of water supply and drought resilience, establish a new continuing authority program for small drought projects, and establish new authorities to tackle invasive species and restore water storage capacity. However, unlike the Senate bill, the House bill has no corresponding title related to reauthorizing EPA drinking water and wastewater programs.

Both bills are now awaiting consideration by their respective chambers.

Senators Mark Kelly and Rick Scott Introduce Bill to Replace CWSRF Formula

On July 16th, the [Clean Water Allotment Modernization Act of 2026](#) was introduced by Senators Mark Kelly (D-AZ) and Rick Scott (R-FL). The purpose of the bill is to replace the fixed percentage formula used by the EPA when allocating Clean Water State Revolving Fund grants. The bill would use a “needs-based formula recommended by a GAO expert panel, distributing funds based on documented infrastructure needs (60%), state population from the most recent census (20%), and share of population at or below 200% of the federal poverty level (20%).” Additionally, the bill will ensure the use of current data, cap annual allotment increases at 200% and decreases at

25% during the first four years and maintain dedicated funding for tribes and territories. Based on data from a 2024 Government Accountability Office (GAO) report, the new formula is expected to provide 31 states with either the same or an increased amount of funding, up to 260%, while 19 states would likely see reduced funding of up to 53%. The current formula uses a fixed percentage assigned to each state and territory under the 1987 Water Quality Act amendments. It sets a guaranteed minimum share of 0.5% for every state, but this has not been modified by Congress to reflect modern population shifts or infrastructure needs.

Interior Moves Toward Final Colorado River Operations Decision

As the current Colorado River conservation agreement is set to expire on December 31st, the federal government is stepping in with its own proposal after the seven basin states failed to reach an agreement on post-2026 operations in time. Following a failure to meet a deadline to submit a unified proposal in February, poor snowpack conditions, and back and forth negotiations between the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) and basin states, the Department of the Interior (DOI) released a final [Environmental Impact Statement \(EIS\)](#) for Post-2026 Operational Guidelines and Strategies for Lake Powell and Lake Mead on July 31st, with a record of decision and final operating guidelines expected by October 1st.

This plan will establish operating rules through 2036, require Lower Basin reductions of up to 3 million acre-feet per year, rely on two-year operating schedules, and encourage voluntary conservation from Upper Basin states as opposed to mandatory. As several states will be facing mandatory conservation and deliveries they're uncomfortable with, including Arizona who will see some of the largest reductions under this plan, litigation is expected following implementation in October.

CISA Announces Warning on Cyber Attacks

On July 30th, the U.S. Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) released an [alert](#) directing water and wastewater systems to take actions to protect themselves from cyber threats to operational technology. This alert comes after a recent uptick in bad actors targeting exposed programmable logic controllers to change passwords and IP addresses resulting in instances of boil water notices and sustained manual operations.

EPA Makes Significant Step in Fluoride Review

On August 3rd, the EPA released the [Protocol for Developing the Fluoride Human Health Toxicity Assessment](#), a major step in their expedited assessment of fluoride under the Safe Drinking Water Act. The protocol will be used to develop the draft fluoride human health toxicity assessment, which will be used to inform potential revisions to federal drinking water regulations. It will also help states and local leaders make informed decisions about fluoridating drinking water. When completed, the assessment will be available for public comment.

EPA Holds Roundtable on Water Sector Workforce Development

On August 4th, the EPA held a roundtable with water systems, water associations, states, and federal partners to discuss ways the agency can bolster the water sector workforce. The Administration is planning to use this conversation to inform the revitalization of the [2020 Water](#)

[Workforce Initiative](#). Among recruitment challenges, the EPA states “approximately one-third of drinking water and wastewater operators in the U.S. will be eligible to retire in the next 10 years,” validating the need for “collaboration to find solutions across federal, state, tribal and local governments as well as public utilities, the private sector, water sector associations, community groups and educational institutions.” Supported by the [Innovative Water Workforce Development Grant Program](#), this initiative will aim to develop apprenticeship programs, labor standards, education programs, and other resources to enhance the water utility workforce. Additionally, this initiative will train and improve skill levels of the existing workforce to ensure operation of modern water systems, implementation of cybersecurity, and management of aging infrastructure. Since 2018 the agency has invested more than \$13 million into workforce development, and plans to announce the next funding opportunity later this year.

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to make permanent the Low-Income Household Assistance Water Program (LIHWAP). This bill will allow HHS to award grants to eligible entities to provide funds to public water systems to assist low-income households in paying for drinking water or wastewater services.

Water Infrastructure Modernization Act (WIMA) ([S.2388](#), [H.R.6075](#)) Sen. Ruben Gallego (D-AZ), Rep. Robert Bresnahan (R-PA)

Status: Senate - 07/23/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Proven Forest Management Act of 2025 ([H.R.179](#)) Rep. Tom McClintock (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/08/2026 Reported (Amended) by the Committee on Natural Resources

Summary: This bill will expand forest management practices that have proven successful in reducing wildfire risks and promoting forest health, improving forest resiliency.

Filing Relief for Natural Disasters Act ([H.R.517](#)/[S.132](#)) Rep. David Kustoff (R-TN), Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV)

Status: House: 7/24/2025 Became law

Senate - 01/16/2025 Referred to the Committee on Finance.

Summary: This bill will grant the IRS the authority to postpone federal tax filing deadlines for taxpayers affected by state-declared disasters and states of emergency.

FEMA Independence Act ([H.R. 2308](#)) Rep. Jared Moskowitz (D-FL)

Status: House - 03/24/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Emergency Management and Technology.

Summary: This bill will remove FEMA from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and restore it as an independent, Cabinet-level agency.

Water Affordability, Transparency, Equity, and Reliability (WATER) Act of 2023 ([S.1730](#)) Sen. Bernard Sanders (I-VT)

Status: Senate - 05/13/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will assist communities in securing access to clean and reliable drinking water. This bill also contains provisions to combat PFAS and provide grants for low-income communities struggling with unaffordable water bills.

Veterans Exposed to Toxic PFAS Act ([H.R.3639](#)) Rep. Michael Lawler (R-NY)

Status: House - 06/06/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Health.

Summary: This bill provides eligibility for Department of Veterans Affairs hospital care and medical services to veterans and their family members (including those in utero) who have specified conditions and resided at a military installation where individuals were exposed to perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly known as PFAS.

National Prescribed Fire Act of 2025 ([H.R.3889](#), [S.2015](#)) Rep. Kim Schrier (D-WA), Sen. Ron Wyden (D-OR)

Status: House - 06/10/2025 Referred to the Committee on Natural Resources, and in addition to the Committees on Agriculture, and Energy and Commerce.

Senate - 12/17/2025 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will increase funding for Forest Service and DOI for prescribed burns, establish a program for implementation of prescribed burns, establish a program for workforce development, and facilitate coordination between land managers and air quality agencies to alter prescribed burn practices to reduce catastrophic smoke events in the summer.

PFAS National Drinking Water Standard Act of 2025 ([H.R.4168](#)) Rep. Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA)

Status: House - 06/26/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will codify the EPA's final PFAS National Primary Drinking Water Regulation, establishing enforceable maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for six of the most hazardous PFAS chemicals, including PFOA and PFOS, in public drinking water systems.

WILTR Act of 2025 ([H.R.4181](#)) Rep. Darrell Issa (R-CA)

Status: House - 06/26/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will incentivize wildfire prevention infrastructure and landowner preparedness through targeted tax relief.

The Healthy Drinking Water Affordability Act (Healthy H2O Act) ([H.R.4721](#), [S.2436](#)) Rep. David Rouzer (R-NC), Sen. Tammy Baldwin (D-WI)

Status: House - 07/23/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Agriculture.

Senate - 07/24/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: This bill will provide grants through the U.S. Department of Agriculture for water quality testing and to purchase and install point-of-entry water filtration systems to remove contaminants from drinking water.

Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program Reauthorization Act of 2025 ([S.2437](#)) Sen. John Hickenlooper (D-CO)

Status: Senate - 06/10/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation's Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program which provides grants to advance emerging snow monitoring technology that improve water supply predictions.

Fixing Emergency Management for Americans (FEMA) Act ([H.R.4669](#)) Rep. Sam Graves (R-MO)

Status: House - 09/03/2025 Ordered to be Reported (Amended) by the Yeas and Nays: 57 - 3

Summary: This bill will authorize and improve the Federal Emergency Management Agency and reform Federal disaster mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery.

Water Infrastructure Resiliency Act ([H.R.5513](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 09/20/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will clarify eligible uses under the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) to include modern software tools for the modernization of infrastructure.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([H.R.5566](#)) Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will fund upgrades to drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure to make them more resilient against threats by reauthorizing the following programs: Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, Midsize and Large Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, and the Clean Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Program.

Water Infrastructure Subcontractor and Taxpayer Protection Act ([H.R.1285](#), [S.570](#)) Rep. Mike Bost (R-IL), Se. Mark Kelly (D-AZ)

Status: House - 02/13/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Senate - 02/13/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: Requires prime contractors on federally funded water infrastructure projects to pay subcontractors promptly and ensures federal oversight to prevent misuse of taxpayer funds.

Water Resources Technical Assistance Review Act ([H.R.3427](#)) Rep. David Taylor (R-OH)

Status: House – 09/15/2025 Passed out of the House.

Senate - 09/16/2025 Received in the Senate and Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: Requires the Army Corps of Engineers to review, assess, and report on the effectiveness of its technical assistance programs for water resources projects, ensuring they meet the needs of local communities and stakeholders.

Golden Mussel Eradication and Control Act of 2025 ([H.R.3717](#)) Rep. Josh Harder (D-CA)

Status: House - 06/04/2025 Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure and the Committee on Natural Resources

Summary: Directs federal efforts to control and eradicate invasive golden mussel populations in U.S. waterways to protect ecosystems and infrastructure.

Regional Leadership in Wildland Fire Research Act ([H.R.6154](#), [S.647](#)) Rep. Dave Min (D-CA), Sen. Ben Ray Lujan (D-NM)

Status: House - 05/20/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Conservation, Research, and Biotechnology.

Senate - 02/20/2025 Referred to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation.

Summary: This bill will establish research centers at higher education institutions across the country to support wildfire research and develop new technologies to enhance wildfire preparedness.

Standardizing Permitting and Expediting Economic Development (SPEED) Act ([H.R.4776](#)) Rep. Bruce Westerman (R-AR)

Status: House – 12/18/2025 Passed by the Yeas and Nays: 221 – 196.

Senate - 12/18/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will narrow the scope of federal actions which trigger a NEPA review by redefining the term “major federal actions” and will also expedite the review process.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([S.3590](#), [H.R.5566](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE), Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/07/2026 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Midsize and Large Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience Program, Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, and Clean Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Program for five years.

Unincorporated Partnerships for Grant Resources, Assistance, and Drinking Water Enhancements (UPGRADE) Act ([S. 3465](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE)

Status: Senate - 12/11/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works

Summary: This bill will amend the Safe Drinking Water Act to reauthorize the EPA's Small, Underserved, and Disadvantaged Communities grant program through 2031 and make unincorporated communities eligible for funding to improve access to clean water.

PFAS Research and Development Reauthorization Act ([H.R. 6667](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 02/02/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will extend EPA's authority and funding to conduct research and development on PFAS after its prior authorization expired.

No Taxation on PFAS Remediation Act ([H.R. 6669](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 12/11/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will amend the Internal Revenue Code to ensure that reimbursements or rebates used for PFAS cleanup are excluded from gross income for tax purposes.

Clean Water Standards for PFAS Act ([H.R. 6668](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 02/02/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will require the EPA to establish effluent limitation guidelines and water quality criteria for PFAS discharges under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, setting regulatory deadlines for industry controls.

Community Protection and Wildfire Resilience Act ([S.3609](#), [H.R.582](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA), Rep. Jared Huffman (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/08/2026 Referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs.

House - 01/21/2025 Referred to the Committee on Science, Space, and Technology, and in addition to the Committees on Natural Resources, and Agriculture

Summary: This bill will create a new federal grant program to invest \$1 billion annually to help communities develop and implement Community Protection and Wildfire Resilience Plans

Making Our Communities Resilient through Enhancing Water for Agriculture, Technology, the Environment, and Residences (MORE WATER) Act ([S.3738](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 07/29/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) large-scale recycled water program, providing federal grants for up to 25% of the cost of these recycling projects, and would create a new federal grant program to help repair California's water delivery system.

Growing Resilient Operations from Water Savings and Municipal- Agricultural Reciprocally-beneficial Transactions (GROW SMART) Act ([S.3737](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 03/17/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources Subcommittee on Water and Power. Hearings held.

Summary: This bill will authorize \$5 million per year for seven years for the BOR to fund the development of voluntary agricultural partnerships with municipal, industrial, and commercial entities and the design of innovative water-saving projects.

Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act Amendments of 2025 ([H.R.6229](#)) Rep. Kim Schrier (D-WA)

Status: House - 11/22/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act of 2014 through 2029, lowers minimum project sizes for small communities, allows up to 55-year loan maturities, and promotes collaborative project delivery.

Western Wildfire Support Act ([S.91](#), [H.R.5782](#)) Rep. Joe Neguse (D-CO),

Status: Senate - 02/04/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Economic Development, Public Buildings, and Emergency Management.

Summary: This bill will provide comprehensive resources to prevent wildfires, enhance firefighting efforts, and support communities impacted by year-round wildfire seasons.

To require the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out activities to suppress wildfires ([H.R.178](#)) Rep. Tom McClintock (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/08/2026 Reported (Amended) by the Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out wildfire suppression and to not suppress wildfire fighting efforts.

Advanced Capabilities for Emergency Response Operations (ACERO) Act ([H.R.3930](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 06/11/2025 Ordered to be Reported in the Nature of a Substitute by the Yeas and Nays: 34 - 0.

Senate - 02/24/2026 Received in the Senate and referred to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation.

Summary: This bill will authorize the ACERO program which conducts research and development activities regarding aerial response to wildfires using uncrewed aircraft systems (UAS) and other advanced aviation technologies.

Save Our Sequoias Act ([H.R.2709](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/12/2026 Placed on the Union Calendar, Calendar No. 466

Senate - 03/17/2026 Received in the Senate and Read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will establish a set of programs to improve the health and resiliency of giant sequoias, including shared stewardship agreements, emergency response, reforestation strategies, and collaborative restoration grants.

Snow Water Supply Forecasting Reauthorization Act ([H.R.3857](#)) Rep. Jeff Hurd (R-CO)

Status: Senate - 06/10/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize and modify the Bureau of Reclamation's Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program through FY2031.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([S.3590](#), [H.R.5566](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE), Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/07/2026 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will amend the Federal Water Pollution Control Act to reauthorize the clean water infrastructure resiliency and sustainability program, and amend the Safe Drinking Water Act to reauthorize drinking water resilience and midsize/large system sustainability programs.

Desalination Reauthorization Act ([S.5352](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 08/06/2026 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will provide grants for projects and research to its lower costs and reduce its environmental impacts to support desalination.

Subject: August 2026 Monthly Report

The California Legislature has entered the final stretch of the 2026 Legislative Session. With the Appropriations Committee deadline now behind us, lawmakers have just two weeks remaining to move legislation through the Assembly and Senate before the Legislature adjourns on August 31. The focus now shifts almost entirely to the Floors, where hundreds of bills will face final votes, concurrence votes and, in some cases, last-minute amendments and negotiations.

The numbers provide some perspective on how much legislation has already moved through the process. Of the 583 Senate bills introduced this year, 475 (82%) passed the Senate. In the Assembly, 854 of the 1,263 bills introduced (68%) passed the house of origin. So far, 126 bills have reached the Governor's desk, with 108 already signed into law and another 18 awaiting action. Those numbers will increase significantly over the next several weeks as bills begin moving off the Floors and to the Governor.

While much of the next two weeks will involve working through the remaining individual bills, several broader negotiations could dominate the end of session. One of the biggest is the Newsom Administration's developing proposal to restructure how California handles utility-caused wildfire liability. The Administration is discussing changes intended to protect the solvency of the state's Wildfire Fund and reduce the financial exposure of utilities such as PG&E, Southern California Edison and San Diego Gas & Electric. The proposal could address insurance subrogation, payments to wildfire victims, utility liability, ratepayer costs and the long-term structure of the Wildfire Fund.

The proposal is already generating significant opposition. A coalition that includes public agencies, counties, insurers, wildfire victims and other stakeholders is signaling concerns that changes to the existing liability structure could shift costs away from utilities and onto wildfire victims, insurance customers, local governments and the broader public. That opposition is likely to make the issue one of the more difficult end-of-session negotiations, particularly given the very limited amount of time remaining.

There is also still unfinished business on the state budget. Although the principal 2026-27 budget package was enacted in June, negotiations continue over additional budget and trailer bill actions that could be taken before adjournment. For water and natural resources interests in particular, significant decisions remain around Proposition 4 funding, Greenhouse Gas

Reduction Fund revenues and other resources-related expenditures. These negotiations could provide one of the final opportunities this year to secure additional funding for water infrastructure, groundwater, conveyance, conservation, dam and flood safety, and other natural resource priorities.

The result is a very compressed final two weeks. At this stage of session, the process becomes considerably more fluid. Bills can change quickly, negotiations increasingly move to legislative leadership and the Governor's Office, and major policy or budget agreements can emerge with relatively little time for review.

For advocates, the next two weeks are essentially the final sprint: protecting priority bills on the Floor, stopping problematic legislation, negotiating amendments and positioning remaining budget requests for inclusion in any end-of-session package.

Once the Legislature adjourns on August 31, attention will shift almost immediately to the Governor, who will have until September 30 to sign or veto legislation sent to his desk.

Key Bills

AB 35 (Alvarez-D) Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024: Administrative Procedure Act: exemption: program guidelines and selection criteria

This bill exempts Proposition 4 funding from the regulatory requirements of the Administrative Procedures Act, which will allow state agencies to disperse funds more efficiently. While typically, the regulatory process is an important part of policy settings, Proposition 4 intentionally allocated funding to existing grant programs so that funding could be disbursed more quickly. However, in the crafting of Proposition 4, an exemption from the APA was not included in the language. AB 35 has addressed this issue by establishing an exemption for Prop 4 funding.

Position: Support (Coalition)

Status: Chaptered.

AB 2180 (Ward-D) Local government: Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act: proportional cost of service

This bill would clarify how water agencies comply with Proposition 218, particularly when setting tiered water rates. There have been several conflicting appellate court decisions in recent years that create confusion regarding Prop 218 compliance. AB 2180 would codify the more favorable framework established in *Dreher v. LADWP* and affirm that costs related to water supplies, infrastructure, and system-wide peak demand may be allocated using reasonable methodologies without tracing specific water sources to individual parcels. These methodologies could rely on existing or projected data to allocate service costs.

Position: Key Watch

Status: On the Senate floor.

SB 872 (McNerney-D) Climate change: funding priorities

This bill would create the Delta Levees and Canal Subsidence Fund to support repairs to subsidized State Water Project canals and Delta levees threatened by climate change, sea level rise, and groundwater-related land subsidence. It would authorize the state to accept funding from sources such as the General Fund, Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, bonds, federal funds, and private contributions to finance these projects. The bill would direct funding toward restoring water conveyance capacity in the State Water

Project and improving levees in the Delta and Suisun Marsh, including projects that also enhance habitat, water quality, and flood protection. It would require the Department of Water Resources and the Delta Conservancy to develop public spending plans, hold workshops and community meetings, and regularly report to the Legislature on project priorities and expenditures. The bill would also specify that these funds could not be used for the construction or operation of any new Delta conveyance facilities, leaving those costs to the benefiting water agencies.

Position: Support (Coalition)

Status: This bill passed out of the Appropriations Committee and is now on the Assembly Floor.

SB 1153 (Caballero-D) Disaster preparedness: urban retail water suppliers and public water systems: wildfire

SB 1153, sponsored by ACWA, seeks to provide liability protection for water agencies related to wildfires. The bill would establish that limitations in water supply or water pressure during a wildfire are not a substantial cause of wildfire damages. In addition, the bill would clarify that wildfire spread is not an inherent risk of the design, construction, or maintenance of a public water system. If passed, the bill would require urban retail water suppliers serving high or very high fire hazard severity zones to include wildfire-specific response procedures in their emergency response plans beginning Jan. 1, 2028.

Position: Support (Coalition)

Status: This bill made it out of the Assembly Appropriations Committee and now sits on the Assembly Floor.

Regulatory and Administrative Actions

Delta Conveyance Project

On July 1, the State Water Board announced a Twelfth Amended Notice of Public Hearing and Procedural Ruling. The hearing will gather evidence that the State Water Board will consider to determine whether to approve change petitions filed by Department of Water Resources (DWR) to add two new points of diversion and redirection for the State Water Project.

Golden Mussels Regulation

The rulemaking will also include new regulatory language related to a statewide framework for inspections and decontamination of watercraft.

Summary: The State Water Resources Control Board and the 9 California regional water quality control boards regulate water quality and prescribe waste discharge requirements in accordance with the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act (act) and the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit program. Under the act, the State Water Resources Control Board is authorized to adopt water quality control plans for waters for which quality standards are required by the federal Clean Water Act, as specified, and that in the event of a conflict, those plans supersede regional water quality control plans for the same waters. The bill would require the department, under this condition, to consult with other specified state entities and local governments to identify state permitting requirements and local procedures that could be suspended or revised to support recovery and rebuilding efforts as a result of the wildfire, as specified. The bill would require the department to prepare and submit initial and periodic reports to the Governor and Legislature with the information and recommendations. This bill, on or before July 1, 2028, would require the Department of Housing and Community Development, in consultation with other specified state entities, to convene a workgroup to review and provide a report to the Governor and the Legislature with recommendations regarding any provision of the California Building Standards Code that should be suspended for specified types of projects to facilitate rapid, safe, disaster-resilient, and cost-effective rebuilding and recovery guidance for any future state of emergency. Mesa Water's governmental relations program includes monitoring local and regional political issues and policy-setting authorities (e.g., County of Orange, Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission). Attached is the Orange County Advocacy Report. At the Board's August 26, 2026 meeting, Mesa Water staff will provide a verbal report on any actionable, relevant, and/or timely issues.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2027, \$396,500 is budgeted for Water Policy Support Services; \$21,695 has been spent to date.

COUNTY OF ORANGE UPDATES

Governance, Legal, & Accountability

Supervisors Expand Lobbyist Disclosure Requirements

The Board of Supervisors approved updates to Lobbyist Registration and Reporting Rules. Key updates include registration and renewal fees will now fully recover program costs, lobbyists must file quarterly activity disclosures (instead of less frequent reporting), and the definition of “lobbying activity” was expanded to include contacts with a Supervisor, Supervisor’s staff, County department head, or County appointee for the purpose of influencing official actions or decisions of the Board or any legislative body on which the individual has voting membership. This now requires registration and disclosure for lobbying Supervisors in their roles on other boards or commissions, as well as certain County employees who can influence Board decisions.

Orange County Supervisors Appoint New Director of Office of Independent Review

The Board of Supervisors unanimously appointed Catherine Santiago as the new director of the Office of Independent Review, the county’s civilian law enforcement oversight body. Santiago previously served as Senior Deputy County Counsel for Los Angeles County. The position had been vacant since November 2025, when prior director Robert Faigin’s contract expired. In earlier budget discussions, some supervisors described the office as lacking meaningful authority, with proposals ranging from defunding it to strengthening its mandate, though no structural changes were adopted at that time.

Audit Finds Former Health Care Chief Dismissed Concerns on Andrew Do-Linked Contracts

An independent audit of \$1.7 billion in contracts (2019–2025) found that former Health Care Agency Director Dr. Clayton Chau repeatedly dismissed staff concerns about potential conflicts of interest involving former Supervisor Andrew Do. According to the audit, Chau directed a COVID vaccination contract to a company with which he had a personal relationship, pressed for use of Warner Wellness (which employed Do’s daughter Rhiannon) despite staff warnings about inexperience and conflicts, and reprimanded an employee who raised the issue. He relied on Do’s denials of conflicts. The audit also flagged documentation and double-billing issues with Bridgecreek Realty, 360 Health, and Mercy Pharmacy. Auditors referred those entities, Chau, and Do-related matters to the District Attorney. The review is part of a broader series examining contracts tied to Do’s bribery conviction.

Harassment Lawsuits Tied to Former DA Supervisor Cost County Approximately \$16 Million

Lawsuits related to alleged sexual harassment and retaliation involving former Senior Assistant District Attorney Gary Logalbo have cost the county about \$16 million to date. This includes



roughly \$12 million in jury awards and settlements (among them a \$3.5 million verdict for one prosecutor and a \$3 million verdict plus \$1.5 million in attorneys' fees for another) and \$4.1 million paid over four years to outside counsel. County leaders are appealing some verdicts; plaintiffs have criticized the appeals as prolonging costs. Earlier global settlement offers were rejected by the Board of Supervisors.

Public Safety

Jailhouse Informant Scandal Continues to Affect Cases

The long-running Orange County jailhouse informant scandal continues to impact the justice system more than a decade after it was exposed. A recent murder case saw a reduced sentence after a San Diego judge described former prosecutor (now Superior Court Judge) Ebrahim Baytieh's tactics involving informants as "reprehensible." Historically, the scandal—involving the illegal use of informants to elicit statements and the withholding of evidence—has led to more than 60 convictions being overturned, sentences reduced, or charges dropped. Legal observers have questioned whether additional past cases under prior leadership warrant further review.

Health, Social Services, & Immigration

Santa Ana Continues Formal Opposition to County Reentry Facility

Santa Ana city officials and residents formally opposed a proposed county halfway house/reentry facility planned for the city, citing community impacts and characterizing the placement as "dumping."

Covered California Adds CalOptima Health

Covered California added CalOptima Health to its insurance marketplace offerings, expanding options for Orange County residents seeking coverage through the state exchange.

Progress Noted on Homelessness, Permanent Housing Solutions Still Urged

Advocates and county leaders acknowledged measurable progress in addressing Orange County's homeless crisis (consistent with earlier Point-in-Time Count declines) while calling for expanded permanent housing solutions and systemic improvements.

Food Insecurity Rises Amid Anticipated SNAP Cuts

Orange County continued to experience growing food insecurity, with concerns heightened by expected federal reductions in food stamp (SNAP) benefits.

Elevated West Nile Virus Risk

Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District reported increasing West Nile virus activity, with higher mosquito detections and elevated public health risk levels this season. Residents were advised to take protective measures.



Questions Raised About Animal Care Director's California Residency

Reports examined whether the director of Orange County Animal Care meets state residency requirements for the position.

Infrastructure, Development, & Environment

South County Power Outage Affects 22,500 Customers

A power outage in South Orange County impacted approximately 22,500 customers. Utility crews restored service after addressing the cause.

Dana Point Harbor Hotel Leases Delayed Again

The Board of Supervisors again postponed a decision on new 66-year ground leases required for the hotel components of the multi-hundred-million-dollar Dana Point Harbor revitalization. The marina and commercial core construction continue, but the two proposed hotels remain on hold. Supervisors requested further review of worker protections for displaced Marina Inn and restaurant employees, financing terms, and county benefits. The developer has stated the new leases are necessary for hotel financing; without them, the existing Marina Inn may be renovated instead. Dana Point officials have warned of potential lost hotel tax revenue and impacts on timing related to the 2028 Olympics.

Herbicide and Pesticide Use Controversies

OC Public Works faced criticism over herbicide applications and vegetation management along San Juan and Trabuco Creeks near Doheny State Beach; California Department of Fish and Wildlife intervened in some areas. Separately, Ladera Ranch residents and officials called for a halt to pesticide use amid concerns about chemical exposure. Laguna Beach urged the county to reduce herbicide use in a local creek.

Business Leaders Push for Transportation Funding Renewal

Orange County business leaders urged members of Congress to renew critical federal transportation funding during ongoing budget negotiations.

Proposed Golden Pacific Powerlink Transmission Line

A proposed 500-kilovolt transmission line (Golden Pacific Powerlink) is under consideration and could potentially route through portions of Orange County and the Inland Empire. The project has not been finalized.



Political

Candidate Filing Period Extended for Select Local Races

The Orange County Registrar of Voters extended the candidate filing period through August 12 for certain local offices after eligible incumbents failed to file by the original deadline. Affected contests included trustee seats in several community college districts (North Orange County, Coast, South Orange County), school districts (including Capistrano Unified, Newport-Mesa Unified, and others), community services districts, water districts, library districts, and related special districts.

Judge Finds OC Board of Education Trustee Mari Barke Failed to Report Millions in Assets and Income

An Orange County Superior Court judge issued a proposed decision finding that OC Board of Education Trustee Mari Barke failed to report millions of dollars in assets and income on required Form 700 disclosure statements over a multi-year period (covering roughly 2018–2021). The judge proposed civil penalties of approximately \$81,800 plus attorneys' fees. Barke has the opportunity to file objections.

Rancho Santiago Community College District Suspends Board President Philip Yarbrough

Rancho Santiago Community College District trustees voted 4-3 to temporarily suspend Trustee Philip Yarbrough from his officer positions pending independent investigations into complaints filed by Chancellor Marvin Martinez and a district vice chancellor. Allegations include possible violations of board policy and the code of ethics. The suspension is temporary until the board receives and considers the investigation findings. Vice President Tina Arias Miller will serve as board president.

FPPC Fines Five Huntington Beach Officials Over Undisclosed Pacific Airshow Tickets

The Fair Political Practices Commission fined five current and former Huntington Beach elected officials for failing to disclose complimentary VIP tickets (valued at approximately \$150 each) to the 2022 Pacific Airshow on their Form 700 statements of economic interest. Fines ranged from \$100 to \$700 and were issued against Mayor Casey McKeon, Councilmembers Pat Burns and Gracey Van Der Mark, former City Attorney Michael Gates, and former Councilmember Erik Peterson.

COSTA MESA AND NEWPORT BEACH UPDATES

Fairview Developmental Center Specific Plan Clears Planning Commission

The Costa Mesa Planning Commission voted 4-2 to advance a specific plan for the state-owned Fairview Developmental Center site (approximately 80 acres). The plan would support up to roughly 4,000 residential units and now moves to the City Council for further consideration. Community meetings and additional review are scheduled.



Costa Mesa Retains Flock License Plate Readers but Will Renegotiate Contract Terms

Amid privacy concerns and a prior scandal in which a former Costa Mesa police officer used the system for personal stalking, the City Council voted 6-1 to keep its three-year contract with Flock Safety for 46 automated license plate readers (annual cost approximately \$151,800). Council directed staff to renegotiate terms, including reducing data retention from one year to 45 days and requiring notification of data requests. Police reported the cameras contributed to more than 160 arrests, recovery of 20 stolen vehicles, location of three missing persons, and resolution of 10 sexual assault cases over the prior year.

Voters in Multiple OC Cities, including Costa Mesa, to Decide on Tax Measures

Voters across Orange County, including cities facing budget pressures, will decide on various tax-increase measures on the November ballot. In Costa Mesa, voters will decide on a business license tax increase for larger businesses generating more than \$500,000 in annual revenue (removing the current \$200 annual cap).

State Sues Costa Mesa Over Noncompliant Housing Element

The State of California sued Costa Mesa for failing to adopt a housing element that complies with state law.

Yard House in Costa Mesa Announces Closure

The Yard House restaurant in Costa Mesa announced it would close after more than two decades of operation.

Newport Beach Decreases Affordable Housing Requirements Near Airport

Newport Beach lowered the required percentage of affordable housing units in certain developments near John Wayne Airport (to under 10% in the relevant overlay).

Newport Beach Advances Response to July 4 Chaos and Teen Takeovers

Following over 400 arrests during chaotic July 4 gatherings (a large share involving individuals from outside the city, including Arizona), Newport Beach directed staff to develop new rules, including possible curfews and mass-gathering restrictions. Police prepared for potential additional organized events. The City Council also approved approximately \$1.5 million for studies, conceptual design, and outreach related to relocating the police headquarters to the Civic Center area.

Newport Beach Asks Court to Block Housing-Limitation Ballot Initiative

Newport Beach sought a court order to prevent a proposed ballot initiative aimed at limiting housing development from proceeding.



Randall Preserve Reaches Milestone as Public Open Space

The Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA) governing board approved the property management plan for the 387-acre Randall Preserve (formerly Banning Ranch) on the borders of Newport Beach, Costa Mesa, and Huntington Beach. The plan, developed with the Coastal Corridor Alliance, includes a resource management plan, public access plan (with more than five miles of trails and an initial one-mile hiking loop with parking near 17th Street), and coastal resilience strategy addressing sea-level rise. A tribal access and engagement plan was also previously approved. Remediation of the former oil field continues (expected into 2027), after which phased public access is anticipated. The preserve protects habitat for sensitive species including the California gnatcatcher and San Diego fairy shrimp and connects with adjacent protected lands totaling roughly 1,000 acres. Frank and Joan Randall's \$50 million donation helped enable the \$97 million acquisition.

OTHER CITY UPDATES

Anaheim Water Pressure Crisis Temporarily Closes Disneyland and Angel Stadium Facilities

Technical issues with four of the city's 14 groundwater wells (which supply about 75% of Anaheim's water) caused a significant drop in water pressure. Impacts included temporary bathroom and restaurant closures at Disneyland Resort and effects at Angel Stadium, the Convention Center, City Hall, and surrounding neighborhoods and businesses. The city increased reliance on Colorado River water (normally about 25% of supply). Pressure was restored the same evening; officials stated water quality was not affected and an investigation into the wells continued.

Fullerton Mayor and Councilmember Served with Recall Notices Amid Budget and Leadership Concerns

Recall notices were served on Mayor Fred Jung and Councilmember Jamie Valencia amid ongoing budget deficits, a failed sales-tax proposal, and related fiscal and leadership concerns. Recall petition efforts later advanced toward the signature-gathering phase.

Garden Grove Officials Confirm No Methyl Methacrylate Stored at GKN Aerospace Site

Officials confirmed that methyl methacrylate is no longer stored at the GKN Aerospace facility involved in the May chemical tank emergency and is not expected to return before at least the first quarter of 2027. No MMA production is currently occurring. Discussions continued regarding possible compensation for residents affected by the earlier incident.

Huntington Beach Challenges Ranked-Choice Voting Order and Faces State Airshow Audit

The city filed a legal challenge to a Superior Court ruling ordering adoption of ranked-choice voting for City Council elections (the first such order in Orange County) after a finding that the at-large system diluted Latino voting power. Separately, a judge authorized a state audit of the city's



controversial Pacific Airshow contract and related arrangements. FPPC fines for undisclosed 2022 Airshow tickets also affected current and former local officials.

Irvine Advances Ranked-Choice Voting Measure and Brings Former City Manager Out of Retirement

The City Council advanced a measure asking voters whether to adopt ranked-choice voting for city elections. Facing a budget deficit and leadership transition, the city brought longtime former City Manager Sean Joyce out of retirement to lead City Hall for the next year.

Orange Voters to Decide on Charter City Proposal in November

Voters will decide in November whether to make Orange a charter city.

Candidate Fields Take Shape for Orange County City Council Elections

With the final candidate filing period closed, fields have taken shape for City Council (and related mayoral) races across Orange County's cities for the November 2026 general election. Key highlights include:

- Anaheim: Incumbent Mayor Ashleigh Aitken faces Alfredo Rodriguez and Imran Sharief; District 3 race between Ella Renteria-Garcia and Natalie Rubalcava; incumbents Carlos Leon (District 2) and Natalie Meeks (District 6) unopposed.
- Costa Mesa: Mike Buley vs. Loren Gameros for mayor; contested races in Districts 3, 4, and 5.
- Huntington Beach: Twelve candidates (including incumbents Pat Burns, Andrew Gruel, and Casey McKeon) compete for three open seats.
- Irvine: Maksim V. Egorov challenges incumbent Mayor Larry Agran; contested races in Districts 1, 5, and 6.
- Newport Beach: Contested races in Districts 1, 3, and 6; Robyn Grant unopposed in District 4.
- Santa Ana: Incumbent Mayor Valerie Amezcua faces Dan Shimell and Dwayne Shipp; contested ward races.
- Other notable races: Contested fields in Fullerton, Garden Grove, Laguna Beach, Mission Viejo, Orange, Westminster, Yorba Linda, and elsewhere. Several cities (e.g., Dana Point, Laguna Niguel) have unopposed incumbents expected to be appointed.

SPECIAL DISTRICT UPDATES

OCWD Issued Notice of Violation for Destruction of Bird Nest in Santa Ana River

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife issued a Notice of Violation to the Orange County Water District for bulldozing a black-necked stilt nest in the Santa Ana River near Angel Stadium and for alleged violations of a streambed alteration agreement (including maintenance within 300 feet of known active nests without required surveys or physical buffers). The issue was identified after activists posted video. OCWD disputed the findings, stating no unlawful take



occurred and that it believed annual regulatory reviews were sufficient. Mitigation may be required; civil or criminal enforcement remains possible. Other OCWD actions during the period included awarding a construction contract (approximately \$31.8 million) for Garden Grove Wells 22, 26, and 27 PFAS treatment plants (with total project budget increased and significant state grant reimbursement expected), related change orders and budget increases for Santa Ana PFAS treatment, GWRS technical support agreements, chemical supply contracts, and temporary suspension of the commercial paper program in favor of Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes.

Golden State Water Company Proposes Significant Rate Increases in Region 3 Service Area

Golden State Water Company (GSWC) filed its 2026 General Rate Case Application (A.26-07-001) with the California Public Utilities Commission seeking a \$67.5 million (31.3%) revenue increase for its Region 3 service area for the 2028–2030 period. Residential customers would see an estimated average monthly bill increase of \$25.31 (30.7%) for a typical 10 ccf user with a 5/8 × 3/4-inch meter, phased over three years. Other classes face similar percentage increases (commercial 33.2%, industrial 35.3%). Region 3 includes portions of several Orange County cities and communities (Cypress, La Palma, Los Alamitos, Placentia, Seal Beach, Stanton, Yorba Linda, and adjacent areas). While Mesa Water District and most other local public water agencies are not directly served by GSWC, the proposal is relevant to the broader Orange County water landscape because it reflects ongoing cost pressures (purchased water, infrastructure, regulatory compliance) facing private utilities that operate in the same regional wholesale and supply environment as public agencies. An administrative law judge will hold hearings; the CPUC will ultimately vote on a final decision after public comment.

MESA WATER CUSTOMER UPDATES

Orange County Fair Opens with Higher Prices

The Orange County Fair opened for the season with another increase in admission and related prices.

Art Exhibit Draws from Newly Merged Museum Collection

An “Art in Hollywood” exhibit featured works from the newly merged UC Irvine Langson Orange County Museum of Art collection.

POLITICAL AND STATE UPDATES

Proposal to End California’s Top-Two Primary System Advances

An initiative (A.G. File No. 26-0004 / “Undo the Top Two”) that would repeal California’s top-two (“jungle”) primary system was cleared for signature gathering by the Secretary of State. Backers must collect approximately 875,000 valid signatures by January 11, 2027, to qualify the measure for the November 2028 ballot. If approved by voters, it would return the state to a system in



which each political party's top vote-getter advances to the general election (rather than the top two candidates overall, regardless of party).

Analysis of Orange County Voter Preferences in the Governor's Race

A UC Irvine School of Social Ecology poll (UCI-OC Poll) conducted June 9–12, 2026, among 809 Orange County adults found the race for governor essentially tied among likely voters in the county: Republican Steve Hilton led Democrat Xavier Becerra 47% to 44% (within the poll's ± 4.2 -point margin of error). Key findings included:

- Hilton enjoyed stronger partisan loyalty, with 94% of likely Republican voters supporting him versus only 3% for Becerra. Among Democrats, 82% backed Becerra while 9% supported Hilton.
- Orange County's electorate is closely divided, with roughly one-third identifying as Democrat, one-third as Republican, and one-third as Independent/no party preference.
- Independents leaned slightly toward Becerra in some breakdowns, but Hilton's stronger Republican base gave him the overall edge in the county.
- Demographic splits showed men favoring Hilton and women favoring Becerra; Latino and Asian American voters leaned toward Becerra.
- The results underscore Orange County's "purple" character relative to the rest of California, where statewide polls (including a later Berkeley IGS Poll) showed Becerra holding a substantially larger lead. Housing costs remained a dominant voter concern across parties in the county.
