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Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project

File No.: M21-210B2

Description: The Reservoir Upgrades Project has several components to increase the efficiency and reliability of Reservoirs 1 and 2: Chemical storage and feed systems (sodium hypochlorite and aqueous ammonia) to help reduce nitrification issues in the distribution system; Pump replacement and conversion of drivers from gas engines to electrical motors; Upgrades to reservoir electrical service through SCE; Installation of diesel generator systems to power the reservoirs in the event of an emergency; Miscellaneous system rehabilitation and upgrades including electrical gear replacement, pipeline rehabilitation, pipeline modifications, and instrument replacement based on the results of site visits and related analyses; and Slurry Dewatering Pit upgrades located at the Reservoir 1 site.

Status: Following the approval of the recommendations of the Water, Power, and Supply Chain Reliability Assessment, Mesa Water developed a design Scope of Work for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Upgrades Project. A proposal was solicited from a CIPR on-call design consultant and the project's Preliminary and Final Design was kicked off in May 2021. The consultant delivered a draft version of Technical Memorandum No.1 – Reservoir 1 Site Master Plan and the draft Permit Plan in July 2021. Following Mesa Water's review of TM1 and the Permit Plan, the consultant began work on the Preliminary Design Report. The Preliminary Design Report was delivered in November 2021 and the Preliminary Design Report Workshop was held in September 2021. In March 2023, the Final Bid documents and cost estimate were received and reviewed by staff. After receiving approval for the project's reduced scope, the project team began modifying the Bid Documents. The revised Bid Documents were received in August 2023. Request for Bids were released to the prequalified contractors in August 2023. A job walk was conducted in August 2023 and attended by five prequalified contractors. The bid opening was held in October 2023. Four bids were received. A recommendation for contract time extension negotiation and award was approved November 2023. The contract time extension negotiation to accommodate equipment lead times was completed and Notice to Proceed was provided January 2024. A preconstruction meeting and a site walk with the contractor team were held February 2024. The construction team mobilized at Reservoir 2 in June 2024 and Reservoir 1 in October 2024. The contractor installed and started new mixers in Reservoir 2 in August 2024. At Reservoir 2, the contractor poured and coated the concrete foundation for the Reservoir chemical facility and constructed yard piping and electrical. The chemical tanks were delivered in August 2025 and anchored to the chemical pads. Work is stopped due to the impacts of the contractor-installed pipeline

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break at Reservoir 2 on October 18, 2025. The initial forensic site investigation was completed in November 2025. Testing and repair of the damaged equipment is in process. The contractor's insurance representatives inspected the damage on January 21, 2026. The forensic lab work was conducted on July 14-15, 2026. Data from the forensic lab was received by legal counsel in August 2026 and was shared with the forensic engineer and the contractor's insurance representatives. The damaged electrical equipment and instrumentation has been repaired or replaced. Engines 1 and 3 have been repaired, and the right angle gear drives were installed in June 2026. Engine 2 was sent to the repair shop on September 16, 2026 for an overhaul and is expected to be returned early in 2027. Engine 4 also requires repairs in the engine block, which will be attempted on site in September 2026. The new jockey pumps and motors were delivered in June 2026; however, the pump columns and shafts are longer than the pump cans and cannot be installed as delivered. The contractor is responsible for corrective action and has developed a repair plan for review. Jockey pump repair is expected to be completed in December 2026. The variable frequency drives (VFD) were damaged in the October 18, 2025 incident and need to be replaced by the contractor. Replacement VFDs are expected in September 2026. The water in Reservoir 2 was drained in May and June, and the tank was cleaned and disinfected from June 20-29. The Reservoir 2 drain valve was replaced while the tank was empty. Engines and pumps 1 and 3 were run to disinfect the pump station piping with high strength chlorinated water. Bacteriological samples collected from the tank and pump station piping were negative showing that the disinfection was successful. Commissioning of the chemical facility is in process in August and September 2026. Reservoir 2 passed its final bacteriological testing and was returned to service with two operational engines and pumps on August 28, 2026. At Reservoir 1, the contractor has demolished yard structures, excavated for the new Heavy Equipment Port, Slurry Dewatering Pit, Chemical Facility, and Generator Pads. The Slurry Dewatering Pit went into operation in April 2025. After a rain delay, concrete foundations for the Heavy Equipment Port and Chemical Facility were poured in March 2025. The structural steel for the Heavy Equipment Port was received in April 2025, and the building is currently under construction. The building panels were delivered in August 2025. The contractor is coordinating with Southern California Edison for working in the vicinity of its power lines. The Air Quality Management District Permits to Construct and Operate the diesel backup generators were received in March 2025. The generator concrete pads were poured in May 2025. The generators were set on the pads in June 2025. The chemical tanks were delivered in August 2025 and anchored to the chemical pads. The electrical subcontractor is running the electrical conduits. The electrical

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subcontractor poured the concrete pad for the generator switchgear in April 2026. The pumps and motors were delivered to the contractor's warehouse in June 2026. The main switchboard was delivered on July 7, 2026. Work in the Reservoir 1 Pump Station is delayed until Reservoir 2 and its Pump Station are back on line.

Local Groundwater Supply Improvement Project (Local SIP)

File No.: M24-105

Description: The Local SIP will develop a feasibility study that meets the requirements of the Bureau of Reclamation's (USBR) Feasibility Study Directives and Standards (WTR 11-01) for a brackish groundwater desalination facility. The project is being conducted in partnership and cost sharing with Orange County Water District, City of Huntington Beach and City of Newport Beach.

Status: A contract was awarded to Black & Veatch Corporation (Black & Veatch) in May 2024. The project team has completed the evaluation of aquifer zones and selected the Talbert Gap on which to focus the alternative analysis for the feasibility study. The project team has also completed modeling the potential wellfield locations, developing treatment plant footprints, the Class V level life-cycle cost for the project, and developing the preferred alternative. The Board approved a contract amendment to the Black & Veatch contract for Clean Energy Capital to perform a funding analysis. The draft Feasibility Study was received and a review workshop was held in August 2025. Preliminary comments were received from USBR in September 2025. The final Feasibility Study was submitted to USBR in September 2025. Staff received comments on the final Feasibility Study from USBR in January 2026. Mesa Water submitted the final revised Feasibility Study to USBR and received confirmation of acceptance from USBR in April 2026. In February 2026, staff met with USBR to discuss the Feasibility Study and next steps for the project and funding opportunities. Staff presented an update on the Local SIP at the April 8, 2026 Board meeting and the Spring Board workshop. Staff and the real estate consultants are actively looking for properties for the wells and the treatment plant. Staff is also working with our partner agencies for funding the next steps in the Feasibility Study and applying for grants. The Board approved an amendment to the Black & Veatch contract at the May 27, 2026 Board meeting for the next steps in the Feasibility Study. Staff is working with Black & Veatch to incorporate Orange County Water District's recent work on basin subsidence into the next steps. A meeting with the project team and OCWD's Chief Hydrogeologist was held on July 16, 2026, and the subsidence scope is being updated based on the results of the meeting. Staff worked with West Yost to prepare and submit a

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competitive application to the USBR WaterSMART: Desalination Construction Projects Grant Program on August 26, 2026. The next phase of work with Black & Veatch was kicked off in September 2026 and includes development of the drinking water well permitting plan, groundwater modeling to evaluate interactions between proposed extraction wells and the Talbert Barrier, and refinement of the conceptual treatment design and project costs.

Interagency Water Transfers (Newport Beach)

File No.: M25-108

Description: Conduct a feasibility study to determine if Mesa Water can reliably serve groundwater to the City of Newport Beach.

Status: A contract was awarded to MKN & Associates (MKN). The draft feasibility study was received in July 2025 and a workshop to review was held in August 2025. MKN presented the results at the September 10, 2025 Board meeting. Staff coordinated with MKN and the City of Newport Beach to design the connection. MKN submitted the 60% drawings in February 2026, which staff has provided comments on. The City of Costa Mesa issued an encroachment permit, and potholing activities were completed in February 2026. Final design was completed in March 2026 and staff has applied for the construction encroachment permit with the City. Staff is also coordinating with Southern California Edison for power for the intertie. The contracts for Engineering Support During Construction and Construction Management have been executed as of May 2026. The contract for Construction was approved by the Board in June 2026. A preconstruction partnering meeting including the City of Costa Mesa, City of Newport Beach, Ardurra, and TE Roberts was held in June 2026. Ardurra has finalized the drawings based on that meeting's discussion. The Board approved a change order to the construction contract on August 12, 2026 to add the SCADA panels for Mesa Water® and City of Newport Beach. In August 2026, an internal kickoff meeting with the Construction Manager was held, the construction contract with T.E. Roberts was executed and the Notice to Proceed was issued. A construction kickoff meeting with the project stakeholders is scheduled for September 2026.

Interagency Water Transfers (Huntington Beach)

File No.: M25-101

Description: Conduct a feasibility study to determine if Mesa Water can reliably serve groundwater to the City of Huntington Beach.

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Status: A Cooperative Agreement was executed with the City of Huntington Beach in October 2024. Staff received three proposals from qualified consultants in June 2025. The Board awarded a contract to MKN & Associates (MKN) in July 2025. Notice to Proceed was provided in August 2025. A kickoff meeting was held in September 2025, and supply and demand data was collected in October 2025 and as of November 2025, MKN delivered a draft Feasibility Study in December 2025, which has been reviewed by staff from Mesa Water and the City of Huntington Beach. Comments have been provided to the consultant, and MKN is incorporating revisions, including refinement of regulatory considerations and infrastructure assumptions. The project has been introduced to the Department of Drinking Water, and coordination with DDW is ongoing. In February 2026, staff received and provided comments on the Draft Final Feasibility Study and continued discussions with DDW. The Final Feasibility Study was received in March 2026 and presented to the Board at the March 11, 2026 Board meeting. MKN (now Ardurra) presented to the City of Huntington Beach's Public Works Commission in May 2026 and received a positive response. The Commissioners were invited to visit the MWRf and MWECC. Ardurra submitted a proposal for next steps in May 2026. Coordination with the City of Huntington Beach and Orange County Water District is necessary to move forward with next steps. In July 2026, Mesa Water submitted a grant application to USBR's WaterSMART Drought Response Program.

Pipeline Integrity Program

File No.: M25-103

Description: Implement Resolution No. 1525 Replacement of Assets.

Status: Since its inception in 2015, the Pipeline Integrity Program has been implemented by staff to use pipeline condition, rather than pipeline age, to prioritize pipeline replacements. The current and previous fiscal year's progress is described in this report. In Fiscal Year (FY) 2024, the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant reviewed mainline break data from FY 2022 and FY 2023 and recommended condition assessment for pipeline groups with break thresholds that exceed the standards of Resolution No. 1525. These recommendations were presented to the Board in September 2023. Based on the recommendations, staff negotiated a proposal for ePulse condition assessment of 2.2 miles of AC pipe. The field work was completed in May 2024 and the report was received in July 2024. The results of the condition assessment were reviewed by the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. The consultant's report was received in October 2024 and reviewed by staff. No AC pipelines were recommended in the report. Additionally, Municipal Water District of Orange County

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(MWDOC) staff performed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May and June 2024. The final leak detection report was received in June 2024 and no mainline leaks were reported. Staff evaluated the feasibility of a condition assessment technology for small diameter metal pipelines, and has requested a proposal from a vendor. The contract for small diameter pipeline condition assessment was approved at the March 12, 2025 Board meeting. The condition assessment was attempted on June 16-17, 2025 but was not successful. Staff sent ten AC pipe samples collected in conjunction with routine work for wall thickness measurement in February 2025. The wall thickness measurements were received in April 2025 and were reviewed by staff and the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. No immediate pipeline replacements were suggested by the data. The Consultant's report was received in June 2025 and was reviewed by staff. MWDOC completed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May 2025. No mainline leaks were found. Permanent pressure transient monitoring at the pump stations and other strategic locations was installed in June 2025. Staff is evaluating several AI models to predict mainline breaks and prioritize pipeline replacement. A contract was awarded to HDR to continue as the Pipeline Integrity Program consultant for FY 2026. A kickoff meeting for FY 2026 work was held in September 2025. An update to the Board was presented in October 2025. An updated Replacement of Assets resolution was brought to the January 28, 2026 Board meeting and the Board's comments were incorporated. The revised Replacement of Assets resolution was brought to the February 11, 2026 Board meeting. Sixteen AC pipe samples collected as part of break repairs and valve and hydrant replacements were sent to the lab for wall thickness testing on February 24, 2026. Wall thickness results were received on June 22, 2026 and reviewed by the Pipeline Integrity Program consultant. A report with remaining useful life estimates and recommendations for condition assessments and replacements was received from the consultant on June 30, 2026, and was reviewed by staff. The report recommended replacement of 2.5 miles of CMLC Steel pipe installed in 1951 ("1951 Cohort"), replacement of 0.2 miles of ACP in Trinity Ave that had recent breaks, condition assessment of 0.7 miles of 30" CCP in Pomona Ave, and condition assessment of 1.9 miles of ACP in Gisler and surrounding streets. Staff has requested a proposal from Ecologics for e-Pusle testing of the recommended 1.9 miles of ACP. Staff is evaluating the potential replacement of the 6" CMLC pipeline in West Wilson from Placentia to Canyon ahead of the City of Costa Mesa repaving West Wilson.

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SCADA Needs Assessment

File No.: M26-100

Description: Assess Mesa Water's current Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition system, compile a comprehensive asset list, and define a path forward for modernization and future system improvements.

Status: Staff developed a draft Scope of Work and incorporated feedback from expert consultants. The Request for Proposal was posted in October 2025 and six proposals were received in November 2025. An information item was provided at the December 2025 Board meeting. A contract was awarded to West Yost at the January 14, 2026 Board meeting. The contract was executed in February 2026 and the kickoff occurred in March 2026. Site visits were completed in March 2026. West Yost is reviewing SCADA related documentation and staff interviews were completed in May and June 2026. The Baseline Conditions section of the Needs Assessment was received in July 2026 and staff has provided comments to West Yost. SCADA 101 training sessions were conducted in early August 2026. SCADA Trends and Modernization training sessions were held at the end of August 2026. The draft Needs Assessment report is expected in December 2026.

Mesa Water Education Center Flagpole

File No.: M25-104

Description: Evaluate the most appropriate location and height of the flagpole at the Mesa Water Reliability Facility and then execute the construction of the selected flagpole.

Status: Staff received a draft report regarding the installation of a flagpole at the Mesa Water Education Center in December 2024. Staff reviewed the draft report and presented recommendations at the April 23, 2025 Board meeting. A design proposal was received in November 2025. In order to minimize the time to get the flagpole contracted and installed, a revised proposal for a single contract (design and construction) was requested. Design details are being finalized as of September 2026.

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Mesa Water Reliability Facility Electric Vehicle Charging Station

File No.: M25-105

Description: Conduct a feasibility study and preliminary cost estimate of constructing electric vehicle (EV) charging stations at the Mesa Water Reliability Facility (MWRF).

Status: Mesa Energy Systems submitted a proposal for a feasibility study in January 2026. A kickoff meeting and site visit was held in March 2026. The draft feasibility study was submitted in April 2026. Comments were provided and a revised feasibility study was received in April 2026. A review workshop was held in May 2026. Tesla has determined that the proposed MWRF parking site does not meet the minimum required amenities for a Tesla charging location. Staff is coordinating with Mesa Energy Systems to present to the Board at a future Board Meeting.

Well Nos. 12 and 14 Power Quality Mitigation

File No.: M26-200

Description: Evaluate and implement solutions to mitigate power quality disturbances affecting Well Nos. 12 and 14. The project includes installation of power quality monitoring equipment and evaluation of technologies such as flywheel uninterruptible power supply (UPS) systems and battery energy storage systems (BESS) to maintain well operations during voltage dips, outages, and Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) events.

Status: In late 2025, staff began evaluating mitigation strategies for increasing power quality disturbances affecting Well Nos. 12 and 14. In December 2025, applications were submitted to the Self-Generation Incentive Program (SGIP) through Southern California Edison and Southern California Gas Company for battery energy storage systems at both well sites. Battery feasibility analysis to evaluate system sizing, resilience benefits, and long-term financial performance was complete and found that the battery payback period was longer than the useful life of the battery. The results of this analysis will be incorporated into a broader backup power technology evaluation. In March 2026, staff received a proposal from Lee + Ro to evaluate backup power technologies for Well Nos. 12 and 14, including flywheel UPS systems, battery energy storage systems, and hybrid solutions. Power quality monitoring has been installed at both well sites, and the collected data will be used to inform the feasibility analysis and technology evaluation. Contracting with Lee + Ro is complete as of May 2026. The kickoff meeting and site visits were held on May 28, 2026. The site visit also included a review of the setup

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of the Automatic Transfer Switches (ATS) and the Variable Frequency Drives (VFDs). The time delays in the ATS setup were shortened to allow for the back up power generator to start faster. The VFD settings were adjusted to allow operation to ride through a drop in incoming voltage. Study results were presented in a review meeting in June 2026 and were incorporated into the analysis performed by Lee + Ro. The report was received in August 2026 and is under review as of September 2026. The report recommended operating with the updated ATS and VFD settings for 6 months to assess if the updated settings solved the power outage problems. The report did not recommend either the flywheel UPS or the battery storage system.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION/DISCUSSION

At the request of the Board of Directors (Board), staff has presented the Employee Engagement Survey annually since 2022.

DISCUSSION

As part of our continued commitment to fostering a positive, engaged, and high-performing workplace, Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) has partnered with Gallup, Inc. (Gallup) since 2019 to conduct our annual Employee Engagement Survey. This important initiative allows the District to assess engagement levels, track progress over time, and identify areas where staff can strengthen our workplace culture and organizational effectiveness.

Staff are pleased to report that employee participation in this year's survey remained strong at 88%, with 51 employees responding. The District's overall engagement score increased from 3.79 in 2025 to 3.97 in 2026, reflecting a 0.18-point improvement and positive progress in employee engagement across the District.

On September 10, 2026 all managers and supervisors received a detailed briefing from Gallup to review the results, understand the key factors influencing engagement, and begin planning next steps to sustain momentum and address opportunities for growth within their teams.

Gallup Learning and Development Consultant Rose Bloomfield will present key findings in a presentation to the Board on September 23, 2026. During this presentation, Gallup will provide a summary of the agency-wide results, including changes from last year, comparisons to Gallup's benchmarks, and an overview of strengths and areas for improvement. This presentation will offer valuable insights to inform strategic planning and ongoing efforts to enhance organizational performance.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION/DISCUSSION

At its April 29, 2026 workshop, the Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) Board of Directors (Board) approved the Fiscal Year (FY) 2027 Strategic Plan, which directed staff to evaluate the feasibility of installing electric vehicle (EV) charging stations at the Mesa Water Reliability Facility (MWRF) and present a recommendation to the Board by August 2026.

DISCUSSION

Staff evaluated the feasibility of installing public EV charging infrastructure at the MWRF. Mesa Energy Systems, Inc. (Mesa Energy Systems) completed a feasibility study assessing the site, potential charging business models, estimated costs and revenues, the surrounding EV charging market, operational considerations, and potential risks.

The study identified several site characteristics that could support EV charging, including direct freeway access, proximity to electrical infrastructure, and a parking configuration that could accommodate charging equipment. The financial model also indicated that revenue could be generated under favorable utilization assumptions. The study also identified several factors that could limit utilization, including inadequate lighting and the lack of nearby amenities such as food and beverage options, restrooms, outdoor seating, trash receptacles, or retail.

The study evaluated several ownership and operating approaches, which generally fall into District-owned and third-party-owned models:

- **District-owned Model:** Mesa Water would fund the charging infrastructure and assume the associated financial risk. If the District also operates the chargers, Mesa Water would take on responsibilities such as customer support, system management, site maintenance, and response to damaged or inoperable equipment. These responsibilities could potentially be reduced by contracting with a third-party operator; however, utilization and financial performance would remain uncertain.

- **Third-party-owned Model:** A third-party Charge Point Operator (CPO) could own and operate the charging infrastructure, reducing Mesa Water's capital investment and operational responsibilities. As part of the evaluation, the MWRF site was submitted to Tesla for an initial site review. Tesla identified the lack of nearby amenities as a significant issue, including restrooms, food and beverage options, seating, and trash receptacles. The site also lacks adequate lighting, and Mesa Water does not own the proposed parking area, which would require agreements for site use and potentially utility easements.

Based on the study's utilization assumptions, site constraints, and financial analysis, it is uncertain whether public EV charging at the MWRF would generate sufficient utilization and revenue to provide a return on the District's investment. As such, staff recommends not pursuing public EV charging at the MWRF at this time.

Mesa Energy Systems will present the findings of the feasibility study to the Board. The presentation will provide an overview of the site evaluation, potential business models, financial considerations, and Mesa Energy Systems' recommendation.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2026, \$75,000 was budgeted for MWRF EV Charging; \$14,200 has been spent to date.

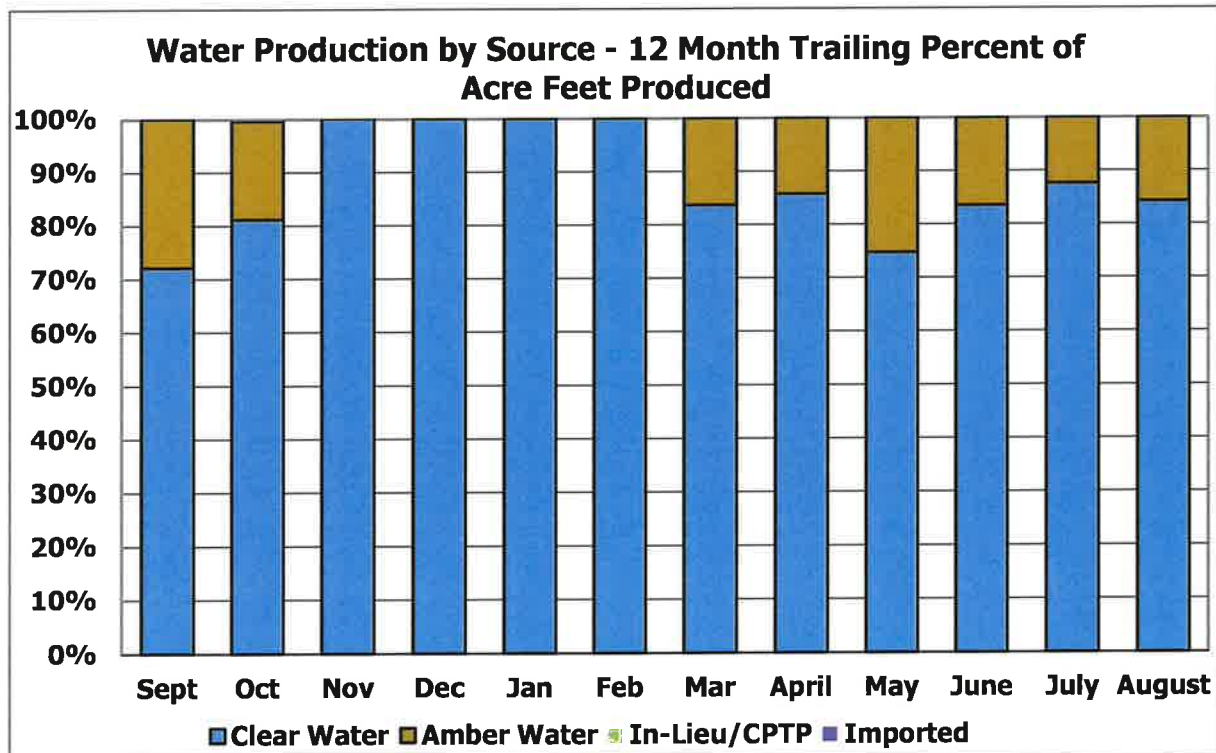

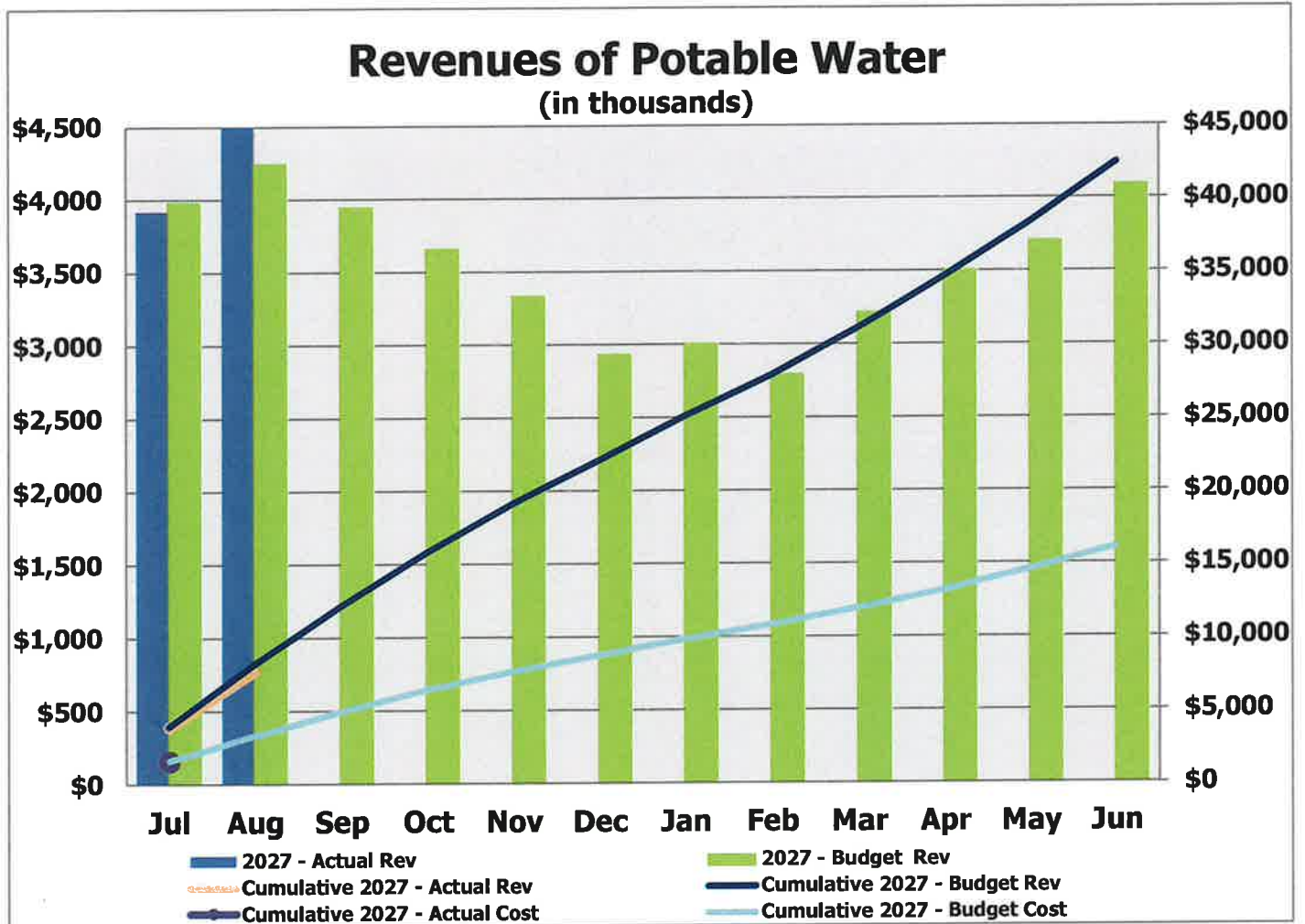

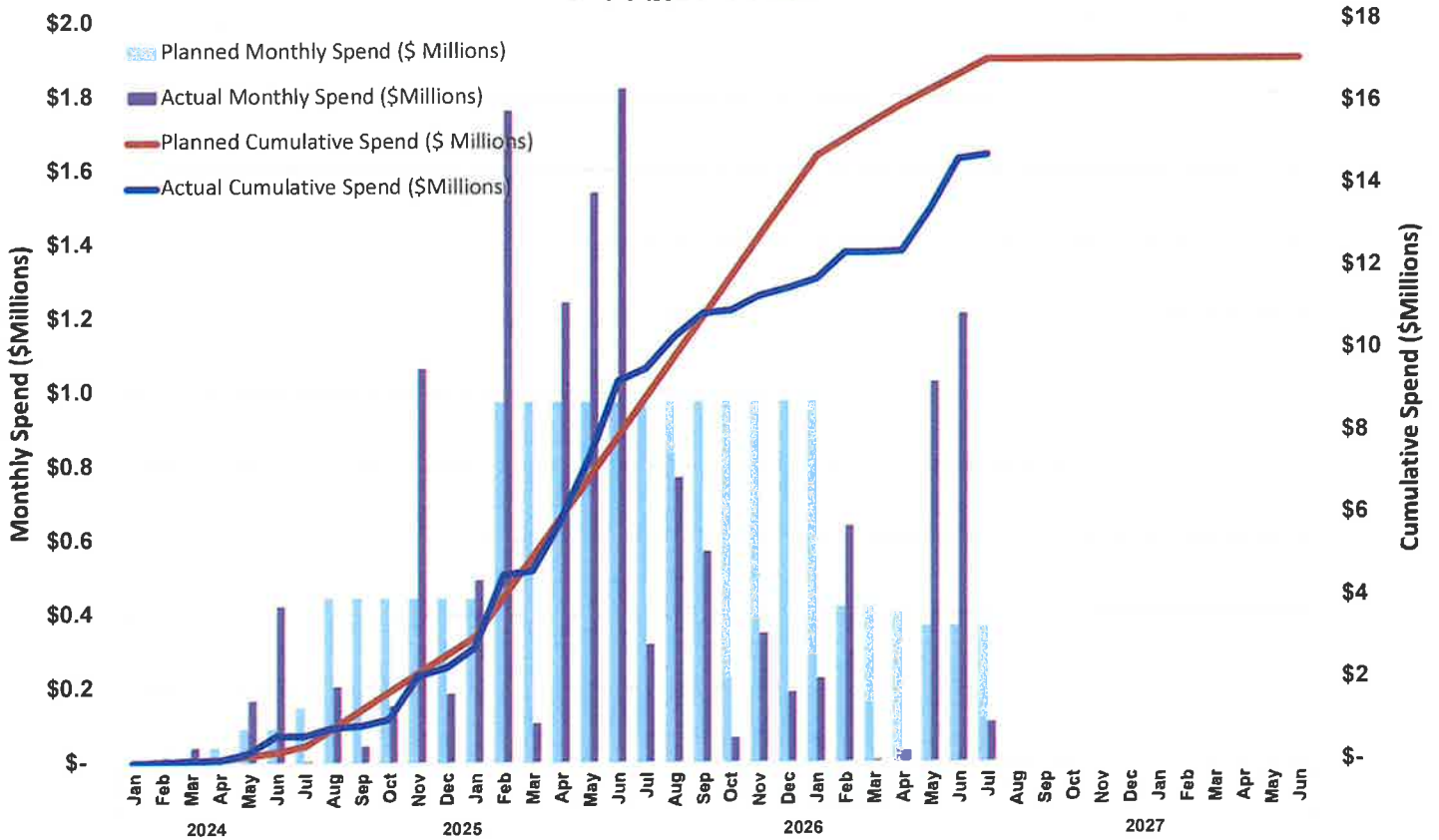

Federal Government Update

On September 1st, the House voted to advance the Senate version of the FY2027 Continuing Resolution (CR). The President signed this into law on September 2nd, effectively delaying the September 30th appropriations deadline until December 11th and ensuring the federal government will remain open thereby averting a partial shutdown.

The CR is necessary because while the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Appropriations has passed all 12 of the FY27 funding bills, the U.S. Senate has not advanced a single one of the 12 bills out of committee.

Hearing Held on Data Centers and Water Infrastructure

On September 3rd, the House Energy and Commerce Committee held a hearing to discuss the Safe Drinking Water Infrastructure Improvement Act of 2026, which would reauthorize the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund and includes a number of bipartisan priorities, including support for rural and smaller water systems, a program to provide point-of-use filters for drinking water systems at schools, and new authority to address cybersecurity risk. They also discussed the Water Cost Accountability Act of 2026, which would protect ratepayers from costs associated with local water systems serving data centers and whether centers can have positive impacts on local communities. Concerns surrounding the bills were expressed from both sides of the aisle and included water affordability assistance, consumer protection, local community representation, environmental impacts of data centers, and more. Witnesses included Neil Bradley, Executive Vice President, Chief Policy Officer, and Head of Strategic Advocacy, U.S. Chamber of Commerce; Julie Moore, Secretary, Vermont Agency of Natural Resources and Vice Chair, Water Committee, Environmental Council of States (ECOS); and Mae Wu, Founder and Principal, Health and Environmental Advising, LLC.

During questioning, members and witnesses discussed the economic and infrastructure impacts of data centers, drinking-water funding, and protections for ratepayers. Bradley emphasized that newer data-center technologies, including closed-loop systems, air cooling, gray water, and non-water liquid cooling, can substantially reduce water consumption and argued that data centers should pay the costs they impose on water systems, while noting their potential economic benefits and ability to provide reliable revenue that could improve infrastructure financing. Wu and Bradley agreed that reduced SRF funding could negatively affect communities, particularly rural ones, while Wu emphasized the importance of tracking and publicly sharing data-center

peak water use, drought impacts, and other water demands. Wu also supported stronger federal transparency requirements and Bradley favored a locally tailored approach because water systems and data centers differ significantly by location.

EPA Releases Supplemental WOTUS Proposal

The EPA and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have released a [supplemental proposal](#) to the Waters of the United States (WOTUS) Rule, which will open for a 30-day public comment period once published in the Federal Register. The proposal seeks input on additional regulatory options for defining key terms, including “perennial,” “relatively permanent,” and “continuous surface connection.” The agencies are also considering an alternative approach that would limit jurisdiction over adjacent wetlands to those that are indistinguishably connected to jurisdictional waters and would eliminate the existing definition of “adjacent.” The agencies emphasized that the supplemental proposal does not change the options included in the 2025 proposed rule and instead provides additional alternatives for public comment.

Court Upholds EPA Designation of PFOA and PFOS as Hazardous Substances Under CERCLA

On August 18th, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia upheld the EPA’s designation of PFOA and PFOS as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA). The court concluded the agency acted within its authority when designating the chemicals as hazardous substances in 2024. The challenge was filed by seven industry groups representing companies that use, transport, or discharge the PFOA and PFOS, which argued the EPA had exceeded its authority and inadequately considered the economic costs of the designation. The ruling means the designation remains in effect, subjecting certain releases of PFOA and PFOS to CERCLA reporting requirements and potentially allowing federal, state, and private parties to pursue cleanup costs from responsible parties.

CISA Posts Cybersecurity Warning on PLCs

On August 19th, the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) posted a [cybersecurity advisory](#) announcing threats to Siemens S7 Series programmable logic controllers (PLCs). The agency directs operators of these PLCs to apply critical security patches, ensure PLCs are not accessible from the internet, monitor for unauthorized activity, and harden PLC services, protocols, and ladder logic integrity. CISA’s recommendations are intended to reduce the risk that malicious actors could gain unauthorized access to operational technology and manipulate or disrupt physical processes.

Judge Blocks EPA’s Efforts to Nullify CA Emissions Waivers

On September 2nd, a U.S. District Judge granted California’s request for a preliminary injunction blocking the EPA’s attempt to use the Congressional Review Act (CRA) to overturn California’s Clean Air Act emissions waivers. The EPA had reclassified four longstanding waiver orders as “rules” subject to congressional review and submitted them to Congress. California challenged the reclassification, arguing that the EPA unlawfully changed the waivers’ legal status to make them subject to the CRA, despite historically treating them as orders. The Judge agreed that California was likely to succeed and ordered the EPA to restore the status quo by withdrawing or correcting the reclassifications. However, because the EPA had already transmitted the waivers to

Congress and resolutions seeking to overturn them had been introduced, the injunction does not necessarily prevent Congress from considering or voting on those resolutions.

Reclamation Releases Decision on Colorado River

On August 21st, the Bureau of Reclamation released a [Record of Decision](#) outlining a two-year and ten-year plan for post 2026 operations of the Colorado River. While not imposing regulations on water use for the upper basin states (Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming), the plan will direct the lower basin states (Arizona, California, and Nevada) to jointly lower their use by 1.25 million acre-feet in each of the next two years.

EPA Launches New Study of Pollutants in Drinking Water Systems

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced on September 9th a new scientific study to improve the agency's understanding of what pollutants may be present in public drinking water systems. EPA says the new study goes beyond traditional testing methods to screen for a broad array of pollutants, including pharmaceuticals, PFAS, and more than 1,000 potential contaminants.

The assessment will use Non-Targeted Analysis, which can identify unknown pollutants present in a drinking water sample. Non-Targeted Analysis allows researchers to scan thousands of potential pollutants, and the resulting insights will help EPA prioritize future actions to ensure that public drinking water systems are safe.

In addition to the new study, earlier this year, the agency released its [draft Sixth Contaminant Candidate List](#) (CCL 6), which helps prioritize funding, research, and information collection to better understand the potential health risks of unregulated contaminants in drinking water while advancing the agency's commitment to gold standard science. The agency also proposed its [Sixth Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule](#) (UCMR 6), which would require monitoring for contaminants not currently regulated but which may be present in drinking water.

Water Conservation Rebate Tax Parity Act ([H.R.1871](#), [S.857](#)) Rep. Jared Huffman (D-CA), Sen. John Curtis (R-UT)

Status: House - 03/05/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Senate - 03/05/2025 Referred to the Committee on Finance.

Summary: This legislation will amend federal tax law to ensure homeowners do not have to pay income tax when they receive rebates from water utilities for water conservation and water runoff management improvements.

Special District Fairness & Accessibility Act ([H.R.2766](#), [S.2014](#)) Rep. Pat Fallon (R-TX), Sen. John Cornyn (R-TX)

Status: House – 03/18/2026 Committee on Oversight and Government Reform Ordered to be Reported (Amended) by a vote of 32 - 8

Senate - 06/10/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs

Summary: This bill will require special districts to be recognized as local government and be eligible for federal funding.

Low-Income Household Assistance Water Program (LIHWAP) Establishment Act ([H.R.4733](#)) Rep. Eric Sorensen (D-IL)

Summary: This bill will provide \$50 million in grant funding for community water systems to purchase and implement new water technologies, including those that can identify water loss, examine pipe integrity, detect leaks, prepare for severe weather, innovate water storage systems, and more.

Water Cybersecurity Enhancement Act of 2025 ([S.1549](#), [H.R.5868](#)) Sen. Ruben Gallego (D-AZ)

Status: Senate - 05/01/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

House - 10/28/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will extend and expand the Drinking Water Infrastructure Risk and Resilience Program and provide technical assistance and grants to community water systems for training and guidance regarding protecting from and responding to cyberattacks.

Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny (REINS) Act ([H.R. 142](#)) Rep. Kat Cammack (R-FL)

Status: House - 01/03/2025 Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary, and in addition to the Committees on Rules, and the Budget

Summary: This bill will aim to increase accountability and transparency in the federal regulatory process by requiring that any new "major rule" proposed by federal agencies receive approval from both the House and Senate before taking effect.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Colorado River System Conservation Pilot Program through fiscal year 2026.

Preserving Choice in Vehicle Purchase Act ([H.R.346](#)) Rep. John Joyce (R-PA)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will block the U.S. Environmental Agency from giving California a waiver to "limit the sale or use of new motor vehicles with internal combustion engines." Summary: This joint resolution nullifies the rule titled National Primary Drinking Water Regulations for Lead and Copper: Improvements (LCRI), which was submitted by the Environmental Protection Agency on October 30, 2024.

Every Drop Counts Act ([H.R. 338](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA)

Status: House - 11/19/2025 Subcommittee Hearings Held.

Summary: This bill will expand the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's Small Storage Program by making it easier for groundwater projects to qualify for funding, increase the amount of water they can store, and stabilize underground aquifers.

Fix Our Forests Act ([H.R.471](#), [S.1462](#)) Rep. Bruce Westerman (R-AR), Sen. John Curtis (R-UT)

Status: House – 01/23/2025 Passed house 279 - 141

Senate - 03/06/2025 Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry Subcommittee on Conservation, Forestry, Natural Resources, and Biotechnology. Hearings held.

Summary: This bill simplifies and expedites environmental reviews for forest management projects, promotes federal, state, tribal, and local collaboration, and deters frivolous litigation that delays essential projects.

Stop the Delta Tunnel Act ([H.R.1311](#)) Rep. Josh Harder (D-CA)

Status: House - 02/13/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will prohibit the Army Corps of Engineers from issuing a federal permit necessary for the State of California to build the Delta Conveyance Project, commonly known as the Delta Tunnel.

Critical Infrastructure Manufacturing Feasibility Act ([H.R.1721](#)) Rep. Mariannette Miller-Meeks (R-IA)

Status: Senate - 04/29/2025 Received in the Senate and Referred to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation.

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of Commerce to conduct a study on the feasibility of manufacturing more critical infrastructure goods in the United States, with a focus on identifying rural communities best suited to support domestic production.

Headwaters Protection Act of 2025 ([H.R.605](#), [S.2701](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA), Sen. Michael Bennet (D-CO)

Status: House - 02/28/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Conservation, Research, and Biotechnology

Senate - 09/03/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry

Summary: This bill reauthorizes the Water Source Protection Program (WSPP) at \$30 million annually from 2024-2028, expands the list of eligible lands and entities, lowers the non-federal match requirement for smaller private sector companies, and reduces bureaucratic hurdles for existing Watershed Restoration Action Plans.

Wildfire Emergency Act of 2025 ([S.350](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of Agriculture to select and implement these projects, focusing on reducing the threat of destructive wildfires and assisting communities in increasing their resilience.

Lower Colorado River Multi-Species Conservation Program Amendment Act of 2025 ([H.R.831](#), [S.291](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA), Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: House - 03/16/2026 Passed the House.

Senate - 03/17/2026 Received in the Senate.

Summary: This bill will establish an interest-bearing account for the non-Federal contributions to the Lower Colorado River Multi-Species Conservation Program. This will ensure that state contributions to conservation projects in the Lower Colorado River Basin are able to earn interest and grow before being allocated.

Emergency Wildfire Fighting Technology Act ([H.R.836](#)) Rep. David Valadao (R-CA)

Status: House – 02/05/2025 Passed the House

Senate - 02/06/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: This bill will require the U.S. Forest Service and the Department of the Interior to jointly evaluate the use of the Container Aerial Firefighting System to mitigate and suppress wildfires

Disaster Resiliency and Coverage Act of 2025 ([H.R.1105](#)) Rep. Mike Thompson (D-CA)

Status: House - 02/06/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Economic Development, Public Buildings, and Emergency Management.

Summary: This bill will provide homeowners in disaster-prone regions with broad incentives to harden their properties against wildfires and other risks.

Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act ([H.R.1267](#)) Rep. Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D-WA)

Status: House - 02/12/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill exempts specified water management entities from liability under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 (CERCLA) for releases of certain perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly referred to as PFAS.

Aquatic Biodiversity Preservation Act of 2025 ([H.R. 1332](#)) Rep. Dave Min (D-CA)

Summary: This bill will establish a program within the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to collect data on at-risk, aquatic species.

Summary: This bill will amend the Coastal Zone Management Act (CZMA) to expedite important coastal activities, including national security initiatives, critical infrastructure development, and disaster mitigation and recovery efforts.

Federally Integrated Species Health (FISH) Act ([H.R.1894](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/06/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will eliminate the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Fisheries' oversight role in regulating salmon and other fish under the Endangered Species Act and designate the Fish and Wildlife Life Service (FWS) as the sole regulatory authority.

Protect the West Act of 2025 ([S.670](#)/[H.R.1459](#)) Sen. Michael Bennet (D-CO), Rep. Jason Crow (D-CO)

Status: Senate - 02/20/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

House - 03/20/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Conservation, Research, and Biotechnology

Summary: This bill will provide an investment of \$60 billion to establish an Outdoor Restoration Fund for restoration and resilience projects across the West.

Preventing Our Next Natural Disaster Act ([H.R.403](#)) Rep. Eric Swalwell (D-CA)

Status: House - 01/15/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Economic Development, Public Buildings, and Emergency Management

Summary: This bill will modify the Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant program to increase FEMA's Disaster Relief fund and increases funding accessibility for community planning, environmental justice communities, and impoverished communities.

Ending Major Borderland Environmental Ruin from Wildfires (EMBER) Act ([H.R.2026](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 04/04/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Forestry and Horticulture.

Summary: This bill will ensure better assessment, prevention, and help for communities to manage wildfires. It focuses on modernizing wildfire policies, bolstering resilience, and enhancing restoration efforts.

Summary: This bill provides congressional disapproval for a rule from the Fish and Wildlife Service which lists the San Francisco Bay-Delta distinct population segment (DPS) of longfin smelt as an endangered species under the Endangered Species Act

Water Risk and Resilience Reorganization ([H.R.2594](#)) Rep. Eric Crawford (R-AR)

Status: House - 04/02/2025 Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and to the Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will establish a Water Risk and Resilience Organization to support modifications and implementation for water systems to meet risk and resilience requirements.

Forest Service Accountability Act ([H.R.1762](#), [S.1061](#)) Rep. Ryan Zinke (R-MT), Sen. Mike Lee (R-UT)

Status: House - 03/28/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Forestry and Horticulture.

Senate - 03/13/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry

Summary: This bill will make the Chief of the Forest Service a Presidentially appointed position

Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act ([H.R.22](#), [S.128](#)) Rep. Chip Roy (R-TX), Sen. Mike Lee (R-UT)

Status: House – 04/10/2025 Passed by the Yeas and Nays: 220 – 208

Senate - 01/16/2025 Referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration.

Summary: This bill will amend the National Voter Registration Act of 1993 to people provide proof of citizenship when registering to vote in a federal election. The documents for proof of citizenship include a passport, REAL ID, birth certificate, or a military ID.

Restoring WIFIA Eligibility Act ([H.R.3035](#), [S.1760](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA), Sen. John Curtis (R-UT)

Status: House - 04/28/2025 Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and the Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will restore tax-exempt advance refunding for municipal bonds so state and local governments can more efficiently invest in projects throughout their communities.

Technical Fix for the State Response to Contaminants Program ([S.1324](#)) Sen. Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH)

Status: Senate - 04/08/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will provide flexibility for states to use funding from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law for PFAS in small and disadvantaged communities to assist private well owners.

Wastewater Infrastructure Pollution Prevention and Environmental Safety (WIPPES) Act ([S.1092](#)/[H.R.2269](#)) Sen. Jeff Merkley (D-OR), Rep. Lisa McClain (R-MI)

Status: Senate – 03/22/2026 Passed the Senate

House – 06/23/2025 Passed the House by voice vote.

Summary: This bill will require products with significant potential to be flushed to be labeled with "Do Not Flush" notices to protect pipe infrastructure.

Modification of the Aquifer Recharge Flexibility Act ([H.R.331](#), [S.1254](#)) Rep. Russ Fulcher (R-ID)

Status: House – 05/13/2025 Passed the House.

Senate - 05/14/2025 Received in the Senate and Read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will allow holders of existing right-of-way grants to use them for aquifer recharge without needing additional authorization from the Secretary of the Interior.

To provide technical and financial assistance for groundwater recharge, aquifer storage, and water source substitution projects ([H.R.337](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will modify the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act to allow unobligated funds for groundwater recharge projects, aquifer storage and recovery projects, and water source substitution for aquifer protection projects.

Agriculture Export Promotion Act of 2025 ([H.R.1086](#)) Rep. Dan Newhouse (R-WA)

Status: House - 02/06/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Agriculture.

Summary: This bill will extend and increase funding for the Market Access Program (MAP) and Foreign Market Development (FMD) Program through Fiscal Year 2029.

Fair Access to Agriculture Disaster Programs Act ([H.R.2156](#)/[S.984](#)) Rep. Jimmy Panetta (D-CA), Sen. Alex Padilla

Status: House - 04/04/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on General Farm Commodities, Risk Management, and Credit.

Senate - 03/12/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: This bill will expand eligibility for USDA disaster assistance programs by waiving gross income limitations.

Advancing Water Reuse Act ([H.R.2940](#)) Rep. Darin LaHood (R-IL)

Status: House - 04/17/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will catalyze the use of recycled water by manufacturers, data centers, and other industrial entities.

Disaster Related Extension of Deadlines Act ([H.R.1491](#)/[S.1438](#)) Rep. Gregory Murphy (R-NC), Sen. Raphael Warnock (D-GA)

Status: House: 12/26/2025 Became Public Law No: 119-64.

Senate - 04/10/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Finance.

Summary: This bill will ensure that natural disaster victims have sufficient time to claim tax refunds and credits, even when their filing deadlines are extended due to a disaster.

Proven Forest Management Act of 2025 ([H.R.179](#)) Rep. Tom McClintock (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/08/2026 Reported (Amended) by the Committee on Natural Resources

Summary: This bill will expand forest management practices that have proven successful in reducing wildfire risks and promoting forest health, improving forest resiliency.

Filing Relief for Natural Disasters Act ([H.R.517](#)/[S.132](#)) Rep. David Kustoff (R-TN), Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV)

Status: House: 7/24/2025 Became law

Senate - 01/16/2025 Referred to the Committee on Finance.

Summary: This bill will grant the IRS the authority to postpone federal tax filing deadlines for taxpayers affected by state-declared disasters and states of emergency.

FEMA Independence Act ([H.R. 2308](#)) Rep. Jared Moskowitz (D-FL)

Status: House - 03/24/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Emergency Management and Technology.

Summary: This bill will remove FEMA from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and restore it as an independent, Cabinet-level agency.

Water Affordability, Transparency, Equity, and Reliability (WATER) Act of 2023 ([S.1730](#)) Sen. Bernard Sanders (I-VT)

Status: Senate - 05/13/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will assist communities in securing access to clean and reliable drinking water. This bill also contains provisions to combat PFAS and provide grants for low-income communities struggling with unaffordable water bills.

Veterans Exposed to Toxic PFAS Act ([H.R.3639](#)) Rep. Michael Lawler (R-NY)

Status: House - 06/06/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Health.

Summary: This bill provides eligibility for Department of Veterans Affairs hospital care and medical services to veterans and their family members (including those in utero) who have specified conditions and resided at a military installation where individuals were exposed to perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly known as PFAS.

National Prescribed Fire Act of 2025 ([H.R.3889](#), [S.2015](#)) Rep. Kim Schrier (D-WA), Sen. Ron Wyden (D-OR)

Status: House - 06/10/2025 Referred to the Committee on Natural Resources, and in addition to the Committees on Agriculture, and Energy and Commerce.

Senate - 12/17/2025 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will increase funding for Forest Service and DOI for prescribed burns, establish a program for implementation of prescribed burns, establish a program for workforce development, and facilitate coordination between land managers and air quality agencies to alter prescribed burn practices to reduce catastrophic smoke events in the summer.

PFAS National Drinking Water Standard Act of 2025 ([H.R.4168](#)) Rep. Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA)

Status: House - 06/26/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will codify the EPA's final PFAS National Primary Drinking Water Regulation, establishing enforceable maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for six of the most hazardous PFAS chemicals, including PFOA and PFOS, in public drinking water systems.

WILTR Act of 2025 ([H.R.4181](#)) Rep. Darrell Issa (R-CA)

Status: House - 06/26/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will incentivize wildfire prevention infrastructure and landowner preparedness through targeted tax relief.

The Healthy Drinking Water Affordability Act (Healthy H2O Act) ([H.R.4721](#), [S.2436](#)) Rep. David Rouzer (R-NC), Sen. Tammy Baldwin (D-WI)

Status: House - 07/23/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Agriculture.

Senate - 07/24/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: This bill will provide grants through the U.S. Department of Agriculture for water quality testing and to purchase and install point-of-entry water filtration systems to remove contaminants from drinking water.

Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program Reauthorization Act of 2025 ([S.2437](#)) Sen. John Hickenlooper (D-CO)

Status: Senate - 06/10/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation's Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program which provides grants to advance emerging snow monitoring technology that improve water supply predictions.

Fixing Emergency Management for Americans (FEMA) Act ([H.R.4669](#)) Rep. Sam Graves (R-MO)

Status: House - 09/03/2025 Ordered to be Reported (Amended) by the Yeas and Nays: 57 - 3

Summary: This bill will authorize and improve the Federal Emergency Management Agency and reform Federal disaster mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery.

Water Infrastructure Resiliency Act ([H.R.5513](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 09/20/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will clarify eligible uses under the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) to include modern software tools for the modernization of infrastructure.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([H.R.5566](#)) Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will fund upgrades to drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure to make them more resilient against threats by reauthorizing the following programs: Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, Midsize and Large Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, and the Clean Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Program.

Water Infrastructure Subcontractor and Taxpayer Protection Act ([H.R.1285](#), [S.570](#)) Rep. Mike Bost (R-IL), Se. Mark Kelly (D-AZ)

Status: House - 02/13/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Senate - 02/13/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: Requires prime contractors on federally funded water infrastructure projects to pay subcontractors promptly and ensures federal oversight to prevent misuse of taxpayer funds.

Water Resources Technical Assistance Review Act ([H.R.3427](#)) Rep. David Taylor (R-OH)

Status: House – 09/15/2025 Passed out of the House.

Senate - 09/16/2025 Received in the Senate and Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: Requires the Army Corps of Engineers to review, assess, and report on the effectiveness of its technical assistance programs for water resources projects, ensuring they meet the needs of local communities and stakeholders.

Golden Mussel Eradication and Control Act of 2025 ([H.R.3717](#)) Rep. Josh Harder (D-CA)

Status: House - 09/10/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water, Wildlife and Fisheries.

Summary: Directs federal efforts to control and eradicate invasive golden mussel populations in U.S. waterways to protect ecosystems and infrastructure.

Regional Leadership in Wildland Fire Research Act ([H.R.6154](#), [S.647](#)) Rep. Dave Min (D-CA), Sen. Ben Ray Lujan (D-NM)

Status: House - 05/20/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Conservation, Research, and Biotechnology.

Senate - 02/20/2025 Referred to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation.

Summary: This bill will establish research centers at higher education institutions across the country to support wildfire research and develop new technologies to enhance wildfire preparedness.

Standardizing Permitting and Expediting Economic Development (SPEED) Act ([H.R.4776](#)) Rep. Bruce Westerman (R-AR)

Status: House – 12/18/2025 Passed by the Yeas and Nays: 221 – 196.

Senate - 12/18/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will narrow the scope of federal actions which trigger a NEPA review by redefining the term “major federal actions” and will also expedite the review process.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([S.3590](#), [H.R.5566](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE), Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/07/2026 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Midsize and Large Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience Program, Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, and Clean Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Program for five years.

Unincorporated Partnerships for Grant Resources, Assistance, and Drinking Water Enhancements (UPGRADE) Act ([S. 3465](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE)

Status: Senate - 12/11/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works

Summary: This bill will amend the Safe Drinking Water Act to reauthorize the EPA's Small, Underserved, and Disadvantaged Communities grant program through 2031 and make unincorporated communities eligible for funding to improve access to clean water.

PFAS Research and Development Reauthorization Act ([H.R. 6667](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 02/02/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will extend EPA's authority and funding to conduct research and development on PFAS after its prior authorization expired.

No Taxation on PFAS Remediation Act ([H.R. 6669](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 12/11/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will amend the Internal Revenue Code to ensure that reimbursements or rebates used for PFAS cleanup are excluded from gross income for tax purposes.

Clean Water Standards for PFAS Act ([H.R. 6668](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 02/02/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will require the EPA to establish effluent limitation guidelines and water quality criteria for PFAS discharges under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, setting regulatory deadlines for industry controls.

Community Protection and Wildfire Resilience Act ([S.3609](#), [H.R.582](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA), Rep. Jared Huffman (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/08/2026 Referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs.

House - 01/21/2025 Referred to the Committee on Science, Space, and Technology, and in addition to the Committees on Natural Resources, and Agriculture

Summary: This bill will create a new federal grant program to invest \$1 billion annually to help communities develop and implement Community Protection and Wildfire Resilience Plans

Making Our Communities Resilient through Enhancing Water for Agriculture, Technology, the Environment, and Residences (MORE WATER) Act ([S.3738](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 07/29/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) large-scale recycled water program, providing federal grants for up to 25% of the cost of these recycling projects, and would create a new federal grant program to help repair California's water delivery system.

Growing Resilient Operations from Water Savings and Municipal- Agricultural Reciprocally-beneficial Transactions (GROW SMART) Act ([S.3737](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 03/17/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources Subcommittee on Water and Power. Hearings held.

Summary: This bill will authorize \$5 million per year for seven years for the BOR to fund the development of voluntary agricultural partnerships with municipal, industrial, and commercial entities and the design of innovative water-saving projects.

Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act Amendments of 2025 ([H.R.6229](#)) Rep. Kim Schrier (D-WA)

Status: House - 11/22/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act of 2014 through 2029, lowers minimum project sizes for small communities, allows up to 55-year loan maturities, and promotes collaborative project delivery.

Western Wildfire Support Act ([S.91](#), [H.R.5782](#)) Rep. Joe Neguse (D-CO),

Status: Senate - 02/04/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Economic Development, Public Buildings, and Emergency Management.

Summary: This bill will provide comprehensive resources to prevent wildfires, enhance firefighting efforts, and support communities impacted by year-round wildfire seasons.

To require the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out activities to suppress wildfires ([H.R.178](#)) Rep. Tom McClintock (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/08/2026 Reported (Amended) by the Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out wildfire suppression and to not suppress wildfire fighting efforts.

Advanced Capabilities for Emergency Response Operations (ACERO) Act ([H.R.3930](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 06/11/2025 Ordered to be Reported in the Nature of a Substitute by the Yeas and Nays: 34 - 0.

Senate - 02/24/2026 Received in the Senate and referred to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation.

Summary: This bill will authorize the ACERO program which conducts research and development activities regarding aerial response to wildfires using uncrewed aircraft systems (UAS) and other advanced aviation technologies.

Save Our Sequoias Act ([H.R.2709](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/12/2026 Placed on the Union Calendar, Calendar No. 466

Senate - 03/17/2026 Received in the Senate and Read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will establish a set of programs to improve the health and resiliency of giant sequoias, including shared stewardship agreements, emergency response, reforestation strategies, and collaborative restoration grants.

Snow Water Supply Forecasting Reauthorization Act ([H.R.3857](#)) Rep. Jeff Hurd (R-CO)

Status: Senate - 06/10/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize and modify the Bureau of Reclamation's Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program through FY2031.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([S.3590](#), [H.R.5566](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE), Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/07/2026 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will amend the Federal Water Pollution Control Act to reauthorize the clean water infrastructure resiliency and sustainability program, and amend the Safe Drinking Water Act to reauthorize drinking water resilience and midsize/large system sustainability programs.

Desalination Reauthorization Act ([S.5352](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 08/06/2026 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will provide grants for projects and research to its lower costs and reduce its environmental impacts to support desalination.

Subject: September 2026 Monthly Report

The California Legislature adjourned the 2026 Legislative Session on August 31, shifting attention to Governor Newsom, who has until September 30 to sign or veto bills sent to his desk. Several measures of direct interest to water agencies remain pending, including proposals addressing golden mussels, Proposition 218 water rates, wildfire liability, State Water Project subsidence, tribal water policy, and data center water demand.

For the water community, the final package is a mix of priority bills and significant concerns. Water agencies are urging signatures on AB 1894 related to Golden Mussels, AB 2180 related to tiered water rates, SB 1153 which would provide additional liability protection for water agencies, and SB 872 which would establish a fund to address subsidence of the State Water Project. ACWA, CMUA and other local government and business organizations continue to request a veto of AB 1881 and AB 2218 which would have impacts on water rights and permitting related to tribal governments. The Governor's decisions over the next two weeks will determine the final outcome of these issues for the 2025-26 session.

One major issue that ultimately did not advance before adjournment was the proposed overhaul of California's wildfire liability framework. Governor Newsom had pushed for changes intended to address the long-term solvency of the state's Wildfire Fund and reduce the financial exposure of investor-owned utilities following utility-caused wildfires. After weeks of negotiations and significant opposition from wildfire survivors, public agencies, insurers and other stakeholders, the proposal was substantially narrowed. The Assembly ultimately declined to take up the compromise measure before the Legislature adjourned, leaving the broader questions surrounding utility liability, insurance subrogation and the future of the Wildfire Fund unresolved. Legislative leaders have indicated the issue will need to be revisited, although no clear timeline has been established.

On the regulatory front, activity has been accelerating. Near-term items include the State Water Board's final draft Bay-Delta Plan, annual Urban Water Use Objective reporting under the Making Conservation a California Way of Life regulation, implementation of the federal Lead and Copper Rule Improvements, and CDFW's invasive mussel regulations. These proceedings will continue beyond the legislative signing deadline and will remain important into 2027.

Key Bills

AB 2180 (Ward-D) Proposition 218: Local government: Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act: proportional cost of service

AB 2180 would provide additional guidance for establishing tiered water rates under Proposition 218. The bill would allow local agencies to use reasonable methods to allocate ascertainable service costs, including historic, current, estimated or projected costs, and would allow rates to account for water supply, facilities, peak demand, conservation and other service costs. The measure is intended to provide greater certainty following conflicting appellate decisions on tiered water rates.

Position: Key Watch

Status: Presented to the Governor on August 25; awaiting action.

AB 2218 (Kalra-D) Water policy: California Native American tribes

AB 2218 would establish a broad state policy addressing historic inequities in tribal access to and control of water. It directs state agencies to consider tribal beneficial uses, consultation, Indigenous knowledge and financial assistance in regulations, permits, grants and other decisions, and creates a mediation process through the Governor's Office of Tribal Affairs. ACWA, CMUA, CSDA, CSAC, CalChamber, Farm Bureau and numerous water agencies oppose the bill, arguing that its standards could create uncertainty for water rights, infrastructure projects, Bay-Delta decisions and regulatory proceedings.

Position: Key Watch

Status: Presented to the Governor on September 3; awaiting action.

SB 872 (McNerney-D) Delta Levees and Canal Subsidence Fund

SB 872 would create a dedicated fund to support repairs to State Water Project facilities damaged by subsidence and to finance Delta and Suisun Marsh levee projects. The fund could receive General Fund, Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, bond, federal and private money. Earlier versions included \$300 million, but the final bill does not contain that appropriation, meaning future funding will still depend on the state budget process.

Position: Support (Coalition)

Status: Presented to the Governor on August 27; awaiting action.

SB 1153 (Caballero-D) Disaster preparedness: water systems and wildfire

Sponsored by ACWA, SB 1153 addresses wildfire preparedness and liability for water agencies. Beginning in 2028, qualifying suppliers in high and very high fire hazard severity zones would address wildfire mitigation, emergency power, infrastructure resilience, communications and recovery in their planning. The bill also clarifies that a water system does not have a new duty to design or maintain facilities for wildfire suppression and that an inability to maintain water pressure is not, by itself, a substantial cause of wildfire damage.

Position: Support (Coalition)

Status: Presented to the Governor on September 8; awaiting action.

Regulatory and Administrative Actions

Urban Water Use Objective Reporting

The State Water Board has released the FY 2025-26 Urban Water Use Objective reporting materials under the Making Conservation a California Way of Life regulation. Urban retail water suppliers must submit their annual objective and actual water use data by January 1, 2027. Requests for variances and temporary provisions are due October 1, 2026, making this the most immediate compliance deadline for urban suppliers. [More information](#)

Bay-Delta Plan

On August 19, the State Water Board released the final draft update to the Bay-Delta Water Quality Control Plan. The proposal establishes both a voluntary Healthy Rivers and Landscapes pathway and a regulatory pathway for meeting new flow and habitat requirements. Written comments on changes made since the December 2025 draft are due September 18, and the Board is scheduled to consider adoption on October 28-29. [More information](#)

Lead and Copper Rule Improvements

On August 19, the State Water Board approved emergency regulations to implement the federal Lead and Copper Rule Improvements. Key requirements include identifying lead service lines, replacing lead and galvanized lines requiring replacement within 10 years, strengthened tap sampling, a lower lead action level, and expanded testing in schools and child care facilities. The anticipated compliance date is November 1, 2027. [More information](#)

Golden Mussels Regulation

CDFW continues its rulemaking to implement AB 149 and establish a statewide framework for invasive mussel inspections and watercraft decontamination. On September 2, CDFW issued a 15-day continuation notice with comments due September 17. The regulations are particularly important to the water community because of the operational and water-delivery risks associated with the spread of golden mussels. [More information](#)

CDTFA Digital Products Tax Rulemaking

On September 10, the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDTFA) held an interested parties meeting on implementation of SB 122, which expands California's sales and use tax to certain digital products beginning January 1, 2027. The discussion focused largely on how the new tax will apply in practice to prewritten software and Software as a Service (SaaS), including how to distinguish taxable software from exempt custom software and digital services, where a digital transaction is considered to occur for tax purposes, treatment of products used in multiple locations, out-of-state use, the \$5 million tax-liability threshold, and use-tax direct payment procedures. Several stakeholders raised concerns about areas where the proposed regulations remain unclear, particularly the treatment of cloud infrastructure, artificial intelligence products and services involving both software and human effort. CDTFA is developing emergency regulations to have rules in place before the January 1 effective date. Interested parties may submit additional comments and proposed regulatory language through **September 24, 2026**, after which CDTFA will review the feedback and move toward finalizing the emergency regulations.

[SB 601](#) ([Allen, D](#)) Water: waste discharge.

Introduced: 02/20/2025

Last Amended: 07/10/2025

Location: 08/14/2026 - Assembly DEAD

Summary: The State Water Resources Control Board and the 9 California regional water quality control boards regulate water quality and prescribe waste discharge requirements in accordance with the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act (act) and the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit program. Under the act, the State Water Resources Control Board is authorized to adopt water quality control plans for waters for which quality standards are required by the federal Clean Water Act, as specified, and that in the event of a conflict, those plans supersede regional water quality control plans for the same waters. This bill would authorize the state board to adopt water quality control plans for nexus waters, which the bill would define as all waters of the state that are not also navigable, except as specified. The bill would require any water quality standard that was submitted to, and approved by, or is awaiting approval by, the United States Environmental Protection Agency or the state board that applied to nexus waters as of May 24, 2023, to remain in effect, as provided. [AB 1413](#) ([Papan, D](#)) Sustainable Groundwater Management Act: groundwater adjudication.

Introduced: 02/21/2025 (Spot bill)

Summary: Current law requires the Department of Water Resources to periodically review the groundwater sustainability plans developed by groundwater sustainability agencies pursuant to the act to evaluate whether a plan conforms with specified laws and is likely to achieve the sustainability goal for the basin covered by the plan. Current law requires a groundwater sustainability agency to evaluate its groundwater sustainability plan periodically. This bill would require a groundwater sustainability agency to, at least once every 7 years, review, and update if appropriate, its sustainable yield to ensure that the sustainable yield is based on the best available information and best available science, as defined, and will achieve sustainable groundwater management. The bill would also require a groundwater sustainability agency to provide an opportunity for public review and comment before making a determination whether to update its sustainable yield. To the extent that these requirements impose additional duties on groundwater sustainability agencies that are local agencies, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. Introduced: 02/17/2026

Last Amended: 04/06/2026

Summary: Existing law requires the State Fire Marshal to identify areas in the state as moderate, high, and very high fire hazard severity zones based on consistent statewide criteria and based on the severity of fire hazard that is expected to prevail in those areas. This bill would require a community water system that services more than

100 customers that are located in a high or very high fire risk area, as defined, to include an annex to its disaster preparedness plans, as provided, that includes information regarding system preparedness and resiliency during a wildfire. The bill would require the annex to contain several things, including, among others, an assessment that identifies the minimum number of and type of water pumps that are necessary to maintain average daily capacity, including, but not limited to, the operation of fire hydrant systems at the rated capacity. Introduced: 01/13/2026

Summary: The Administrative Procedure Act governs the procedures for the adoption, amendment, or repeal of regulations by state agencies and for the review of those regulatory actions by the Office of Administrative Law. Existing law requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal an administrative regulation to, among other things, assess the potential for adverse economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals, and requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal a major regulation on or after November 1, 2013, to prepare and submit to the Department of Finance for comment, a standardized regulatory impact analysis, as provided. Existing law defines "major regulation" for purposes of the act to mean any proposed adoption, amendment, or repeal of a regulation subject to review by the office that will have an economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals in an amount exceeding \$50,000,000, as provided. Existing law establishes procedures for the adoption of emergency regulations, including requiring that the state agency make a finding that the adoption of a regulation or order of repeal is necessary to address an emergency, as defined. Under existing law, a regulation, amendment, or order of repeal adopted as an emergency regulatory action may only remain in effect for up to 180 days, unless the adopting agency complies with specified requirements. This bill, the Restoring Accountability Act, would prohibit a state agency from taking final action to adopt a major regulation until certain requirements are met, including that after the state agency prepares a standardized regulatory impact analysis and submits the analysis to the Department of Finance, as described above, the state agency submits a proposal to the Legislature recommending legislation to authorize the adoption of the major regulation and the Legislature enacts a law expressly authorizing the state agency to adopt that major regulation. The bill, notwithstanding that prohibition, would authorize a state agency to adopt an emergency regulation that is a major regulation if the state agency complies with specified requirements governing the adoption of emergency regulations. The Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024 (act), approved by the voters as Proposition 4 at the November 5, 2024, statewide general election, authorized the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$10,000,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for safe drinking water, drought, flood, and water resilience, wildfire and forest resilience, coastal resilience, extreme heat mitigation, biodiversity and nature-based climate solutions, climate-smart, sustainable, and resilient farms, ranches, and working lands, park creation and

outdoor access, and clean air programs. Existing law authorizes certain regulations needed to effectuate or implement programs of the act to be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, as provided. Existing law requires the emergency regulations to be filed with the Office of Administrative Law and requires the emergency regulations to remain in effect until repealed or amended by the adopting state agency. This bill, notwithstanding the above, would exempt the adoption of regulations needed to effectuate or implement programs of the act from the requirements of the Administrative Procedure Act, as provided. The bill would require a state entity that receives funding to administer a competitive grant program established using the Administrative Procedure Act exemption to do certain things, including, among other things, to develop draft project solicitation and evaluation guidelines, to transmit copies of those guidelines to the fiscal committees and to the appropriate policy committees of the Legislature, to hold a noticed public meeting on those guidelines, and to submit those guidelines to the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency, except as provided. Summary: The Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Reform Act of 2009, declares that the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta (Delta) is a critically important natural resource for California and the nation and it serves as both the hub of the California water system and the most valuable estuary and wetland ecosystem on the west coast of North and South America. Existing law establishes in the Natural Resources Agency the Department of Water Resources (department). Existing law requires the department and the Department of Fish and Wildlife to determine the principal options for the Delta and requires the department to evaluate and comparatively rate each option for its ability to do specified things, including, among others, to maintain Delta water quality for Delta users, and to

preserve, protect, and improve Delta levees. Existing law establishes in the agency the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Conservancy. Existing law requires the conservancy to act as a primary state agency to implement ecosystem restoration in the Delta and to support efforts that advance environmental protection and the economic well-being of Delta residents. Existing law provides for the preservation of specified management areas of the Suisun Marsh, pursuant to a protection plan prepared and adopted by the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission, as provided. Existing law establishes the Delta Stewardship Council, and requires the council to develop, adopt, and implement a comprehensive long-term management plan for the Delta, known as the Delta Plan, as provided. Existing law requires the department, upon appropriation, to reimburse an eligible local agency for costs incurred for the maintenance or improvement of specified levees, in an amount not to exceed 75% of costs incurred in excess of a set amount per mile, as provided. This bill would require the department to reimburse 100% of the excess costs if a local agency demonstrates economic hardship and the reimbursement is for a project that addresses a threat to life, property, water supply, or habitat. Summary: The California Emergency Services Act requires all public water systems, as defined, with 10,000 or more service connections to review and revise their disaster preparedness plans in conjunction with related agencies, including, but not limited to, local fire departments and the Office of Emergency Services, to ensure that the plans are sufficient to address possible disaster scenarios. A person, as defined, who violates the provisions of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor. This bill, beginning January 1, 2028, would require all urban retail water suppliers, as defined, serving 3,300 or more persons and serving a high or very high fire hazard severity zone to include incident-specific response procedures for wildfires as part of their disaster preparedness plans, including any applicable emergency response plan as required by federal law. The bill would require these plans to include, among other things, mitigation actions, including actions, procedures, and equipment, that can obviate or significantly lessen the impact of a wildfire on the water system and the supply of drinking water provided by the water supplier. Because violation of these requirements by certain urban retail water suppliers would constitute a misdemeanor, the bill would expand the scope of a crime, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program. This bill would provide that the provision related to the procurement of eligible renewable energy resources by local publicly owned electric utilities also applies to the compliance periods established by the Energy Commission. Current law authorizes the joint powers authority to establish financial assistance limits and matching funding or other recipient contribution requirements for the program, as provided. This bill, contingent upon appropriation by the Legislature, would establish the Rural Water Infrastructure for Wildfire Resilience Program within the OES for the distribution of state matching funds to urban wildland interface communities, as defined, in designated high fire hazard severity zones or very high fire hazard severity zones to improve water system infrastructure, as prescribed. The bill would require the OES to work in coordination with the Department of Water Resources, the State Water Resources Control Board, the Office of the State Fire Marshal, and other state entities as the OES determines to be appropriate, to achieve the purposes of the program. The bill would provide that if a species proposed for listing becomes listed as an endangered, threatened, or candidate species, further authorization or approval shall not be required for a take of that species, if specified conditions are met, including that the species proposed for listing was included as a covered species in a permit previously issued by the department for incidental take and that the incidental take is caused by a renewable electrical generation facility. The bill would require a large jurisdiction, as defined, to develop this program by July 1, 2027, and a small jurisdiction, as defined, to develop a program by January 1, 2029. The bill would require the local agency to post preapproved single-family or multifamily residential housing plans and the contact information of the applicant on the local agency's internet website. Under the California Constitution, assets of a public pension or retirement system are trust funds. In this regard, PEPRA restricts the amount of compensation that may be applied for purposes of calculating a defined pension benefit for a new member, as defined, by restricting it to specified percentages of the contribution and benefit base under a specified federal law with respect to old age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits. Existing law, the Teachers' Retirement Law, establishes the State Teachers' Retirement System (STRS) and creates the Defined Benefit Program of the State Teachers' Retirement Plan, which provides a defined benefit to members of the program, based on final compensation, creditable service, and age at retirement, subject to certain variations. This bill, for service performed on and after January 1, 2027, would prohibit the pensionable compensation for calendar year 2027 used to calculate the defined benefit paid to a new member of a retirement system subject to PEPRA who retires from the system from exceeding specified percentages of the contribution and benefit base under the specified federal law with respect to old age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits. Existing law authorizes that time limit to be extended by no more than 14 days under unusual circumstances, as defined. This bill would instead require each agency to determine whether the request seeks copies of disclosable public records in possession of the agency and to promptly notify the person as described above within 10 business days of a request for a copy of records. This bill would authorize the Labor Commissioner or a public prosecutor to enforce the bill's provisions. Existing law provides, however, that the diversion of floodflows for groundwater recharge does not require an appropriative water right if certain conditions are met, including that a local or regional agency that has adopted a local plan of flood control or has considered flood risks as part of its most recently adopted general plan has given notice, as provided, of imminent risk of flooding and inundation of lands, roads, or structures. Existing law defines "floodflow" for these purposes to include circumstances in which flows would inundate ordinarily dry areas in the bed of a terminal lake to a depth that floods dairies and other ongoing agricultural activities, or areas with substantial residential, commercial, or industrial development. Existing law applies those requirements to diversions commenced before January 1, 2029. Existing law prohibits an entity from substantially diverting or obstructing the natural flow of, or substantially changing or using any material from the bed, channel, or bank of, any river, stream, or lake, or from depositing or disposing of certain material where it may pass into any river, stream, or lake, without first notifying the Department of Fish and Wildlife of that activity, and entering into a lake or streambed alteration agreement if required by the department to protect fish and wildlife resources, except as specified. This bill would revise and recast those conditions required for the appropriative water right exemption for a diversion of floodflows for groundwater recharge, would apply the requirements to a diversion commenced before January 1, 2034, and would further exempt those diversions from the requirements of CEQA and requirements relating to lake or streambed alteration agreements, subject to conducting tribal consultation, as provided. The act requires each local government lying in whole or in part within the coastal zone to prepare a local coastal program for that portion of the coastal zone within its jurisdiction. The act requires a land use plan of a proposed local coastal program to be submitted to the California Coastal Commission for certification. The act authorizes the commission to extend, for a period not to exceed one year, certain time limitations relating to local coastal programs for good cause. This bill would authorize the commission to retroactively extend, for good cause and a period not to exceed 5 years, a time limitation established for a local government to act on the commission's

Existing law also requires a plaintiff to file, within a specified timeframe, a motion for approval of the draft notice and draft form answer. Under existing law, once the court approves the draft notice, the plaintiff is required to serve the notice, as specified. Following a court order approving both the notice and draft form answer and authorizing service thereof, existing law requires the plaintiff to take additional steps to provide notice to defendants including, but not limited to, mailing, by registered mail or certified mail, return receipt requested, the notice, complaint, and form answer to all holders of fee title to real property in the basin. Under existing law, if a return receipt is not received for a parcel of real property, the plaintiff must post a copy of the notice, complaint, and form answer in a conspicuous place on the real property. After completing these notice procedures, existing law requires the plaintiff to file a notice of completion of the mailing with the court. Existing law permits a court to authorize any other procedures it finds appropriate and necessary to provide notice to persons who may hold groundwater rights in basin. This bill would impose additional requirements on a plaintiff when filing the notice of completion of mailing. The bill would require the plaintiff to include with the notice of completion an affidavit of the person who mailed the notice and the certified or registered mail delivery receipt for each parcel stating the date, time, and place of mailing. The bill would further require the notice to include as an attachment any certified or registered mail delivery receipts received as of the date of the filing. (Based on 08/27/2026 text)

Existing law, known as the Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act (act), prescribes specific procedures and parameters for local jurisdictions to comply with these requirements and, among other things, authorizes an agency providing water, wastewater, sewer, or refuse collection services to adopt a schedule of fees or charges authorizing automatic adjustments that pass through increases in wholesale charges for water, sewage treatment, or wastewater treatment or adjustments for inflation under certain circumstances. This bill would authorize a local government to demonstrate the proportional cost of the service attributable to the parcel by any method that reasonably allocates the ascertainable cost of providing service to all parcels, if substantiated as provided. The bill would, however, provide that for water or sewer service fee or charge impositions, a local government is not required to provide an exact measure of the cost of the service at each parcel and may instead impose uniform or tiered rates to parcel or customer classes that are defined based on common characteristics indicative of likely water or sewer use. Under the act, the state board and the regional boards prescribe waste discharge requirements for the discharge of waste that could affect the quality of the waters of the state. This bill would require the State Water Resources Control Board to require the regional boards to update the Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program in order to reduce nitrogen waste discharges from commercial irrigated agricultural areas, as provided. The bill would require the regional boards to adopt revised orders with waste discharge requirements on or before January 1, 2028, that are sufficient to meet certain reductions in nitrogen waste discharges. The bill would require the state board to, on or before July 1, 2027, publish both a list of standardized crop names and categories, and a statewide methodology for calculating, and field-level reporting of, nitrogen balances for croplands, including nitrogen fertilizer applications and nitrogen discharges, that account for available soil nitrogen, to be used by the regional boards and incorporated into the revised orders. The act authorizes a person, acting in the public interest, to bring an action to enforce the requirements of the act if specified requirements are met. If there is a settlement of an action brought by a person in the public interest the act requires the plaintiff to submit the settlement to the court for approval upon noticed motion, and authorizes the court to approve the settlement only if the court makes specified findings, as provided, including that the award of attorney's fees is reasonable under state law. This bill would additionally require the court to find that the award of attorney's fees is appropriate under state law and that the settlement is in the public interest and provides a public benefit. The bill would further require, under a specified circumstance, the court to find that the settlement would require the defendant to reduce the exposure to the listed chemical from the level that existed before the settlement or provide a warning that complies with the act if that warning was not provided previously. This bill would require the office, upon appropriation by the Legislature, to establish the Infrastructure Gap-Fund Program to provide grants to local agencies for the development and construction of infrastructure projects, as defined, facing unforeseen costs after starting construction. The bill would authorize the office to provide funding for up to 20% of a project's additional projected cost, as defined, after the project has started construction, subject to specified conditions, including, among other things, that the local agency has allocated existing local tax revenue for at least 45% of the initially budgeted total cost of the infrastructure project. When applying to the program, the bill would require the local agency to demonstrate challenges with completing the project on time and on budget and how the infrastructure project helps meet state and local goals, as specified. Existing law authorizes the County of San Bernardino to sell or exchange property it owns within the Chino Agricultural Preserve that was purchased with grant funds if it meets certain conditions. This bill would additionally authorize preservation of those lands or easements for park and recreational purposes, and would explicitly include, to the extent they are consistent with the purposes of the act, playgrounds, recreational venues, and preservation of historical resources as appropriate purposes. This bill would impose specific duties on the Department of Housing and Community Development if the Office of Emergency Services makes a written determination, within 10 days after the date that the Governor declared a state of emergency relating to a wildfire, that the wildfire caused substantial structural damage requiring significant rebuilding efforts, as defined. The bill would require the department, under this condition, to consult with other specified state entities and local governments to identify state permitting requirements and local procedures that could be suspended or revised to support recovery and rebuilding efforts as a result of the wildfire, as specified. The bill would require the department to prepare and submit initial and periodic reports to the Governor and Legislature with the information and recommendations. This bill, on or before July 1, 2028, would require the Department of Housing and Community Development, in consultation with other specified state entities, to convene a workgroup to review and provide a report to the Governor and the Legislature with recommendations regarding any provision of the California Building Standards Code that should be suspended for specified types of projects to facilitate rapid, safe, disaster-resilient, and cost-effective rebuilding and recovery guidance for any future state of emergency. Current law also authorizes a district, until January 1, 2027, under specified circumstances, to apply to the applicable local agency formation commission to provide this service of water to Indian lands, as defined, that are not within the district and requires the local agency formation commission to approve that application. This bill would extend the above provisions regarding the application to the applicable local agency formation commission to January 1, 2032. (Based on 01/26/2026 text)

Existing law makes an employer who fails to give specified notice regarding a mass layoff, relocation, or termination subject to a civil penalty of not more than \$500 for each day of the employer's violation. This bill would revise the Cal/WARN Act to also require an employer giving notice of a mass layoff, relocation, or termination caused in whole or in substantial part by an artificial intelligence (AI) system or other automated technology replacing or automating employment positions to include certain information in the notice, including the job functions performed by workers that will be automated by AI or other automated technology. The bill would require the department to publish a summary of the notices received on its internet website and to post a quarterly statewide summary of technological displacements reported. The bill would require the department, on or before January 1, 2028, to submit a report to the Legislature on artificial intelligence's effects on business hiring practices, including its impact on industries and occupations at the state and regional level. The bill would repeal the provision requiring that report on January 1, 2029. (Based on 09/04/2026 text)

The APA requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal an administrative regulation to, among other things, assess the potential for adverse economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals, and requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal a major regulation to prepare and submit to the Department of Finance for review, a standardized regulatory impact analysis, as provided. The APA defines "major regulation," for purposes of the act, to mean any proposed adoption, amendment, or repeal of a regulation subject to review by the OAL that will have an economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals in an amount exceeding \$50,000,000, as provided. The APA provides exceptions for emergency regulations in the case of a situation that calls for immediate action to avoid serious harm to the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare. This bill would prohibit a major regulation from

taking effect until submission to, and expiration of a 60-day review period by, the Legislature, except as provided for emergency regulations. The bill would, prior to the expiration of the 60-day review period, require the Legislature to hold an informational hearing on the major regulation. (Based on 04/15/2026 text)

Until January 1, 2027, upon receipt of the financial review, agreed-upon procedures engagement, or financial compilation, existing law authorizes a county auditor to appoint a certified public accountant or a public accountant to conduct an audit of the special district, as specified. Existing law prohibits a special district from replacing the annual audit requirement with an annual financial compilation for more than 5 consecutive years, after which existing law requires the special district to use specified procedures. This bill would extend the January 1, 2027, repeal date referenced above to January 1, 2037, and would increase the revenue cap described above to \$250,000. (Based on 08/27/2026 text)

Existing law also makes any nondisclosure agreement relating to the drafting, negotiation, or discussion of proposed legislation entered into after January 1, 2026, void and unenforceable. Existing law provides an exception for nondisclosure agreements, or portions thereof, that prevent only the disclosure of trade secrets, financial information, or proprietary information, as specified. This bill would prohibit a local agency official, as defined, acting in their official capacity from entering into, or requesting that another individual enter into, a nondisclosure agreement relating to public business that precludes their ability to share information with fellow local agency officials serving on the same council, board, commission, district, or agency. The bill would require a local agency official in violation of that provision to, among other things, disclose the existence of the nondisclosure agreement, as specified, and would provide that these requirements imposed on a local agency official also apply to a local agency official acting in their official capacity who entered into, or requested that another individual enter into, a nondisclosure agreement described above before January 1, 2027. By imposing additional duties on local agency officials, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill would also make any nondisclosure agreement relating to public business that precludes the ability of a local agency official to share information with fellow local agency officials serving on the same council, board, commission, district, or agency and that is entered into after January 1, 2027, void and unenforceable. Under existing law, an unauthorized person who enters or remains in a closed area, as prescribed, is guilty of a misdemeanor. This bill would, beginning on July 1, 2028, require the Office of Emergency Services, upon request, to issue a local agency, public utility, or mutual water company responsible for public works and critical infrastructure with specified credentialing to facilitate personnel access to an area during or following a natural disaster, act of terrorism, or other man-made disaster. The bill would specify that the credentialing, a Personal Identity Verification-Interoperable (PIV-I), would conform with the federal Personal Identity Verification standards pursuant to federal National Incident Management System guidelines. Existing law requires a city or county that determines a certain type of project is subject to the requirements of CEQA to identify any public water system that may supply water for the project and to request those public water systems to prepare a specified water supply assessment, as provided. This bill, among other things, would instead require a city or county, upon receipt of a preliminary application for a housing development project that meets certain conditions, or upon a development application for certain projects being determined as complete or deemed complete, to make that identification of public water systems. Summary: The Administrative Procedure Act requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal an administrative regulation to assess the potential for adverse economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals and avoid the imposition of unnecessary or unreasonable regulations or reporting, recordkeeping, or compliance requirements. The act requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal a major regulation to satisfy additional requirements, including by requiring the state agency to prepare a standardized regulatory impact analysis in the manner prescribed by the Department of Finance, as specified, and requires the analysis to address certain items, including the creation or elimination of jobs within the state and the competitive advantages or disadvantages for businesses currently doing business within the state. This bill would require an agency, in estimating the economic impact of adopting, amending, or repealing a regulation, to identify and calculate any offsetting benefits, impacts, or savings that might result directly or indirectly from that adoption, amendment, or repeal and factor those benefits, impacts, or savings into its economic impact estimate. Existing law requires the plan to include, among other things, a description of the method for collecting moneys to support and implement the program and a description of the method for determining the amount of moneys that may need to be collected from water ratepayers to fund the program. This bill would establish the Water Rate Assistance Program. As part of the program, the bill would establish the Water Rate Assistance Fund in the State Treasury, available upon appropriation by the Legislature, to provide water affordability assistance for residential water services to low-income residential ratepayers, as specified. The bill would establish separate implementation procedures depending on whether the state board determines that the Legislature appropriated enough moneys from the fund for a partial implementation of the program or a statewide implementation of the program. The bill would require the state board to take various actions in administering the fund, including, among other things, tracking and managing revenue in the fund separately from all other revenue. The bill would require the state board, in consultation with relevant agencies and after a public hearing, to adopt guidelines for implementation of the program and to adopt and submit a report to the Legislature or post the report on its internet website, as specified. Existing law requires the report to contain underlying data from audited financial statements prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, as specified, and to state certain information, including the aggregate income during the preceding fiscal year. Existing law requires the

legislative body, upon completion of the report, to either post the report in a conspicuous location on its internet website or to cause copies of the report to be prepared and the clerk of the legislative body to furnish a copy to any person requesting it, as specified. This bill would require a local agency, as defined, that maintains an internet website to post its audited financial statements, or its annual comprehensive financial report, on its internet website within 30 days of the date that the statements or report are completed by the local agency, as specified. The bill would make its provisions operative on January 1, 2028. (Based on 08/22/2026 text)

Existing law prohibits the use of potable water for the irrigation of nonfunctional turf located on commercial, industrial, and institutional properties, other than a cemetery, and on properties of homeowners' associations, common interest developments, and community service organizations or similar entities, as specified. Existing law requires a person or entity to be subject to civil liability or penalties by the State Water Resources Control Board, as prescribed, or to civil liability and penalties imposed by an urban water supplier, pursuant to a locally adopted ordinance or policy. Existing law authorizes a public water system, city, county, or city and county to enforce the provisions relating to the prohibition, as specified. This bill would require a person or entity to be subject to civil liability or penalties imposed by the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District pursuant to a locally adopted ordinance or policy. Brown Act, provide, with some exceptions, for public access to government records and meetings of government bodies. Among those acts, the California Public Records Act defines "person" to include any natural person, corporation, partnership, limited liability company, firm, or association. This bill would specify that, for purposes of the California Public Records Act, the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act, the Ralph M. Brown Act, the Legislative Open Records Act, the Administrative Procedure Act, the California Coastal Act of 1976, and CEQA, "person," "interested person," "participant," "member of the public," as applicable, and any other similar terms under each act referring to those who may engage with governmental agencies, do not include artificial intelligence, as defined, systems, autonomous agents, or robots, whether physical or digital. Summary: The Ralph M. Existing law, beginning July 1, 2026, requires eligible legislative bodies, as defined, to have in place a system for electronically accepting and fulfilling requests for meeting agendas and documents. Existing law additionally requires these legislative bodies to translate the agenda for each meeting of that body and to reasonably assist members of the public who wish to translate a public meeting or receive interpretation, as specified. This bill would instead delete the above-described requirements on eligible legislative bodies. (Based on 08/25/2026 text)

By expanding the purposes for which a continuously appropriated fund may be expended, the bill would make an appropriation. (Based on 04/27/2026 text)

FINANCIAL IMPACT

COUNTY OF ORANGE UPDATES

Governance, Legal, & Accountability

Supervisors Seek Subpoena Authority in Follow-Up to Andrew Do–Related Contract Audits

After receiving further findings from Weaver and Tidwell on 681 high-priority contracts totaling \$1.7 billion (2019–2025) tied to former Supervisor Andrew Do, supervisors asked County Counsel whether the Board can subpoena companies that have not produced receipts and supporting documents. Broader reviews cover about \$4.3 billion in contracts across the CEO's office, Health Care Agency, OC Community Resources, and Social Services Agency. Examples cited included a \$500,000 Bridgecreek Realty outdoor-dining contract with more than half unaccounted for and a \$748,720 Mercy Pharmacy COVID vaccination invoice lacking supporting documentation. Do is serving a five-year federal sentence after pleading guilty to accepting \$550,000 in bribes to steer more than \$10 million in COVID-relief funds. Supervisors discussed civil recovery and possible legal action.

Former OC Superior Court Judge Israel Claustro Sentenced to Probation in Workers' Compensation Fraud Case

Former Orange County Superior Court judge and prosecutor Israel Claustro was sentenced to one year of probation and a \$5,000 fine for his role in a multimillion-dollar workers' compensation fraud scheme. Claustro operated Liberty Medical Group, which used Dr. Kevin Tien Do – previously suspended after a health-care fraud conviction – to author medical evaluations under other doctors' names. The state paid the group more than \$3 million; Dr. Do received \$306,000, and about \$1.5 million was moved to a management company owned by Claustro.

County Approves Limited Union Raises While Keeping Hiring Freeze in Place

The Board approved one-year contracts with 3% raises for the OC Employees Association, Orange County Attorneys Association, Orange County Managers Association, and International Union of Operating Engineers. AFSCME and the Association of Orange County Deputy Sheriffs were still negotiating; Teamsters rejected the proposed raise. A hiring freeze in place since January 2025 has left more than 1,200 of 1,877 frozen positions still closed (nearly 7% of the workforce), concentrated in Social Services and Health Care (more than 600 combined) and the Sheriff's Department (260 as of early August). Union representatives said some employees pay a monthly fee for drinking water at work sites.

County Nears Close-Out of Airport Fire Claims

Two years after the Airport Fire, the county reported paying 1,471 claims totaling nearly \$164 million, with about \$31 million recovered from insurance. Earlier in the year, the Board authorized



\$33 million to resolve 592 claims from 193 households. The county also paid Cal Fire about \$7 million for firefighting costs. Officials said the claims process is approaching close-out.

Public Safety

County Launches E-Bike Safety Registry and First Buyback Event

A pilot E-bike Safety Registry, created by RidePermit, launched in Orange County to standardize youth e-bike safety training and registration. Students and parents complete a course and quiz, then receive a free digital ID linked to age, school, parent contact, and bike class; an optional \$25 decal is available. Schools and police can use a dashboard to track compliance and incidents. Separately, the District Attorney's Office hosted the county's first e-bike buyback on September 13 at Angel Stadium, offering \$200–\$1,000 gift cards (and some Angels tickets) and drawing hundreds of participants and vehicles.

Gibby Fire Burns About 250 Acres and Closes Ortega Highway

The Gibby Fire burned about 250 acres in unincorporated Rancho Mission Viejo, forcing closure of Ortega Highway from Gateway to Grand in Riverside County. Forward spread was stopped; the cause remained under investigation as a vegetation fire.

Health, Social Services, & Immigration

CalOptima Street Medicine Expands; Medi-Cal Membership Shrinks Under New Federal Rules

CalOptima's street-medicine program, which sends vans staffed with clinician and behavioral-health teams to unhoused residents, will expand in mid-2027 to Fountain Valley, Huntington Beach, Seal Beach, and Westminster under a \$4 million two-year investment expected to serve about 200 members. Services include primary care, behavioral health, substance-use treatment, and case management. Separately, CalOptima Medi-Cal membership fell from a peak near 1 million to about 760,000 in July 2026 (down about 100,000 in one year). New federal eligibility rules include a freeze on full-scope enrollment for undocumented residents, a planned January 2027 shift of about 120,000 undocumented members to state fee-for-service coverage, work/school requirements for many adults 19–64 beginning 2027, and later copays. Officials and community providers said the changes will add renewal and documentation hurdles for low-income families and reduce managed-care funding to hospitals and clinics.

Infrastructure, Development, & Environment

Community Input Sought on OC Sailing and Events Center Improvements

The county opened a public process for proposed improvements at the OC Sailing and Events Center in Dana Point. County officials said the cost of replacing just the docks — expected by year's end — is about \$4.2 million, with a \$3.2 million grant from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife helping offset the cost. An estimate to modernize the events center with a new



two-story building, including classrooms, modern technology and storage areas, hasn't been determined yet.

County Sues GKN Aerospace; \$100 Million Resident Claims Program Set for Garden Grove Chemical Emergency

The District Attorney announced a third party-administered claims program of up to \$100 million for more than 50,000 residents (an estimated 13,000–17,000 households) affected by the May methyl methacrylate tank emergency in Garden Grove, covering hotel stays, meals, transportation, and lost wages. Claims intake is expected to open in October. GKN also pledged \$3 million to local nonprofits. The company paused MMA storage until at least the first quarter of 2027 and discussed a possible operational restart contingent on court-approved safety conditions. Separately, the county authorized a lawsuit against GKN Aerospace seeking \$4 million in emergency-response costs (including about \$3.5 million identified as recoverable, largely by the Sheriff's Department) plus penalties, citing a history of regulatory violations. Garden Grove received state reimbursement for its own response costs; nearby cities that requested similar aid were denied.

Dana Point Harbor Hotel Ground Leases Fail Again

For a third time, supervisors did not approve 66-year ground leases needed to finance two new hotels in the Dana Point Harbor revitalization. The vote failed after disagreement over worker protections for Marina Inn and restaurant employees who would be displaced if the inn is demolished. Supervisor Foley favored moving the leases forward while tabling other issues; Chaffee and Wagner voted no and Nguyen abstained. Developer Bob Olson indicated the project may instead remodel the existing inn. Negotiations on lease terms, boat-parking pricing, and worker transition occurred largely outside public session. Marina and commercial-core construction continues.

Questions Raised Over OC Public Works Records on Mountain Lions; Species Pressure Continues

Voice of OC reported that OC Public Works initially said it had no records of talks with state officials about threatened mountain lions, while an identical request to OCTA produced 13 emails from December 2025 to February 2026 between a Public Works permitting manager and a Caltrans biologist about wildlife fencing, mitigation, and a mountain lion death. Public Works later said it would continue searching, with another records installment expected around September 18. Related coverage described shrinking habitat and extinction-risk concerns for Orange County mountain lions, including limited remaining backcountry range and museum-documented local decline.

South County Power Outage Affects More Than 1,500 Customers

A late-August outage left more than 1,500 customers without power in South Orange County.



Ladera Ranch Cancer Concerns Prompt Anti-Pesticide Organizing and Organic Landscaping Push

Residents and officials in Ladera Ranch continued organizing against pesticide use after local cancer-case concerns. Separate coverage examined whether the community's HOA could shift to organic landscaping as a model for other associations.

Hurricane Marie Damages LA–OC Beaches; Experts Warn Super El Niño Could Be Worse

Swells from Hurricane Marie damaged Los Angeles and Orange County beaches. Coastal scientists said a potential super El Niño could produce more severe erosion and flooding than the recent event.

Political

Recall Attempt Against Six Orange County Judges Ends

A recall effort targeting six Orange County judges ended without qualifying for the ballot.

Rancho Santiago Chancellor Marvin Martinez Placed on Leave Amid Investigation

Rancho Santiago Community College District Chancellor Marvin Martinez was placed on administrative leave pending investigation of his conduct. Issues discussed in closed session have included handling of an approximately \$8 million insurance-related fund and a complaint from Santiago Canyon College President Jeannie Kim concerning Martinez and Vice Chancellor Enrique Perez. Specific findings have not been released publicly. This is separate from last period's temporary 4–3 suspension of Board Chair Philip Yarbrough from officer roles.

COSTA MESA AND NEWPORT BEACH UPDATES

Costa Mesa Approves Pay Increases for Police and Staff

On September 1 the City Council approved memorandums with three unions. Police Association and Police Management Association members receive four 2% increases over 18 months beginning retroactively July 1, 2026, plus bilingual premiums and a \$200 monthly healthcare increase to \$2,619 per member. City Employees Association members receive two 3% increases over the next year. First-year cost is nearly \$3 million, rising to about \$3.7 million the following year, against projected later deficits.

Costa Mesa Advances Expanded Bar Breathalyzer and DUI Grant Program

The Council is slated to accept more than \$92,000 in California Highway Patrol/Office of Traffic Safety grant funding for the "Know Your Limit" program. The grant would pay police overtime for four education campaigns with voluntary breathalyzer tests at participating bars and 40 DUI saturation patrols. It is the department's second such grant.



Mother's Market Fires 15 Costa Mesa Workers Involved in Union Organizing

On August 21, Mother's Market & Kitchen (owned by Mill Road Capital) terminated 15 Costa Mesa employees involved in a union-organizing effort; termination letters sent by FedEx did not state a reason. United Food and Commercial Workers Local 324 filed unfair-labor-practice charges with the National Labor Relations Board on August 23 alleging retaliation.

Newport-Mesa Unified Bans E-Bikes, Scooters, and Boards at All K–8 Campuses

The district prohibited e-bikes, scooters, and boards on all kindergarten-through-eighth-grade campuses.

Learn to Surf Settles With Newport Beach; Five-Year Operating Contract Approved

Learn to Surf and the City of Newport Beach settled litigation, allowing the surf school to operate under a five-year contract.

Judge Orders Newport Beach Charter and Housing Initiatives Forward; Registrar Rejects Late 2026 Filing for Three Measures

Orange County Superior Court Judge Julianne Bancroft ordered Newport Beach to place resident initiatives on the ballot after finding the city abused its discretion by trying to block or delay them. One "Responsible Housing Initiative," which would require a housing plan with a smaller buffer than the city's current plan, is proceeding toward the November 2026 ballot. Three other Stewardship Association measures — on meeting transparency, eight-year council term limits, and district elections — were ordered onto the 2026 ballot after the council voted 5–2 to schedule them for 2028. County Counsel then advised the Registrar of Voters that the statutory 88-day filing deadline (August 7) had passed, and the registrar rejected the three late-filed measures for November 2026. The City Council later scheduled a decision on how a special election for those three initiatives would be conducted.

Newport Beach Makes HOA Street-Camera Pilot Permanent

The City Council unanimously made permanent a pilot allowing qualifying homeowners associations to operate fixed, wireless, solar- or battery-powered cameras in public rights-of-way under an encroachment permit. HOAs must have at least 50 single-unit dwellings and remain in good legal standing. Cameras may not use audio recording, facial recognition, or pan-tilt-zoom and may not point at private dwellings. Footage is for private HOA use but may be shared voluntarily with police. Mayor Lauren Kleiman recused.

Newport Beach Imposes Teen Curfew on Holiday Weekends

The Council unanimously imposed a 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew for minors on the Balboa Peninsula during Memorial Day, Fourth of July, and Labor Day weekends, with exceptions for work, emergencies, travel, religious or school activities, and parental supervision. Fines are tripled in designated safety-enhancement zones. The action follows more than 400 Fourth of July weekend arrests, about 20% involving people ages 13–18.



OTHER CITY UPDATES

Anaheim: Stan Kroenke Agrees to Buy Angels From Arte Moreno

Stan Kroenke reached a deal to purchase the Los Angeles Angels from Arte Moreno, with implications for the team's long-term stadium and Anaheim lease future.

Dana Point and Other Beach Cities Declare Emergencies After High-Tide Damage

Dana Point and Laguna Beach issued emergency declarations as high tides and large waves damaged additional houses.

Laguna Beach Studies Micro-Hospital as Alternative to Closing Local Emergency Care

After Providence announced plans to close emergency and acute care at Mission Hospital Laguna Beach by 2030—citing about \$300 million in seismic retrofit costs and \$50 million in plumbing and electrical upgrades—city officials and Providence agreed to study a “micro-hospital” on the existing campus. The concept could include an emergency room, diagnostics, food service, and a pharmacy. The city plans to hire consultants; the study is not binding on Providence.

Multiple OC Cities Place Tax and Governance Measures on November Ballot

Cities asking voters for new or extended local taxes or charter changes include: Orange (1-cent sales tax for about \$37 million a year plus hotel tax 10% to 14% and a charter-city question); Santa Ana (make the existing 1.5% Measure X sales tax permanent); San Clemente (1% sales tax for about \$15 million a year, focused on beach preservation); Westminster and Los Alamitos (hotel tax 8% to 12%); Placentia (hotel tax 10% to 14%); Costa Mesa (business-license tax scaled to gross receipts for larger firms, estimated at more than \$4.6 million); Laguna Beach (term-limit cool-off after two terms); Lake Forest (replace existing two-term limit with a four-year cool-off); Irvine (ranked-choice voting); and Newport Beach (Responsible Housing Initiative).

Some OC Cities Pursue Homeland Security Grants for Border Patrol Cooperation

Several Orange County cities, including Orange, Newport Beach, Costa Mesa, Huntington Beach, Laguna Beach, Seal Beach, and La Habra, considered or moved to accept federal Homeland Security grants supporting cooperation with Border Patrol on drug interdiction. Coverage identified a growing number of cities evaluating the grants.

Westminster Councilmember's Bribery Charge Dismissed After Diversion; Speaking Ban Lifted

A Westminster councilmember completed a diversion program, after which a bribery charge was dismissed, and a related public-speaking ban was lifted.



SPECIAL DISTRICT UPDATES

OCWD Responds to Grand Jury PFAS Report and Continues Cost-Recovery Litigation

The Orange County Water District submitted its required response to the 2025–26 Grand Jury report on PFAS in Orange County drinking water. OCWD stated that county drinking water meets or exceeds state and federal standards. The district estimated more than \$600 million in PFAS capital costs and about \$1.8 billion in total costs including operations over 30 years. OCWD and producers have already sued manufacturers including 3M and DuPont; settlements totaling \$78 million have been received to date, with additional payments expected. The Grand Jury recommended continued cost recovery against manufacturers.

POLITICAL AND STATE UPDATES

Supreme Court Mail-Voting Ruling Leaves California's Midterm Mail Ballots Intact for Now

The U.S. Supreme Court held that Democratic-led states, including California, lacked standing to challenge a presidential executive order restricting mail voting because the Postal Service had not yet formally implemented a related rule. California still plans to mail ballots to every registered voter. A potential USPS rule would require states to submit lists of mail-eligible voters and place unique barcodes on envelopes; Orange County already uses approved barcoded envelopes. Governor Newsom said the state will sue again if implementation proceeds. Local election officials said late changes would be difficult before November.

OC Lawmakers Advance End-of-Session Health and Education Bills

As the session closed, several Orange County–authored bills reached the governor or were signed, including SB 971 (Choi) authorizing local healthy-aging partnership programs; AB 1956 (Valencia) directing the Office of Suicide Prevention to focus on boys and young men (signed); SB 1133 (Strickland) on preventive health instruction in the state health-education framework (signed); AB 1569 (Davies) directing standardized e-bike safety training for grades 7–12 (signed); SB 1188 (Archuleta) expanding JROTC access for students whose schools lack a program (signed); and SB 1135 (Blakespear) re-establishing a wildlife-coexistence program.
